HENRY WINKLER'S COOLEST ROLE IS HELPING KIDS

THE AWARD-WINNING STAR OF 'HAPPY DAYS' AND 'BARRY' RECEIVES THE ROSENDAHL PUBLIC SERVICE AWARD FOR HIS CHILDREN'S BOOKS

Winkler has maintained a close relationship with actor and director Ron Howard, whom he starred with on "Happy Days."

Fonzarelli on "Happy Days"—for which he won two Golden Globes.

This past September, he won his first Emmy, for his role on the HBO show "Barry." At age 73, Winkler is enjoying a career renaissance, with critics applauding his performance as the complicated, tortured acting teacher Gene Cousineau.

Starting with his first screen appearances in 1974's *Crazy Joe* and *The Lords of Flatbush*, Winkler has been part of America's cultural consciousness. He appeared in three Adam Sandler films including playing Coach Klein in the ever popular *The Waterboy* and he directed Billy Crystal in *Memories of Me*. He starred opposite Michael Keaton in his first film role in Ron Howard's cult classic *Night Shift*.

Winkler's friendship with Howard goes way beyond the typical showbiz relationship.
Winkler is godfather to Howard's children and the director had this to say about this evening's honoree: "You're a friend to the world. A world class friend. I love ya, man."

Yet despite the accolades, and the stints directing, writing and producing (the TV hit "MacGyver" is among his many credits), Winkler considers his greatest achievement—aside from staying married to his



wife Stacey for more than 40 years, having three children and five grandkids—is being the co-author of 34 children's books, with more on the way.

This commitment to books and children has prompted the Los Angeles Press Club to present Winkler tonight with the Bill Rosendahl Public Service Award for Contributions to Civic Life

What makes the award special to Winkler is that he never imagined he could write any book. Winkler is dyslexic, something he discovered at age 31, during his fourth year on "Happy Days," after his son was diagnosed. All three of his children suffered from learning disabilities, and all are now grown and functional adults.

In his books for elementary age children, Winkler uses comedy to provide what he





calls, "a direct line to the reluctant reader."

He works with a partner on the books, Lin Oliver, but provides the vision and the voice.

"This is a story I understood," says Winkler. "It was a story I knew and it was easy to get into the 8-year-old who failed all the time. Even now at 70 plus, I was able to access that."

His books carry a positive message to challenged children that there is greatness inside each and every one of them. When children tell him their stories of dealing with learning disabilities, Winkler relates to what they face.

"I'm not a professional," he explains. "But in my way I support the child who learns differently and talk to children who don't have learning challenges and say, 'Your life will be so much better when you see a kid in your class who's got a problem you know you can solve, and you help him.' That kid feels good. You feel good. It's a win-win."

Winkler started traveling the world to sell books by telling his personal story. Instead, it changed his life. He recalls one of his first promo trips, to Lancaster, Penn., when he was accompanied by his wife. Winkler remembers arriving for the night. Top, reading at a book festival in 2016;

"We get out of the car and go into the hotel," says Winkler, "and the bellman who was about 20 comes flying out from behind his desk and says, 'Oh, I read every one of your books. They got me through."

"That happens more and more to me now," continues Winkler. "I meet these children and young adults who tell me that ours was the first book they ever read."

"Henry doesn't just dabble in do-gooding," says Chris Palmeri, president of the Los Angeles Press Club. "He puts serious and creative time into ways to support people kler tonight, "He really does live by—and I




with disabilities.

"Winkler has gone on reading tours of schools and donated books to the needy, among the many charitable efforts he has made," adds Palmeri.

His Emmy-winning co-star on "Barry," Bill Hader (who also co-created, writes and produces the hit show), plays a conflicted hit man studying acting with Cousineau. Hader says his co-star lives the life he preaches.

"He's just a very selfless person," says Hader, who is presenting the award to Win-

know it sounds corny—but he likes to bring a lot of happiness into the world.

"His kind of preset is compassion and a lot of heart," adds Hader. "He's just very genuine and he kind of radiates it."

Hader believes that comes through in Winkler's performance on "Barry."

"On our show he has to play kind of a bad person, but he can't help but infuse that guy with some sort of compassion and something that makes you feel for him," said Hader. "You can't teach that."

Winkler continues working to overcome his disability. Even on "Barry," his challenges are obvious at times, particularly during the first read through of a script.

"At table reads," says Hader, "he has to take his time. We're reading the script and he has to memorize while the rest of us are just reading, so it's harder for him to cold read stuff.

"He is always apologizing like, 'Hey, I'm really sorry. I know I'm slow. I messed this up or whatever,'" says Hader. "And we're like, 'Henry, you're dyslexic. Don't worry about it. You're fine.' But he puts a ton of work into it."

Along with helping children from all over the globe, Winkler was also able to help his own children with the advice that he has learned to live by, and has shared so many times.

"I said, as long as you try, what grade you bring home doesn't matter," says Winkler. "Here's what I've learned as a parent and from meeting all these wonderful children: Their destiny is already inside them. Our job is to help them fly."

CHER CALVIN is a five-time Emmy Award winner who co-anchors the KTLA 5 News at 6,10 and 11 p.m. weeknights alongside Micah Ohlman. She joined KTLA in 2005 and is currently Vice President of the Los Angeles Press Club.

With a deep connection to her community in Los Angeles, she serves as Mistress of Ceremonies for the annual YWCA Pasa-

Mexico City to become an Univision news correspondent, in 2016, González became the news anchor at Noticias Univision 34 in Los Angeles, where she started a special segment, "Latinas de Éxito", featuring interviews with successful Latinas in California. In 2018, her interview with Tamara Mena was nominated for a Southern California Journalism Award.

In July 2018, the 11:00 p.m. edition of Univision Los Angeles won the Emmy Award for Best Nightly News in Southern California.



BILL HADER made the switch from being a master impressionist on "Saturday Night Live" to creating, directing, writing, producing and starring as a burned-out assassin trying to break into the LA theater scene in HBO's "Barry."

In 2018's first season, the series received 13 Emmy nominations, including victories for Best Actor and co-star Henry Win-

kler for Best Supporting Actor. By the recently concluded second season, "Barry" only got darker, funnier and more addictive. "Barry" also received an AFI Award and a Peabody Award as well. Hader is a member of the unofficial "Four Guild Club" (actor, writer, director and producer guilds), receiving nominations or awards in each one.

Hader is co-creator of IFC's "Documentary Now!" named one of the best TV shows of 2015 by the *New York Times*. Hader spent eight seasons on "Saturday Night Live" for which he received four Emmy Award nominations.

Starring in such films as *Trainwreck, Superbad, Pineapple Express* and *Tropic Thunder*, he segued to a dramatic role in 2014's critically-acclaimed *The Skeleton Twins* opposite his former SNL castmate, Kristen Wiig. He will next be seen in *It Chapter Two*, the sequel to the 2017 hit *It*, which will be released in September.



PAT HARVEY is the co-anchor of CBS 2's weekday 5 and 11 p.m. newscasts. She joined CBS 2 following 20 years with sister station KCAL 9 as one of the original anchors of the nation's first nightly three-hour primetime newscast. Harvey, who received the Joseph M. Quinn Award for Lifetime Achievement from the Press Club in 2004, regularly reports on issues of con-

cern to Southern California and the world.

Her reporting has ranged from filing live reports at the inauguration of President Barack Obama to following the story of a homeless painter from the streets of Los Angeles to a gallery in Paris. Harvey is a 22-time Emmy winner, the most recent for Outstanding Feature Reporter. Other awards include being named Best News Anchor by the Associated Press and seven Golden Mikes.
