

- **1.** My feature on Roger Corman. I was really trying to get to the bottom of multiple mysteries at once—pouring through thousands of pages of court documents and two months of interviews to figure out how this underground legend had built an astonishing fortune and then lost it all in a complicated fraud.
- 2. It wasn't always obvious that the legal dispute between Hulk Hogan and Gawker would be a watershed moment in the relationship between public figures and the press, but I was the first reporter to cover it substantively and spent years tracking developments. When it finally got to trial, Gawker founder Nick Denton was pointing to my work as a mustread primer, and Hogan's lawyers had poster-sized one of my articles for the jury. My intuition this would be important proved spot on, and I was in a great position to discuss the implications in the aftermath.
- **3.** I'd like to moderate a roundtable between Bob Dylan, Vaclav Havel, Martin Luther King, Jr. and Donald Trump.
- **4.** An explosion of dark, independent, politically-disruptive creativity.

- 1. Writing about talent agent Lynn Venturella—who'd been accused by her former clients of taking money they were owed for acting gigs—was a real challenge. Many of Venturella's former clients were struggling for a toehold in Hollywood, and in some cases their run-ins with Venturella led them to give up on show business altogether. Many are still seeking restitution for the money they said Venturella took from them. Reporting on these painful stories was challenging.
- **2.** I am most proud of the story on talent agent Lynn Venturella, which told a tale about a side of the entertainment industry that is seldom seen. I think that people generally understand that Hollywood has an ugly underbelly, but I felt it was important to show readers what this shadowy, low-level side of the business actually looks like in 2016.

- **4.** Overall, Donald Trump's presidency will be the biggest story of 2017, and it will be a huge arts/entertainment story too. We will see a lot of coverage of corporate Hollywood's pushback of Trump's agenda, and plenty of stories about artistic dissent. (We are already seeing plenty of both, and he has yet to take office.)

- 1. Smashing the monumental and multi-million-dollar cover-up— orchestrated by Hollywood lawyers, powerbrokers, and fixers—to protect Charlie Sheen's depraved HIV secret, and their conspiracy to hide the truth so the actor could continue to indulge in unprotected sex.
- **2.** This story. Why? Because it's almost too crazy to believe.

That Change Lives FOR DECADES, VISIONARY AWARD RECIPIENT DIANE WARREN'S MUSIC

HAS MADE THE WORLD A BETTER PLACE

IANE WARREN doesn't like change. She has lived in the same house in the Hollywood Hills for 23 years, been a vegetarian for 20 years, still uses her Blackberry and for 31 years has had the same nearby offices and studio.

She stops on her short drive to work each morning for a blended latte. Her cat and 24-year-old parrot Buttwings keep her company in a cluttered office that she has called her "secret world." She still uses a tape recorder to create both music and lyrics that is initially recorded on an audiocassette. She listens on an analog Walkman.

Still pixyish and youthful-looking at 60, she never married or had children. She exercises, has friends and supports charities, but much of her life involves long days making music that has filled the songbook of her generation.

She has been inducted into the Songwriters Hall of Fame and the Hollywood Walk of Fame. Her hits include "Nothing's Going to Stop Us Now" (with Albert Hammond), "Because You Love Me" (Celine Dion), "I Don't Want to Miss a Thing" (Aerosmith), "Music of

My Heart" (Gloria Estafan) and "Grateful" (Rita Ora).

Overall she has had over 100 top ten hits, and her songs have been heard in more than 100 motion pictures, earning her eight Academy Award nominations and five Golden Globe nominations. She has also won eight Grammy Awards and, this past year, claimed her first Emmy.

Tonight, the Los Angeles Press Club is honoring Diane Warren with its 2016 Visionary Award, created to honor an individual in the entertainment industry who uses his or her high-profile status to make the world a better place, and to spread information about issues of freedom and importance.

That is what Warren has done again and again. In 2011, a video of Beyoncé performing her song "I Was Here" was shot inside the UN General Assembly. It was seen by more than 1 billion people.

Early this year, Warren worked with First Lady Michelle Obama on behalf of the "Let Girls Learn" campaign, to make sure girls all over the globe can get an education.

Warren's song "This Is For My Girls" uses positive

lyrics to empower girls and women. It urges them to "stand up, put your head up, don't take nothing from nobody."

Warren joined Mrs. Obama in Austin, Texas, in March for the song's premiere at the South By Southwest festival. It was performed by musical all-stars including Kelly Clarkson, Janelle Monae, Lea Michele and Missy Elliot.

"Diane Warren and this collective of powerful, talented artists have truly taken action in support of 'Let Girls Learn,'" said the First Lady at the time. "I am thrilled that they've created this anthem for the 62 million girls around the world who are not in school."

Another song with an impact was also a life-changing experience for Warren. She wrote "Til It Happens to You" for Kirby Dick and Amy Ziering's documentary *The Hunting Ground,* about the problem of date rape.

"It really gave voice to that," said Warren. "Music is more powerful than anything. It goes right to your heart."

Performed with emotion and depth by Lady Gaga, it became the anthem for a cause. It was also a landmark moment for Warren, causing her to reveal a dark personal secret she had kept hidden for five decades—she had been molested when she was only 12. She had never told anyone, not even her parents.

"You have no idea how many... people I've met on the street who tell me the song gave a voice to people who couldn't talk about it," Warren said. "It even made me talk about something I had never even told friends."

During an event in New York City with Lady Gaga and the filmmakers, Warren "blurted out," she recalled, "Hey, I was molested too."

It was weeks before the Academy Awards, where the nominated song was performed by Lady Gaga and a chorus of real-life victims. Vice President Joe Biden then called for attention to a serious problem.

Warren loved meeting the VP, praising him because he "doesn't have a filter. He has so much heart. He is

so genuine. When he talked to me about my work he had tears in his eyes."


Lady Gaga's performance was among the most talked-about on the Oscars, and earned a standing ovation and an outpouring on social media worldwide.

Warren's ongoing passion is animal rescue, and it only begins with her vegetarianism. "You can't love animals and eat them," said Warren. "Like, I hate Thanksgiving. It's a dead headless bird on a table.... It's a turkey holocaust."

Warren estimates 98% of her philanthropy goes toward animal rescue. "My favorite right now," said Warren, "is Mercy for Animals. They do stuff for farm animals. That's my passion. It's so terrible what happens to farm animals, the murder and cruelty."

Warren continues to write music that supports important causes and subjects. Next year one of her songs will be the theme for *Marshall*, the powerful story of the first African-American Supreme Court Justice. "It's one of the best songs I've ever done for a movie," said Warren.

Just don't ask her to explain her process of songwriting. "I don't know what my process is," she says. "I show up. I get to work. I don't ever analyze. I don't like to explain what I do. It's magical. It happens. I work very hard."



SUCCESS

ON HER OWN TERMS

FEW WEEKS before the presidential election, Chelsea Handler stopped using her social media accounts except to post promotional items. She consciously avoided reading any of the comments.

Handler was under attack from supporters of Donald Trump, who she had repeatedly put down while actively backing Hillary Clinton. "I'm sure everybody is saying, 'Die, get out of here. Nobody likes you.' So I stopped looking."

On her Netflix show in October, during an interview with Univision anchor Jorge Ramos, Handler declared that she would move to Canada if Trump was elected. She later said she had bought a home in Spain and would move there, adding that she wasn't the only celebrity planning an exodus.

Handler didn't leave, but insists she was sincere. She reversed herself the first day back at work after the election.

"The people that work in my office, mostly Millennials, were saying 'You have to stay,'" recalls Handler. "I said, 'I can't even do a show. I'm leaving.'

"They said, 'You're our voice. You're the person representing us. We need you now more than ever,'" she added. "'If you move to Spain, that's completely irresponsible."

Handler indeed felt a sense of responsibility, adding that, "there are a few million people out there who want to get their information from me." So she elected to remain at Netflix to finish her documentaries and

the first 90-episode season of "Chelsea," a talk show that is a breakthrough in how it is produced, how it is distributed and for its creative purpose.

The Los Angeles Press Club tonight is presenting Handler with the Luminary Award for Career Achievement. It's a recognition of the ground she has broken, the relationship with audiences she has cultivated and the work she continues to do.

There has never been a talk show quite like "Chelsea." A stand-up comic, author, actress and veteran of several previous talk shows, Handler has cut an unprecedented deal that gives her complete creative control.

Three shows a week are posted on Netflix, which is available in about 190 countries. Episodes are generally about half an hour, though some run longer. Her opening monologue is as likely to be about a medical or cultural matter as a comedic joke-fest.

"It's nice to be given that license," said Handler, "to be able to make the show I want and not have them inhibit my creativity. In the beginning I said I want the show to be many different things. Sometimes a dinner party. Sometimes a focus on another country. Some-

times hilarious. Sometimes serious. Sometimes in the studio. Sometimes not."

During the two years after her landmark deal with Netflix was announced, but before the first show aired this past May, Handler said she was pressured, criticized and endlessly second guessed.

"Everybody looked at me askance," she recalled, "and said, 'It's not going to work. It's not traditional.' And when it was reviewed they said it was like every other talk show, but it's not."

Handler has been in the limelight for years. As a stand-up comedian she drew thousands to huge venues. She is the best-selling author of five books, and hosted "Chelsea Lately" (2007-2014) on E! Entertainment Television. Over time people have come either to love the outspoken Jersey girl almost to the point of obsession, or hate her, which is why she stopped checking social media.

Netflix doesn't release viewership numbers for "Chelsea" (or other shows) but it has been renewed, and Handler said, "They're very happy with it. It spiked in the beginning and then went down a little, but ratings have started to spike a little bit more. We've been on an uptick the last few months."

Through her often-brash comedy, her penchant for unfiltered commentary on almost everything, and her emotional connection with audiences, Handler has emerged as a quirky, often funny, sometimes angry voice for the younger generation, and those who refuse to grow old.

Handler said the Luminary Award is special to her.

"I've never been a critical darling so it's not like I've gotten a lot of these," she said. "Yes, it's an honor to get any award. I would love to get an Emmy or a Golden Globe, if we qualified. But I've resigned myself to being a person who doesn't get a lot of those, so it's nice."

Her show and her life have nearly merged over the years. She has never married or had children, she obsesses over her weight, and treats her staff (some of whom are longtime friends or relatives) as a big extended family. She remains a self-described "party animal" who likes her cocktails. One of her two rescue dogs, Chunk, goes to work with her and can be seen wandering the set while she interviews a star or an expert on climate change.

She no longer does stand-up and has no plans for another book, but still reads voraciously so she can ask smart questions—and to fill a void.

"I didn't go to college," explained Handler, "so I'm constantly over-compensating for that absence. I want to know as much as I can so when I talk to people, I don't want to feel like an idiot."

Being independent fuels her passions. "I view getting married, settling down and having kids as not appealing to me," said Handler. "It never has been. I look at my friends with kids and love them but don't want to get up in the morning and get a kid ready for school. I want to get up and read the *New York Times* and play with my dog.

"I want my own life and I've got it," added Handler. "I've got tons of friends. I have the most fun. I go on vacation and act like an idiot, and I don't have anybody to answer to and it feels nice."

A Remarkable Life

FOR LEGEND AWARD RECIPIENT ANGELA LANSBURY,
BOUNDARIES WERE MADE TO BE BROKEN

by ted Johnson HEN ANGELA LANSBURY was asked earlier this year about whether she would retire, she answered as if she hadn't dwelled much recently on the thought.

"Well, no I don't think so," she told Alec Baldwin, who interviewed her at TCM's annual film festival in Hollywood. "I always say, you got to keep moving, and that is what I am trying to do."

Lansbury, the recipient of tonight's Legend Award presented by the Los Angeles Press Club, added that stage roles propel her to go forward, with the feeling that, "you the audience are there and we are together in this."

At 91, Lansbury is one of the few performers left from the heyday of Hollywood's studio system. Her endurance is a credit to her ability to break free of its constraints.

She gave up an MGM contract in the 1950s to spur a career on the stage, including Tony-

winning roles in Mame, Sweeney Todd, Dear World and Gypsy.

Meanwhile, her role as Jessica Fletcher in the CBS series "Murder She Wrote" ran for 12 seasons starting in 1984. It made her famous and showed her range: Another of her notable roles was that of the Machiavellian mother Mrs. Iselin in *The Manchurian Candidate*. Much has been made of the fact that she was just three years older than Laurence Harvey, who played her brainwashed son in the John Frankenheimer classic.

"I always say to everybody, 'Leave yourself at home. Don't bring yourself to that set," she told the TCM audience. "Be that woman and get on with it. That seems to work on various levels in various roles."

Lansbury was born in London, the daughter of Moyna Macgill, an actress, and Edgar Lansbury, a politician. With her mother and two younger brothers, she moved to the United











States in 1940 as her native city was bombed in the Blitz. She eventually moved to Los Angeles, where a chance meeting with a fellow actor helped land her an introduction to a casting director at MGM.

She garnered her first film role, as the young maid in *Gaslight*, after studio boss L.B. Mayer watched her screen test and said, "Sign that girl."

"I was signed out of nowhere," Lansbury said, according to Martin Gottfried's authorized biography of her, *Balancing Act*.

She quit a \$28-a-week job as a clerk at Bull-ocks-Wilshire and moved into a \$500-a-week starting salary in the studio's standard one-year contract, with six year options, according to Gottfried's book.

with MGM; Lansbury's success on stage includes winning a Tony Award for Mame year later by another nomination for *The Picture* of *Dorian Gray*. Roles in *The Harvey Girls, State* of the *Union* and *Samson and Delilah* followed, though eventually she found that her parts were diminishing to character roles.

Mayer, she told the TCM audience, "put me in some dreadful parts, and I couldn't wait to get away from MGM and to the theater."

She got out of her MGM contract in 1952 and began moving into stage performances as well as some TV work. She made her Broadway debut as Bert Lahr's wife in *Hotel Paradiso* and returned three years later in *A Taste of Honey*.

John Frankenheimer worked with her in All Fall Down in 1962. On the last day of the shoot, he gave her a copy of the Richard Condon novel *The Manchurian Candidate*.

"It was wonderfully well-constructed, so orig-

inal, so extraordinary, I was really blown away by it," she said.

One of the stars of the movie, Frank Sinatra, wanted Lucille Ball for the part of Mrs. Iselin, but, "I think Frankenheimer had put his foot down" to demand that she get the role, Lansbury said.

A breakout role in musical theater came in 1966, when she starred in *Mame*. In Gottfried's *Balancing Act*, composer Jerry Herman recalled that on the opening night curtain call, "When the audience realized they had just seen one of the great performances of all time and had discovered a new star who was the image of goodness and decency and fairness—well after the Hollywood years and the character actor stuff, she suddenly became the lady in the white dress. She was it, the one in the spotlight."

In addition to starring roles on stage, she made movies such as *Bedknobs and Broomsticks* and *Death on the Nile*. Meanwhile, she and her husband Peter Shaw moved their family from Malibu to a home in County Cork, Ireland.

Her role as Miss Marple in *The Mirror Crack'd* was a forerunner to that of Jessica Fletcher in "Murder, She Wrote." Jean Stapleton had turned

down the part, but Lansbury saw great potential for the character of a mystery writer and crime sleuth.

The role, she told Walters, gave her a "personal sense of achievement I have never known before." She became a TV star at age 59.

Lansbury supplemented the long run of "Murder, She Wrote" with other work, including voice roles in the animated classic *Beauty and the Beast*. Later she guest starred on shows like "Law & Order" and appeared in Emma Thompson's *Nanny McPhee* in 2005. The latter came after the death of Shaw, a producer and former agent, to whom she had been married for 53 years.

In an interview with CNN in 2014, Lansbury credited their long marriage to "mainly our mutual interest in what we were doing together."

After 23 years, she returned to Broadway in *Deuce*, and two years later won another Tony as Madame Arcati in *Blithe Spirit*. She reprised that role in London in 2014, and later toured with the show, including a stop in Los Angeles. She also appeared in recent years in stage revivals of Gore Vidal's *The Best Man* and Alfred Uhry's *Driving Miss Daisy*.

Lansbury received an honorary Oscar in 2013. At the ceremony, she recalled the legendary actors she had worked with—Ingrid Bergman, Katherine Hepburn, Spencer Tracy, Sinatra—as well as directors such as George Cukor and Frankenheimer.

"I even had coffee in the MGM commissary with Clark Gable. That's as far as it went, you understand," she said, to laughs. "But we were on the lot together."

But then her memories of the past gave way to the present, and to the family members and friends with her at the ceremony. "Let me tell you, it doesn't get much better than that."

In 2014 she was promoted from a mere Commander of the Order of the British Empire to Dame Commander of the Order of the British Empire (DBE). Thus, this year's Legend is Dame Angela Lansbury.

Honoring Filmmakers Who Are Journalists at Heart

Spotlight Won the Press Club's First Veritas Award. Get Ready for Round Two

t was a story waiting to be told, and the Los Angeles Press Club jumped on it. For years, Hollywood has used biopics and other based-on-a-true-story films to tell tales of extraordinary lives and events. Yet, there wasn't an award recognizing that work.

The Club's Veritas Award, which debuted in February, honors filmmakers who are journalists at heart, those who look to change the world through probing, investigative, thoughtful movies. The Club's more than 450 members vote on the best film, from a list compiled by the Club's board.

The inaugural winner, Spotlight, had all the elements the club was looking for, in a gripping account of how investigative reporters at the Boston Globe uncovered a priest sex-abuse scandal. We weren't alone in loving the film: It won the Oscar for Best Picture four days after the Press Club gave out its award.

The Press Club's Veritas ceremony, with red carpet arrivals and Champagne bottles popping, featured a panel discussion with three of the actual Boston Globe reporters and editors, Ben Bradlee Jr., Sacha Pfeiffer and Michael Rezendes, as well as screenwriter Josh Singer, who also won an Oscar for his script. Their lively discussion about how they got the story, how the movie was made and the state of investigative journalism today is archived on the Club's website.

With films including Jackie, Birth of a Nation, Deepwater Horizon, Sully, Hacksaw Ridge and The Founder now in theaters or soon to be released, the 2017 Veritas Award winner will likely be another extraordinary film.



Remembering Those We Lost

A Number of Entertainment Legends Passed Away in 2016

HE YEAR 2016 was filled with entertainment highlights, memorable moments and standout performances in all mediums. Yet as is always the case, the world also had to say goodbye to some incomparable talents.

The year began with the surprise news that singer David Bowie had succumbed

to cancer, just two days after the release of what would be his final album. Bowie's passing was a heartsick moment for fans young and old. He was remembered as an icon for people who were different and who flaunted gender boundaries, characteristics expressed in his ability to

perimental and popular.
Sadly, he was not the only rock star we would lose. Barely a week after Bowie, Eagles' singer Glenn Frey passed away. Then came Jefferson Airplane founder Paul Kantner, keyboardist Keith Emerson and country crooner

Merle Haggard.

Another shock occurred when Prince, age 57 and still

on tour, died in his Minneapolis-area home in April. Born Prince Rogers Nelson, the singer crossed racial and musical boundaries at a time when FM radio and MTV played few black artists. His hits were nearly too numerous to count, and included "1999," "I Would Die 4 U," "Little Red Corvette" and "Let's Go Crazy." Throughout his career, Prince was a champion of artists' rights and of live (as in not prerecorded) performances.

The hits just kept coming. We lost film actors George Kennedy (*Cool Hand Luke, Naked Gun*), David Huddleston (*The Big Lebowski*) and Alan Rickman (*Die Hard, the Harry Potter series*). Nor were TV fans spared, as those who died included Doris Roberts ("Seinfeld," "Everybody Loves Raymond"), Abe Vigoda ("Fish") and, just last month, Florence Henderson ("The Brady Bunch"). Others who were instantly, fondly remembered were Patty Duke, Gary Glasberg, Robert Vaughn ("The Man From U.N.C.L.E.") and Garry Shandling. And don't forget an MGM contract player who would marry her *Hellcats of the Navy* costar and go

on to become First Lady of the U.S.:

Hollywood lost one its greats when Gene Wilder, the man who taught kids to focus on "Pure Imagination" in Willy Wonka and the Chocolate Factory, succumbed to Alzheimer's disease in August.

Nancy Reagan.

The world also lost prominent authors who changed the way we read and lived, among them Pat Conroy, Harper Lee, Umberto Eco and Gloria Naylor. Directors Garry Marshall and Michael Cimino passed away, as did producers Robert Stigwood (*Grease, Saturday Night Fever*) and George Martin.

The sports world lost two of the greatest of all time in Arnold Palmer and Muhammad Ali. The journalism community said goodbye to Morley Safer and Gwen Ifill.

Bluegrass legend Ralph Stanley, famous for his version of "O Death" from the *O Brother, Where Art Thou?* soundtrack, passed away in June. The music industry fatalities kept coming: Leon Russell, Sharon Jones and Leonard Cohen, who, like Bowie, put out his last album, a meditation on mortality, just days before he passed.

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

Meet Helena Gibson, the Artist Who Created the Visionary, Luminary and Legend Awards

For the fifth consecutive year, the Los Angeles Press Club is honoring its Visionary Award and Luminary Award recipients with unique artworks designed by Helena Gibson, one of Sweden's foremost glass artists. Last year, a third award designed by Gibson was added—the Legend Award.

For the Visionary Award, which this year is being given to Diane Warren, Gibson again created a variation of a star design. It features a soft pink star inset with a 24-carat gold covered glass star on a red background with the outline of an eve.

The Luminary Award for Chelsea Handler is a unique chalice decorated with 24-carat gold.

For Legend Award recipient Angela Lansbury, Gibson again created a variation of a

wolf design. A silhouetted howling wolf in red—the wolf symbolizes endurance, while the red references passion—is bathed in the reflection of trees on a purple background embedded with an outline of an eye. It's a fitting tribute to someone who has spent more than a half century thrilling audiences.

All three honorees receive a unique expression of Helena's artistic excellence through these beautiful art pieces.

Gibson studied at the Glass School at Orrefors, Sweden, and at Seattle's Pilchuck Glass School under the guidance of legendary glass artist Dale Chihuly. In addition to traditional glass blowing, she works with a technique known as "fusing and slumping," which was used to create the Visionary Award star.



David Michaels



DAVID MICHAELS is the vice-president of the Academy of Television Arts and Sciences and producer of the Daytime Emmy Awards. He has also served on the ATAS Board of Governors. He founded TV Cares, an ATAS AIDS awareness committee that promotes HIV/AIDS awareness, which he co-chaired for 15 years with Dame Angela Lansbury.

Michaels created the annual Ribbon of Hope Celebration, which honors people and programs for their work with HIV/AIDS awareness and education. He also helped to popularize the Red Ribbon as an international symbol of HIV/AIDS awareness, earning him another Daytime Emmy nomination.

He began his performing career at the age of seventeen, playing roles in productions across the U.S., Canada and Europe. Michaels worked as an actor until competing on a game show, which piqued his interests in Daytime Television production leading to his first production job with Bob Stewart Productions. He quickly worked his way up to producer, working on over 25 pilots and air shows, including the \$25,000 and \$100,000 Pyramids starring Dick Clark. Michaels' work on Pyramids series earned him two Emmy Awards and multiple nominations.

Catherine Hardwicke



CATHERINE HARDWICKE, the award-winning writer and director of her first feature film, *Thirteen*, and later known for directing *Twilight*, has worked in the film and television industry since the 1980s. Some of her early work involved serving as a production designer on films ranging from those with low budgets, such as *Brain Dead*, to major films, such as

Tombstone, Three Kings, and Vanilla Sky.

Hardwicke was born in Texas and graduated from the University of Texas at Austin with a degree in architecture. Feeling that the profession limited her creativity, she moved to Los Angeles, studying film at UCLA and producing an award-winning short. From there, she worked her way up in the entertainment industry, eventually becoming the director of the first *Twilight* film in 2008. The first weekend of the film was the biggest opening ever for a female director.

One of the themes of her films has been teen angst, and she has worked with many of the young generation's teen idols, such as Kristen Stewart and Taylor Lautner. Hardwicke also helped create a public service announcement for the National Women's History Museum in 2012.

Among her recent projects was the USA Network drama series "Eyewitness," for which she was the director and executive producer for two of the 10 episodes.
