# Late 2021 Window Opens to Allow a Live Awards Show

COVID-19 Posed Hurdles, But Local Journalism Powered Ahead

OVID-19 continued to disrupt our lives over the past 12 months, but the Los Angeles Press Club forged ahead with a variety of programs and events supporting serious journalism.

In October, the journalism world came together again—in person!—for the 63rd annual Southern California Journalism Awards (delayed from the usual summer date). At the gala event in Downtown L.A., Sean Penn and Ann Lee accepted the Bill Rosendahl Public Service Award for their nonprofit organization Community Organized Relief Effort's (CORE)

work to quickly provide free coronavirus testing across Los Angeles in the early days of the pandemic.

Dr. Sanjay Gupta of CNN was honored with the President's Award for his work providing vital information to viewers during the pandemic. *ABC7* newscaster Marc Brown received the Joseph M. Quinn Lifetime Achievement Award, and writer Bari Weiss was given the Daniel Pearl Award for Courage and Integrity in Journalism.

The Press Club also created a new honor, the Guardian Award, marking contributions to

press freedom. Josie Huang of KPCC was the recipient.

COVID never ceased to present hurdles. In February, a surge turned the National Arts and Entertainment Awards from an in-person to a virtual event. A highlight was the Veritas Award, an honor for best movie inspired by real-life people and events, going to King Richard. Director Reinaldo Marcus Green, and producers Tim White, Trevor White and Isha Price (sister of Venus and Serena) accepted the

Throughout the year, the Press Club also continued to recognize and support press rights and the people advocating for them. We joined a coalition of organizations that spoke out about mistreatment of journalists and helped convince California lawmakers to pass new protections for media in the field. The measure was signed into law last October.

With the protections in place, the Press Club held a seminar with experts who provided training on how journalists should respond if they encounter resistance from law enforce-



ment organizations while covering a story.

Another training session focused on how to recognize signs of burnout, and how to address it. Additionally, the Press Club provided ongoing art classes to members looking for a creative outlet.

Another focus for the Press Club is nurturing the next generation of journalists. In February the early-career mentorship program, the Foot in the Door Fellowship, selected five new journalists, and is helping them navigate their careers. Additionally, two impressive journalism students became the first recipients of the Tony Ross Scholarship.

The coming year could be even bigger. The Press Club recently moved into new office space near downtown LA in a building that has a 100-seat theater for live events. Stay tuned for details.

# Meet the Foot in the Door Fellows

The Press Club Continues to Nurture a New Generation of Journalists

The Los Angeles Press Club's Foot in the Door Fellowship is focused on building connections for a new generation of journalists. The program pairs five journalists, from communities historically excluded from the media, with newsroom veterans who provide one-on-one mentoring for six months. The Press Club also introduces the Fellows to other working journalists who offer advice on covering beats and breaking into the industry. Since joining the program in February, current Fellows have met with journalists from such outlets as the Los Angeles Times, LA Weekly, Spectrum News 1, Indiewire, The Hollywood Reporter, Chalkbeat, the San Francisco Chronicle, CBS and the Center for Public Integrity. Fellows also receive a \$2,000 stipend, sponsored by the Hollywood Foreign Press Association.

Professionals who would like to serve as mentors, take

informational calls, contribute monetarily, or pass along an entry-level job posting can email info@lapressclub.org. This year's mentors were Tonya Mosley of *NPR*; Shana Nys Dambrot of *LA Weekly*; Jim Rainey of the *LA Times*; Emily Elena Dugdale of *KPCC/LAist*; and Catalina Villegas of *Spectrum News* 1.

The Foot in the Door Fellowship Committee consists of Nic Cha Kim of *KCET*, Brittany Levine Beckman of the *LA Times*, Villagas and Dugdale. The next Fellowship round will kick off in February. Applications will open in November on the Press Club's website.

# The New Rappleye Award and Reporting on Systemic Racism Grant Recipients

Announcing Those Who Will Get Funding for Ambitious Projects

In the effort to allow journalists to do important work, the Los Angeles Press Club continues to fund two timely programs: the Charles M. Rappleye Investigative Journalism Award, and the Reporting on Systemic Racism Grant.

The Rappleye prize, which ranges from \$1,000 to \$5,000, is awarded twice a year to a working journalist or team in need of resources, whether financial or in-kind. More than one grant may be awarded in a given period. Applicants with an urgent need may receive interim grants outside the regular award cycle.

The grant is named for the late Los Angeles editor and journalist Charles Rappleye, and aims to support nextlevel investigative research for ongoing

projects. Rappleye was known for his work at *LA Weekly* and *LA CityBeat*, as well as his non-fiction books, including *Sons of Providence: The Brown Brothers, the Slave Trade, and the American Revolution*, which received the George Washington Book Prize. He also cofounded, with his wife, Tulsa Kinney, LA's respected art magazine *Artillery*. The two newest recipients of the Rappleye Award are Molly O'Toole and

**Molly O'Toole** is a Pulitzer Prizewinning reporter based in Washington, D.C. She is currently working on her book *The Route*, a narrative of the new

She is an immigration and security reporter for the *Los Angeles Times*, and recently was the Distinguished Visiting Journalist at Cornell University. O'Toole has covered migration and security from Latin America, West Africa, the Middle East, the Gulf and South Asia for the *Times*, *Foreign Policy*, *Washington Post* and others. She was awarded the first-ever Pulitzer Prize in audio reporting in 2020 with "This American Life" and Emily Green of *Vice*.

**Donnell Alexander** is a non-fiction storyteller based in Los Angeles. His reporting and analysis has appeared in

Grantland, Leafly, Might, Rolling Stone, Time, Weedmaps, and Capital and Main, among other outlets. He is the author of the 2003 memoir Ghetto Celebrity and the originator of the animated short film Dock Ellis & the LSD No-No. Alexander is doing a deep dive into the world of an ambitious politician tied to the weed industry, as well as into a federal corruption investigation full of twists and unique characters.

Systemic Racism Grant Recipients

**Gabbrielle "Gabb" Schivone** is a freelance investigative reporter and writer who focuses on illuminating the dark side of public policy, from policing to gun violence to privatized education. Most recently, Schivone's long-term reporting project into the leftist radi-

calization of police forces has been gaining interest from editors and journalism foundation granters, and now is the subject of a book project: Rebel Cops: The Social Movements That Have Inspired Police to Betray the Badge, from Antislavery to Black Lives Matter. Schivone is getting funding for a multi-media project exploring the racism and unequal treatment within police departments against minority police officers, and what is being done to combat it.

Aitana Vargas is a Columbia University graduate and an award-winning foreign correspondent passionate about investigative journalism and social justice issues. Her work has mostly appeared on Spanish-language TV Networks and digital media outlets, including Univision and Hoy Los Ángeles. In 2013, her two-part investigative series exposing abuse in the entertainment industry was nominated for the Livingston Award. Vargas wants to explore the embedded racism in LAPD data-driven policing tools, such as PredPol and LASER, and explain what went wrong, as well as the role of community groups and activists that led to the dismantling of the programs.

# First Tony Ross Scholarship Recipients Announced

Los Angeles Press Club and Richard Ross Partner to Help Young Journalists

ast year, Richard Ross partnered with the Los
Angeles Press Club to create the Tony Ross Scholarship, named for his late son, Anthony Darrow Ross. Now the first two recipients have been chosen: Victoria Valenzuela and River Simard.

Richard Ross graduated from USC Law School in 1959. After the unexpected death of his wife, Lorrie, the following year, he left a promising career in entertainment law and took a position as a Deputy District Attorney, which allowed him more time to be with and care for his 8-month-old son Tony.

Tony was an intelligent, creative and charismatic young man who had a strong interest in journalism. He worked as a reporter and then as an editor for his high school newspaper, and won various journalism awards. He served as the news anchor for his school's TV station and had a summer internship as a reporter with *KCOP-13*. He attended Wesleyan University and planned to embark upon a career in journalism, but during his sophomore year, after a series of personal losses, Tony took his own life in a remote area of a state park in South Carolina.

Richard changed careers, earning a doctorate in clinical psychology and serving as a Hearing Referee in the Mental Health Department of Los Angeles Superior Court. He is affiliated with the Didi Hirsch Suicide Prevention Center and has contributed to their programs, offering support to other survivors of suicide, as well as their ongoing efforts in suicide prevention.

Richard, who is retired, established the scholarship to support young people interested in journalism. He believes nothing is more important to the survival of our democracy than a free and inquiring press.

Two \$5,000 scholarships will be awarded to student journalists in Southern California

each year. Here is more information about the first two recipients.

#### Victoria Valenzuela

Valenzuela, currently a senior at the University of Southern California pursuing a degree in English, is determined to become a "truth-telling" journalist. Born in Hacienda Heights, she has already overcome many challenges,



including being diagnosed with bipolar disorder, and becoming pregnant as a teenager.

She has faced other hurdles. Two months before she turned 16, her father was arrested and faced a life sentence in prison. She remembers the phone calls that bombarded her home from journalists and news stations asking for a statement from the family. That experience shaped her journalistic outlook: As she moves forward, she aims to keep in mind the importance of respecting people's personal lives and perspectives.

Valenzuela has nearly completed her undergraduate education while

taking care of her son—she is a full-time single mom. But responsibility is ingrained in her. After her father was arrested, she helped take care of siblings and cooked meals, all while learning to navigate her own life.

Valenzuela hopes to carry the responsibility and determination she has accumulated forward and into her career as a journalist.

#### **River Simard**

Simard's passion for journalism emerged in the sixth grade, when he decided he wanted to tell both big and small stories. Born in 2003 in Studio City, he was only 16 when his mother and sister temporarily moved to Massachusetts to take care of his disabled grandparents, and his father moved to Louisiana to work on a TV show. Simard became his own guardian even before he was a legal adult.



A natural leader, Simard became the editor-in-chief of his school newspaper, and motivated other teens in the Los Angeles area to become more politically active. In 2018 he was part of a group that organized a protest called "No Guns L.A.," following a spate of school shootings. The work included writing his very first media advisory and sending it to every outlet he could find. The experience taught Simard how special it is to carry such an important conversation and spread the message.

Simard is currently studying International and Global Studies at Brandeis University. He dreams of becoming an international journalist, covering either Middle East or European relations. He write for his college newspaper, *The Justice*

os Angeles-based attorney Susan E. Seager is a champion for the First ✓Amendment rights of journalists. The Adjunct Professor of Law, and head of the Press Freedom and Transparency practice at the Intellectual Property, Arts and Technology Clinic at the University of California at Irvine, Seager is at the forefront of protecting journalists—pro bono—in their dogged pursuit of the

Whether it is representing journalists in their fight to obtain court documents, or helping them gain access to public trials, Seager upholds and supports the

rights of emerging independent newsrooms. In honor of that work, the Los Angeles Press Club tonight is presenting Seager with the Guardian Award for Contributions to Press Freedom.

Seager recognizes that some of the cushions of the past no longer exist.

"A lot of the big papers and big publications, their profits have shrunk, and so they don't spend money on fighting the same battles they used to fight in get them to, for example, release documents," says Seager. "[Journalists] are really in the trenches, getting documents

and writing great stories. So I feel like I am filling a little bit of a void, and that's really satisfying."

Seager has firsthand experience navigating the overwhelming challenges of modern-day journalism, particularly amidst a climate of fiery, anti-media bias. Before turning to law, she spent decades writing for local and national publications, including the now-defunct Pulitzer Prize-winning Los Angeles Herald

Seager has taken a unique career path. terms of suing the city or the county to At 40, she made the decision to pivot professionally and enroll at Yale Law

"It took me a couple of years to decide



to go, but I had a great mentor who said, 'You know, you're still going to be 39 next year anyway. You're still going to keep getting older. So don't let that stop you from going to law school," Seager recalls.

She had already taken the LSAT, and had seen United Press International file for bankruptcy. She had also watched the Herald Examiner close. She understood times were changing.

"I love newspapers, I love print journalism. But it just seemed so precarious. I also didn't want to be a neutral observer," Seager says. "I wanted to be more active. It wasn't until I went to UC Irvine that I could start doing what I really wanted to do, which was to be more of an activist-you know, sue the LAPD."

Cerise Castle, a freelance reporter and host of the podcast "A Tradition of Violence: The History of Deputy Gangs in the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Departgral" to her work.

"Seager has sued the Sheriff's Department for public records on my behalf," says Castle. "There are just so many stories I could not do without Susan."

Castle notes that while journalists often file requests, there can be push-



back, particularly when it comes to trying to uncover government corruption. That's where Seager's acumen and experience have proved crucial.

"It's important to have a lawyer ment," credits Seager with being "inte- on your side who really understands what you are doing, the intricacies and nuances of it," Castle says. "Someone that has a burning passion, someone willing to fight for you to the end of the road. And that is Susan 300 percent."

First Amendment Coalition, calls Seager "a dynamo, a formidable force for good."

Snyder has worked with Seager on critical public access and press rights issues. He too is wowed by her experience and accomplishments.

"Her keen insights, deep experience and passion for educating the next generation of First Amendment lawyers make her an irreplaceable part of the press-freedom landscape in California," he says.

Seager still tries to keep a toe in the journalism pool. A 2016 article she wrote for *Communications Lawyer*, titled "Donald J. Trump is a Libel Bully, but also a Libel Loser," traced the former developer's history of suing the press. Penned "between law jobs," Seager calls the experience of charting Trump's liti-



gation failures "really, really fun."

"I went back to being a journalist again and, oh my God, it was just so much fun. And to write it in a kind of sassy way, hard-hitting journalism—none of this two-sides crap—it was so satisfying," says Seager.

"I miss being a journalist, and I think being a journalist is great," she continues. "I have a bunch of Op-Ed pieces I've got in my head that I just haven't written yet. I love being a reporter. Love it."

As her caseload grows, Seager's commitment to buoying the work of reporters remains steadfast. That is good news, because her willingness to fight the good fight is needed now more than ever.

"The current generation doesn't really trust the media," Seager says. "They don't understand our value or how important a free press is, and how much it's in danger."

She has particular worries, which serve to help drive her passion and commitment

"I'm really concerned about the Republicans. They want to use the government to censor the press or punish the press," she says. "On the Supreme Court, there are a couple of people who don't believe in the First Amendment protecting the press at all, and that's very scary and dangerous."

Fortunately for journalists everywhere, this is a battle Seager is ready, willing and able to take on.

# Another Dangerous Year for Reporters Around the Globe

At Least 45 Journalists Died in the Last Year, With Heightened Risks in Ukraine and Mexico

Then Russia invaded Ukraine in February, stories of daily fighting and tales of resistance filtered across the globe. That was due to the journalists who bravely reported from the region. Often overlooked is how dangerous the job is—through mid-May, at least seven journalists had been killed in Ukraine.

That makes the region one of the riskiest in the world for reporters, though it is far from the only one. From 2021 through mid-May, at least 45 journalists around the world were killed; that includes 11 in Mexico.

There are other risks associated with trying to spread truth. In 2021, a total of 293 journalists were imprisoned worldwide (one of the most well-chronicled, American journalist **Danny Fenster**, was released by the Myanmar military). In addition, 461 journalists and 19 media workers are currently in prison and another 65 journalists remain missing. Many others are injured or tortured.

Among those killed in Ukraine this year were two *Fox News* journalists: **Oleksandra Kuvshynova**, a producer, and **Pierre Zakrzewski**, a camera operator.

In recognition of their work, the Pulitzer Prize board recently honored journalists covering the Ukrainian war with a special citation for their "courage, endurance and commitment to truthful reporting during Vladimir Putin's ruthless invasion of their country and his propaganda war in Russia."

Mexico has long been a dangerous place for journalists. Another painful reminder of that came in May, with the killings of reporter **Sheila Johana Garcia Olvera** and director **Yessenia Mollinedo Falconi** of the online news site *El Veraz* in Cosoleacaque.

"The dizzying pace of killings has made Mexico the deadliest country for journalists to work outside of war zones this year," the Los Angeles Times wrote on May 10.

The scope of risk is unprecedented. Even a funeral for a journalist killed in May while covering an Israeli raid on the West Bank turned into a violent confrontation between police and mourners. Veteran Palestinian-American broadcaster **Shireen Abu Akleh** of Al Jazeera was shot to death by Israeli soldiers (others said the shots were fired by Palestinian forces).

Abu Akleh was aware of what the job entailed. A *New York Times* story in May recounted a 2017 interview in which she was asked if she feared being shot. Abu Akleh responded, "We don't throw ourselves to death... We go out and we try to find where we can stand and how to protect the team with me before I think about how I am going to go up on the screen and what I am going to say."

The dangers reporters around the world face are not overlooked or forgotten. Tonight's 64th annual Southern California Journalism Awards is dedicated to all journalists in Ukraine and independent journalists in Russia who no longer are able to do their jobs.

The Press Club also honors a journalist every year with the **Daniel Pearl Award for Courage and Integrity in Journalism**. Pearl was the American journalist and bureau chief for the *Wall Street Journal* who was kidnapped and killed in Pakistan in 2002. The award was established by the Los Angeles Press Club in cooperation with his parents, Judea and the late Ruth Pearl.

# Helping Journalists Get the Story, and Get Home Safe

FROM WORKSHOPS FOR REPORTERS TO LEGAL ADVOCACY, THE PRESS CLUB CONTINUES TO SUPPORT JOURNALISM IN LOS ANGELES AND BEYOND

The Los Angeles Press Club is active on many fronts. That includes emerging as a research hub for press rights, collecting case studies and using them to advocate for real-world change.

At last year's Southern California Journalism Awards, the ink was still drying on California Senate Bill 98. The law prohibits police from arresting or interfering with press who are covering protests. We celebrated this victory with a coalition of over two dozen journalist organizations who spent months lobbying furiously.

While it is unusual for members of the press to take legislative positions, it felt appropriate, and necessary, when journalists are not allowed do their job. The Press Club documented more than 50 incidents in California during a recent 12-month period in which our colleagues were abused by police, often suffering serious bodily injuries or being locked in handcuffs.

The new protections went into effect on Jan. 1, and are actions. officially called Penal Code 409.7. We saw the first test case

declaring unlawful assemblies. This was followed by an assortment of political protests in the spring. There were no reports of police infringing on press rights at these events.

That might be due in part to additional coalition work to ensure proper implementation. We engaged directly with law enforcement

agencies, private police consultants, and the state's Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training. A legal memo was spearheaded by one of tonight's honorees, First Amendment attorney Susan Seager, to help agencies understand the legislature's intent to broadly define "journalist."

We continue to facilitate free training for journalists, including an insightful session led by National Press Photographers Association General Counsel Mickey Osterreicher. A recording is available on lapressclub.org (under the "Resources" tab), along with information about legal hotlines, protest safety tips, and a toolkit for combatting online harassment.

The Press Club is proud to stand with our colleagues. We joined a statement in support of journalists who have been inappropriately maligned by the Los Angeles County Sheriff. We openly questioned the Los Angeles Police Department's treatment of journalists at Echo Park Lake in March Club is here. 2021. When the agency's official After Action Report failed to include interviews with any of the impacted journalists, we pushed for further investigation. Throughout, we have tried

to emphasize that police and press are both on the scene to do a job and should never interfere with the role of the other.

Of course, the press has sometimes faced violent attacks by private citizens. Our initial research indicates that in Southern California, assailants tried to prevent reporting or otherwise chill First Amendment rights. Meanwhile, there have been attacks against news crews in the Bay Area, which have often been motivated by property theft.

At least one police report led to accountability. Last year, documentary filmmaker Rocky Romano was covering a protest in Koreatown when he was struck in the head with a leadweighted baton. Fortunately he was wearing a helmet and escaped serious injury. The LAPD's Major Crimes Division investigated, and the assailant pleaded guilty in February to felony assault with a deadly weapon.

The advocacy continues. We have endorsed California Senate Bill 1000, which would require that most police radio communications remain unencrypted (exceptions apply for undercover operations and sensitive personal information). This comes as many law enforcement agencies in the Bay Area and San Diego have encrypted 100% of their radio traffic, leaving assignment desks in the dark. While the practice remains uncommon in Los Angeles, we hope the bill will prevent it from becoming an obstacle to reporting on police

down its Remote Audio Access Program, which had provided live feeds for the public to listen in on hearings during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic. This closure led to a series

of motions in USA Today vs. LASC (Spears), and the Press Club organized an amicus letter to the California Supreme Court with anecdotes explaining how this access helps reporters cover important cases and improves public understanding of judicial proceedings. They declined to hear the matter (they only review around 3% of petitions made) and left the question unsettled. We have continued to engage with judicial and other policy leaders in hopes of eventually securing formal requirements around courtroom remote access.

While journalists might compete for a scoop or to get the best shot, we all have the same mission to inform the public. If you have more case studies or insights, we are always looking for examples: issues with credentialing, inadequate notice of public events, denied public records requests, etc. If you need help with a press rights issue, the Los Angeles Press

# Happy Birthday KTLA and Park Labrea News Two Venerable Institutions Mark Their 75th Anniversary

Tt is not easy to keep anything going for threequarters of a century. So it is worth noting and celebrating when not one, but two Los Angeles media outlets reach that milestone.

On Jan. 22, television station KTLA marked 75 years of broadcasting. That came four months after Park Labrea News commemorated 75 years of pub-

A recent KTLA special looked at the first station west of the Mississippi's early days and evolution. When it launched, there were only a few hundred TV sets in Los Angeles, and Bob Hope introduced the station. It made its name as a news outlet on Feb. 21, 1947, when it covered the explosion of a factory in East Los Angeles that killed 15 people. Two years later, KTLA broadcast for 27 straight hours when a 3-year-old girl fell into an abandoned well in San Marino.

Since then the station has covered everything from the Baldwin Hills Dam collapse to the Los Angeles riots to the Northridge earthquake to the COVID-19 pandemic.

In 1946, a group of residents of the newly built Park Labrea complex decided that they needed a local newsletter. The Park Labrea News started out as a four-page, typewritten newsletter that was run off on a mimeograph machine

and distributed monthly to residents and local merchants. In the 1950s and '60s, it became a bimonthly and expanded circulation to about 1,500.

The surrounding area grew, and in 1990 newly-married couple Michael and Karen Villalpando mortgaged their house to buy the newspaper. They worked long hours to publish a 16-page newspaper twice a month. It worked, and within six months it began publishing











weekly. Six months later, it dramatically expanded circulation into West Hollywood, Beverly Grove and Hancock Park with the launch of the Beverly Press.

The Los Angeles Press Club wishes a happy birthday to KTLA and the Park Labrea News.

# Braving the UNKNOWN From Behind the

Marcus Yam, Recipient of the LA Press Club's Daniel Pearl Award, Has Learned That 'You've Got to Make the Picture'

BY JOHN GITTELSOHN ast year, Marcus Yam chronicled the fall of Afghanistan for the *Los Angeles Times*. The photographer was one of a handful of foreign correspondents to stay and document the aftermath of the U.S. military's humiliating exit and the Taliban's takeover. In May he won a Pulitzer Prize for what the award committee called his "raw and urgent images."

This year, Yam rushed to photograph another battlefront: Russia's invasion of Ukraine.

Tonight brings something different: As the Los Angeles Press Club pays tribute to all journalists risking their lives to cover the war in Ukraine, Yam is receiving the Daniel Pearl Award for Courage and Integrity in Journalism. The prize is named for the *Wall Street Journal* reporter who was killed by terrorists in Pakistan in 2002.

While war is always hell, the 38-year-old Yam said the stories he is telling differ in Afghanistan and Ukraine. The fall of Kabul was a drama of defeat and abandonment. Ukraine is a tale of courage and grace under fire.

The Ukrainian journalists covering the fighting "have balls of steel," Yam said in a Zoom interview in May from Kyiv. "They have to watch their country, their homeland, rolling in turmoil, burned in the physical sense, and still do their jobs."

He has photographed women making Molotov cocktails and mothers delivering babies in an underground maternity ward while bombs

fell. Yam said he has witnessed "raw courage and a sense of humanity that's sweeping through this country because of this war. People have become the best versions of themselves."

Sometimes the challenges are unexpected. In Afghanistan, Yam struggled to persuade his editors to let him stay, including after he was beaten up by Taliban soldiers. He convinced them he had an emergency exit plan and that the story was too important to leave behind.

His work is powerful and penetrating. One photo in Yam's Pulitzer portfolio shows the hardened faces of men looking down at the wreckage of a family van hit by a U.S. drone strike, a crumbling wall at their backs. Yam heard a U.S.





C-17 roaring through the air, and knowing he had seconds to frame the scene, he lowered his camera to capture the contrast of the departing flight and the men stuck on the ground.

"I wanted to try to illustrate the sense of betrayal that all these Afghans have basically expressed to me that they felt left behind," he said.

The picture of shadowy figures backlit by the bright sky exemplifies Yam's photographic style

and his eye for using light to create drama and empathy.

"It's a way of carving out a scene and painting the scene differently," he said. "You've got to not just take the picture. You've got to make the picture."

Yam does not need to go overseas for visionary images. During a 2017 fire in Ventura, he shot an iconic photo of flaming palm trees. In the

After the stroke of midnight, Aug. 31, 2021, Taliban fighters from the Fateh Zwak unit storm into Hamid Karzai International Airport while wearing Americanmade uniforms and brandishing American M4 and M16 rifles and riding in U.S. pickup trucks.

New Yorker, Vinson Cunningham wrote, "The charred silhouettes of the trees stand like reminders that even paradise, unwatered, passes away. The picture, with its violence of color, is a kind of counterpoint to the classic SoCal image:

a sunset tucking into the horizon."

Yam knows his photos or stories will not bring peace on Earth. He goes to the battlefront because he feels compelled to share the horrors of violence and human suffering, hoping he can help bend history in a better direction.

"War is not something you should look forward to," he said. "If you've been around death, you know the smell of death and the idea of death. It does not just linger around, but it stays with you, in your memory. It's like a scab on your soul."

Yam grew up in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, and came to the U.S. at 19 to attend New York State University at Buffalo. He majored in aerospace engineering and aspired to be a civilian astronaut and live a comfortable life. "Get a job, buy a boat, a house, hang out with buddies on Sunday—like the American Dream," he said.

He started working for the university newspaper because he thought it would be an easy way to earn the English credit he needed to graduate. He bought his first camera, and his work caught the attention of a photo editor at the *Buffalo News*, who invited Yam to join the paper. It was a career move that alienated him from his Malaysian family but a decision that tapped into a passion he had never felt before.

"It was a weird feeling, that feeling where the hair on the back of your neck was starting to stand and you just knew this was the road ahead of you," he said. "And it felt like all the planets were aligned and you're like, 'I need to do this."

He worked as an intern for the *New York Times* and the *Seattle Times* before joining the *Los Angeles Times* in 2014. Since then, his work has been diverse. He took photos of Black Lives Matter protests and a mass shooting in San Bernardino. He slept on his floor because he wanted to be ready to work at any moment, to avoid going soft. Editors know Yam can dive into high-stress situations and bring back the goods.

"He outshot everybody," Calvin Hom, the *Los Angeles Times* photo editor, said in an interview. "He's relentless."

Yam went to Iraq in 2017, where he shot photos of drone strike victims that helped change military policies for targeting attacks. In 2019, he won a Robert F. Kennedy Human Rights Journalism Award for his coverage of deadly clashes

in the Gaza Strip. In December 2020, he was promoted, becoming the *L.A. Times'* first foreign photo correspondent. Then came Afghanistan, Ukraine and a Pulitzer.

That honor poses its own unique challenge.

"Now that you've scaled Mt. Everest, what do you do?" Yam said. "I had a conversation with my boss about this and he laughed, and he told me, 'Well, you keep doing that. You rinse and repeat. You keep proving that you're consistent.'

And that's it. That's all there is to do."

Receiving the Daniel Pearl Award is another spur to keep going, Yam said.

"This award serves as a reminder that we have a responsibility to create work that fosters a better understanding of the world and can leave an impact on our readers, even in the face of danger," he said in an email. "I hope I will be able to continue honoring Daniel's life by striving to never shy away, and brave the unknown."

# Christine Devine Builds Audiences, and Also Families

THE FOX 11 NEWS ANCHOR, AND RECIPIENT OF THE LA PRESS CLUB'S PRESIDENT'S AWARD, USES HER POSITION TO ADVOCATE FOR FOSTER CHILDREN AND ADOPTION BY JON REGARDIE

glance at a few numbers on Christine Devine's official bio makes clear her influence on the city she covers: Devine has been the weekday anchor at FOX 11 News for 30 years. She helms three separate newscasts. She has received 16 Emmys and was named by Los Angeles magazine as one of "50 Women Changing LA." Her accolades include receiving the Lifetime Achievement Golden Mike from the Radio and Television News Association.

But for all the information and comfort that she delivers to viewers every day at 5, 6 and 10 p.m., what stands out most is another number and a different source of comfort. Through her recurring segment "Wednesday's Child," Devine has helped facilitate the adoption of more than 500 children in foster

Many anchors do stellar work, both at the desk and in the community, but Devine has gone a step further. Year after year, decade after decade, she has literally helped form families.


"What she has done with 'Wednesday's Child,' to me, may be the most impressive thing any local news person has done in 30 years," said Elex Michaelson, one of her co-anchors.

"They had a great awareness of world issues, and always stressed knowing what's happening in your community, in your city, your country, your planet," Devine says by phone on a weekday afternoon, an hour before getting behind the anchor's desk. "They had the news on every night."

CBS affiliate in San Angelo, Texas. She moved to an NBC outlet in Toussaint, Ariz., and then in 1990 was tapped by KTTV (the call letters for FOX 11). She moved to Los Angeles and became the weekday anchor in 1992.

There was a lot to digest early on, Devine admits, what with fires, earthquakes and civil unrest in massive Los Angeles, not to mention greater national and world stories. She credits longtime station News Director Jose Rios for helping her grow and learn.

Devine manages to be simultaneously strong, confident, warm and welcoming as she informs Angelenos what is transpiring in their city and

around the globe. She carries an institutional knowledge partly developed by immersing herself in the communities she covers—she describes emceeing events in neighborhoods from Whittier to Irvine as part of what keeps her connected.

She believes a key to being successful behind the desk is having the energy of younger reporters and anchors. That complements the experience she brings to each broadcast.

"For example, during the most recent civil unrest, to have that perspective and history from 1992 is valuable, and I think it plays into the coverage and gives you a different perspective

than someone who moved here a year ago from out of state," Devine says. "In this era we interviewed Rodney King's daughter. Back in the '90s I had exclusive interviews with Rodney King."

That consistency and perspective is also what has made "Wednesday's Child" a stalwart of local news. During the segments, now in their 27th year, Devine features a child or teen in foster care hoping to find a permanent home, detailing their likes and passions, showcasing their personality and speaking with social workers who describe what kind of family would be the best fit. It's no mere interview— Devine works with sponsors to create

a VIP experience for the featured kid. Over the years several basketball-loving youths got to attend a Lakers' practice and meet the late Kobe Bryant.

Child" began as an assignment from Rios, with a bit of serendipity he was unaware of when working with his young journalist.

Devine knew about adoption and growing families firsthand. When she was 10, her parents adopted an 8-yearold boy. They would go on to foster children from Vietnam.

"The concept of foster and adopting and strangers in the home was nothing a newsroom leader," Michaelson says. new to me," she says.

Discussing "Wednesday's Child" with Devine provides a window to her gracious approach. Multiple times I compliment her for using her platform to support families and help children. She deflects every bit of praise, sharing credit with others, from social workers to people who never appear on screen. This happens again when she discusses

receiving the President's Award.

"It really is humbling, but it's a reminder that there is a full team behind all of that," she says. "There Devine recounts how "Wednesday's are the editors that edit the beautiful 'Wednesday's Child' pieces with such love. The photographers who get the beautiful visual of a child smiling. The whole team makes it all happen."

Michaelson, who in 2019 became Devine's co-anchor—her 10th—says this is precisely who she is.

"What I've probably learned the most from Christine, watching her on a daily basis, is what it means to truly be "Other anchors I have seen over the years are very focused on lifting themselves up. Whereas Christine is more focused on lifting the crew up."

None of what Devine does happens by accident. She details a schedule that starts with preparing for a 9:30 a.m. newsroom Zoom meeting. Whereas some anchors mostly sit behind the desk, she, like her FOX 11 co-anchors,

is regularly in the field doing stories. There are multiple Zooms before the 5 p.m. newscast, and then another one in advance of the 10 p.m. broadcast.

It's busy, but Devine professes to be "grateful" for the opportunity to rush into the studio when news breaks. Her time behind the anchor's desk has made someone viewers trust and co-workers learn from. Naturally, she again brushes off the accolades, almost adopting the idea that the best ability is availability.

"I think that one thing we can do as veterans is lead by example, and a way to do that is to be a good friend to the newsroom," she says. "Part of it is creating a pleasant atmosphere where people want to be around you and where people want to show up each and every day to give their best.

"We all know that we won't be here forever sitting at the anchor desk," Devine adds, "so I think to show up each and every day yourself is the example that people need to see."

"Today, violence seems to be everywhere in our communities—in supermarkets and schools, on our stages, and even in our houses of worship. We have reached out to Mr. Will Smith to collaborate with the Laugh Factory to release a public announcement in which we will collectively denounce violence and remind the general public that we must use our words to resolve issues, rather







then-peak, and he was like a little brother to the Robin Williams and Jay Leno and David Letterman group of people.'

Masada arrived in the city from Iran as a teen in 1977. He was living in a garage and speaking broken English. But as Canyon News reported in 2009, he was soon working with pros like Leno, Letterman, Richard Pryor and Redd Foxx.

In 1979, comedians boycotted the Comedy Store for refusing to pay them for their work, a dramatic episode in Hollywood lore retold by Cracked: "On the first night, Jay Leno even showed up—in a tank. He was being funny but also sending a message: This means war."

That year, budding comedian Masada

opened the Laugh Factory on Sunset Boulevard in digs once occupied by Groucho Marx. He operated on a shoestring, slept at the club, and showered at a YMCA. He managed to attract a \$10,000 loan from Neal Israel, who went on to write Real Genius and direct Bachelor and many other hits.

Masada decided to break the comedy circuit's lucrative tradition of paying comics nil, and instead split his "door" 50-50 with the club. talent. Masada, Knoedelseder said, "didn't know anything about running a place, but from what he'd seen going on and what everybody was upset about, he knew how not to run it."

The first comedian on the Laugh Factory's

The club's free holiday dinners were originally started to help struggling comedians, but later extended to the whole community, feeding thousands through the years.



stage was Pryor, who refused to take his half Lopez, Jon Lovitz, Paul Rodriguez, Bob Saget, of the night's earnings—\$3.50.

Masada went on to great success, and along the way he launched numerous philanthropic and self-help programs and events. Lewis Howe, author of The Mask of Masculinity (2017), wrote that Masada is "like a comic kingmaker—some even call him the 'comedy godfather." The entrepreneur and philanthropist, Howe added, became "increasingly concerned about the mental state of many of these people he had put on stage."

who for all their talents, Howe recalled, "gave themselves over to self-destruction." Howe added that Masada had, "seen too many comics come through his door carrying private on Thanksgiving and Christmas every year. demons the size of giants."

In response, he launched a free, four-nighta-week therapy program for comedians, with Pryor. Year before last, Tim Allen came in with help from clinical psychologists. He told *Slate* in 2014 that he believed, "Eighty percent of comedians come from a place of tragedy. They in 2020, writer Merle Ginsberg asked Masada didn't get enough love. They have to overcome what made him "such a care-taking person?" their problems by making people laugh."

Over the past 35 years, his Laugh Factory Comedy Camp has served more than 1,000 children from inner-city neighborhoods in a free, eight-week program in which campers are coached by talented comedians. The big-name teachers have included Tim Allen, Alonzo Bodden (who is also the Press Club's in-house comedian), Jim Carrey, Dave Chappelle, Rodney Dangerfield, Jamie Foxx, George

Adam Sandler, Pryor and Rock.


Also on the list of teachers is Tiffany Haddish, though one thing makes her unique. Many years ago, she was a student attending Comedy Camp. Today the South Los Angeles native is one of the world's top comedians. Tonight, she was meant to present the Public Service Award to Masada, but work called.


Masada's best-known philanthropic effort may be the free dinners he provides to those in need on Christmas and Thanksgiving—served Masada befriended Pryor and John Belushi, up by major Hollywood names. As Masada told GIVE Los Angeles 2020, produced by Los Angeles Magazine, "I don't ask them (volunteers) to show up, they just come in and serve You name them, they've been there for these dinners, from Rodney Dangerfield to Richard a briefcase of \$100 bills," to give to the diners.

In an interview with Los Angeles Magazine

"My dad taught me," Masada answered. "He was a very, very giving person. He'd walk home and he'd have a cookie in his pocket for my sister. He'd see someone homeless and give it to them. That to me is what it's all about. It's not just 'me, me, me.' Unfortunately, in the world now everybody's become... everything is about them. We're all together. We've got to help each other survive. That's the most important thing we have to do."









# A Career of HONESTY, INTEGRITY and PERSEVERANCE

BILL WHITAKER OF CBS NEWS AND '60 MINUTES' RECEIVES THE QUINN AWARD FOR LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT

BY ALEX BEN BLOCK n 1987, Bill Whitaker was sent on assignment 30 miles from the Atlanta bureau of CBS News. His destination was all-white Forsyth County, Georgia, where about 1,500 Black and white protesters marched because the local government kept African Americans from moving there. They were confronted by angry counterprotesters, including hooded Ku Klux Klan members, many shouting the N-word and throwing rocks as police struggled to keep them apart.

Whitaker knew that at an earlier march, protesters had been badly beaten.

"The next week, there was a huge rally of people marching, saying, 'You cannot be this racist in the late 20th century,'" recalls Whitaker, then 36 and in his third year as a CBS network correspondent. "And there was a point where I got separated from everybody.

"I ended up in the crowd of racists," recalls Whitaker, "people who were calling me out, threatening me."

Whitaker was "jostled a bit," though not harmed. Still, he never forgot that day.

"You just saw that this issue is so raw it animates our worst instincts," he says. "It is in many ways the defining issue we've been grappling with from the beginning of this country. And we still haven't gotten there."

That moment 35 years ago gave Whitaker a new sense of mission, one that continues to this day: "I must do all I can to help this dialogue, to help people understand that we are one—Black, brown, Asian, Native American—to understand this is our country. And if I, as a journalist, can



do anything to help us work our way through this, hear each other, talk to each other, then I've done a good job."

In the years since with CBS News—and after 2014 as the second African-American correspondent on "60 Minutes"—Whitaker has covered all kinds of stories, all over America and around the world. In the early 1990s Whitaker worked in Tokyo as a CBS News correspondent where he reported on stories throughout Asia, including the pro-democracy uprising in Tiananmen Square. When he moved to Los Angeles, he spent more than two decades reporting for CBS Evening News and had a front row seat to major news stories like the O.J. Simpson trial, multiple presidential campaigns and interviewed prominent figures like ex-boxer Mike Tyson and Barbara Streisand. During his time with CBS News, Whitaker has covered wars in Afghanistan and Svria, the funeral of Nelson Mandela in South



Africa, the earthquake in Haiti and more. When Whitaker joined "60 Minutes," he continued to take a wide approach in finding stories and has reported on subjects ranging from the surge in mail-in voting ballots, El Chapo's escape and the development of the Pfizer-BioNTech Covid vaccine to traveling by horseback down the longest running cattle drive in the United States and interviewing Rita Moreno.

Tonight, he is being honored with the Joseph M. Quinn Award for Lifetime Achievement at the Los Angeles Press Club's 64th annual Southern California Journalism Awards.

"The depth of Whitaker's reporting on a wide range of important issues has provided a valuable public service," says Press Club President Lisa Richwine. "Pieces on the opioid crisis and generic drugs, in particular, exposed behavior that made me wonder, 'How did they think they could

get away with that?' Whitaker's reporting helped make sure they didn't."

It's not hard to find people in awe of Whitaker's work. That includes his bosses.

"Bill Whitaker's reporting and storytelling is unmistakable," says Bill Owens, executive producer of "60 Minutes." "Bill is drawn to the most serious subjects of our time, bringing decades of experience to find the truth while educating our audience. Bill Whitaker's name belongs in the same breath as every legendary reporter who has ever worked for '60 Minutes.'"

William Whitaker II was born in Philadelphia on Aug. 26, 1951, and grew up in nearby Media, Penn. But the work that he would do covering racial justice was set in place seven years before.

In 1944, his mother, Marie V. Whitaker, accompanied by an African-American friend carrying her baby, was refused service at a local restaurant. Two white

the discrimination and invited them to a different restaurant. That led to the founding of the Media Fellowship

led to the founding of the Media Fellowship House. Its mission, "to promote understanding and acceptance of

all people without regard to race, culture, gender, age or disabilities," continues today.

"She was a nice woman and sort of turned that into her superpower," says Whitaker. He adds, "We moved our church affiliation from a Black church to a white church in the mid-50s. When this family of five well-scrubbed Black people showed up there was an exodus of the members. They wouldn't pray with us. Or sit next to us.

"I was aware of what was going on, but my mother sat in the same pew for the next 50 years and watched the church fall and rise up again around her," remembers Whitaker. "When she passed away, the church was full of people who came to say farewell to Marie Whitaker. And it was a diverse crowd."

When her son was invited to guest host "Jeopardy" for two weeks in May 2021, his choice of a charity to support was the Fellowship House.

Whitaker's father, William (the first), was also a civil rights advocate. The elder Whitaker attended the first March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom in 1963, where he heard Martin Luther King, Jr. deliver his "I Have a Dream" speech."

"They raised us to be proud of who we are," says Whitaker. "Both of them were very smart and both pushed education on all the children. One of my sisters is a lawyer, one was an executive in a corporation, and I'm a journalist. They said don't believe what the outside world is telling you about yourself. Know yourself and know who you are and what you can do. And don't be stopped."


Despite his fame, Whitaker has kept his personal life private, and remains at heart a family man. He has been married to his wife, Terry, for almost 40 years. His son William III, now 34, started a financial company in New York City. His daughter Lesley, 32, joined a video game start-up in Berlin, Germany.

"She's loving it," says her proud dad.

Whitaker's advice to young journalists is to recognize that this moment in history calls for "serious journalism."

"We've got people who don't trust us," he says.

"People who think that just because we are journalists, we are untrustworthy. I think the way to earn their trust back is just keep doing what we're doing with honesty and integrity and perseverance. We just keep at it. Like my mother sitting in that the same pew for 50 years."

The Sentinel and the Watts Times each have a circulation of over 250,000 weekly readers, and WBOK has a listening audience of over 100,000. He is a board member of the United Negro College Fund (Los Angeles) and the Los Angeles Press Club.



CHER CALVIN joined KTLA in 2005 and anchors the station's 6, 10 and 11 p.m. nightly newscasts. The 10 p.m. program just won the Best Newscast Emmy for a second time, making Calvin a seven-time Emmy Award winner. On Oct. 4, Calvin launched the new KTLA5 News at 5. Calvin has hosted the YWCA Pasadena-Foothill Racial Justice breakfast event for 10

years, and participates in many Filipino and Asian-American community and KTLA-sponsored public events. Last year, she created, produced and anchored the KTLA "Breaking Bias: AAPI Hate" special, talking about the subject and bringing light to the fears the AAPI community has experienced. She also hosts the LGBT Center Telethon on KTLA. She is the Vice President of the Los Angeles Press Club.



RITA MORENO has won all four of the most prestigious awards in show business: an Oscar, a Tony, two Emmys and a Grammy. Her credits span more than seven decades, beginning with her Broadway debut at age 13. Moreno has starred on Broadway and London's West End, appeared in more than 40 feature films, countless television shows, and

has performed in numerous regional theaters including her one-woman show, Life Without Makeup, at the Berkeley Repertory Theatre. She recently appeared in and was an Executive Producer of the Steven Spielberg remake of West Side Story. She also stars in the upcoming feature film The Prank. 


