





# Bob Barker

National Arts & Entertainment Journalism Awards Are Dedicated to the Game Show Superstar and Animal Rights Advocate



n Aug. 26, Bob Barker died at his home in Los Angeles, four months before his 100th birthday. Millions around the globe mourned the loss. Tonight's 16th annual National Arts & Entertainment Journalism Awards are dedicated to him.

Barker was the host of "The Price is Right" on CBS from 1972 to 2007, the longest-running game show in North America, and he hosted "Truth or Consequences" from 1956 to 1975. He earned 19 Emmys for his television work.

As *Variety* reported upon his death, Barker "was the last man standing in the daytime game show genre at the time, having survived 12 years after its last competitor had been canceled."

Barker grew up on the Rosebud Indian Reservation in South Dakota (his father was one-quarter Sioux). He attended grade school on the reservation, where his mother was a teacher. He became a Navy fighter pilot in World War II, and later started his career in radio, arriving in L.A. in 1950. He jumped to TV six years later.

As the easygoing host of "The Price is Right," he broke talk show king Johnny Carson's 29-year record as longest-performing host of a TV show. But while viewers trusted and loved him for his TV work, he was also famed and respected for his deep conviction to animal rights.

Barker and his late wife, Dorothy Jo, embraced a vegetarian lifestyle. He marched on Fifth Avenue to protest fur sales, financed an anti-whaling ship for the Sea Shepherd Society, and quit his hosting gigs at the Miss USA and Miss Universe pageants because contestants intended to wear fur coats. He routinely asked viewers of "The Price is Right" to spay and neuter their pets.

In 2015, Barker received the Press Club's Legend Award. The tribute book that year stated, "If there were a Mt. Rushmore for television game show hosts, there's no doubt about it: Bob Barker would be up there."

> > The awards ceremony celebrated local broadcast legends David Ono and Giselle Fernandez for their contributions to the community. Author Bernard-Henri Lévy received the Daniel Pearl Award for Courage and Integrity in Journalism.

> > The club also honored comedian John Leguizamo for promoting Latino culture in the media, and actor Gary Sinise for his support of veterans. Los Angeles Times reporter Alene Tchekmedyian received the Guardian Award for her unrelenting reporting on the Los Angeles Sheriff's Department, even when the office tried to make her the story.

support the 25th edition of the Asian American Journalists Association's fun—and highly competitive—Trivia Bowl competition, which raises funds for scholarships and other programming.

Throughout the year, the Club provided scholarships and grants to fund important reporting projects. Two student journalists received the Tony Ross Scholarship to support their studies. The Club also awarded thousands of dollars for the Charles M. Rappleye investigative reporting grant, the Reporting on Systemic Racism Grant, and the A-Mark Foundation grant for Reporting on Misinformation and Disinformation.

Additionally, the Club provided education

for journalists, including a tip sheet for members of the media on how to safely cover protests and to know their rights at a demonstration.

A year ago, the National Arts & Entertainment Journalism Awards honored Frozen filmmaker and Walt Disney Animation Studios Chief Creative Officer Jennifer Lee

In October, the Press Club was thrilled to and country music legend Tanya Tucker with the Distinguished Storyteller Award. Ryan Seacrest accepted the Luminary Award just before dashing back to the set of "American Idol." Business mogul Byron Allen gave a passionate speech about the importance of the media, and Marla Gibbs charmed the crowd with stories from her legendary career.

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# Ava DuVernay Visionary Award Postponed



very journalist knows that a story can change quickly and unexpectedly, forcing a scramble—and numerous rewrites—to make sure the public has the most up-to-date information. It turns out, the same holds true for the 16th annual National Arts & Entertainment Journalism Awards.

If you received the Los Angeles Press Club emails, or looked at the website in recent weeks, then you saw that esteemed filmmaker Ava DuVernay was slated to receive the Visionary Award for Humanitarian Work. She had been locked in for many months—and then world events intervened.

Here's what happened: DuVernay is a member of the Board of Governors of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences, and as part of her duties was scheduled to attend the Academy Museum Gala on Oct. 14. However, that red-carpet affair was postponed after the Oct. 7 Hamas terrorist attacks on Israel.

The high-profile Academy fundraiser was rescheduled to Dec. 3—yep, tonight. DuVernay tried to see if she could attend both events, but it's logistically impossible. And she opted not to take the awkward step of accepting the Visionary Award by video.





READING ADVOCATE RECEIVES THE LA PRESS CLUB'S DISTINGUISHED STORYTELLER AVVARD

THE ACTOR, DIRECTOR, PODCASTER AND LISTENING. to LeVar

n nearly 50 years of performances, LeVar Burton has explored the world of literature, enslavement, the Black experience in America, and even the stars.

He has acted, directed, podcasted, been a game show host, authored a novel and advocated for an end to book bans. Yet for all of the varied genres and formats Burton has inhabited, he feels most at home reading aloud.

"There's something really magical about that for me. It's even more ephemeral than the theater

in terms of creating a moment of community with I know nothing an audience," he said.

Burton, 66, has connected readers, viewers and listeners across generations with books, first as the host of PBS show "Reading Rainbow" from 1983 to 2006, and later on his short fiction-focused podcast "LeVar Burton Reads." The show, launched in 2017, also became a live tour.

Tonight, Burton is receiving the Los Angeles Press Club's Distinguished Storyteller Award for Excellence in Storytelling Outside Journalism. It honors the breadth of his work, the range of audiences he has reached and the positive impact he has had on child literacy.

Born in West Germany and raised in California, Burton spent his childhood aspiring to become a Catholic priest. During his teen years at seminary school, Burton realized he craved a different kind of storvtelling.

"I wanted to be in the world," he said. He recalled thinking, "There's a whole world out there that



about and I want to know everything I can about it, and I'm not going to be able to do it by putting on a collar and living this sort of specialized existence."

He landed his

first major acting role as an enslaved Gambian man brought to America in the 1977 miniseries "Roots." He was 19 and earned an Emmy nomination. From there, Burton said, he had the opportunity to be more selective in the acting jobs he pursued.

He started hosting the PBS children's show "Reading Rainbow," becoming a warm presence for young people and a guide through the vast universe of books. His hosting and producing work on the show earned a dozen daytime Emmys and a Peabody Award.

Early in his career Burton didn't view himself as particularly well suited to make content for kids, but after more than two decades of hosting "Reading Rainbow," he occupies a status amongst families akin to Fred Rogers.

"Kids require a specific agreement, which is, 'I am not going to talk down to you. I'm going to treat you like a human being and we're going to get along fine," Burton said.

Burton was cast as Geordi La Forge in "Star Trek: The Next Generation," portraying a blind lieutenant who wore a prosthetic visor to help him see. The role, which he played from the start of the series in 1987, and in subsequent "Star Trek" films, also gave him an opportunity to direct.

He later directed episodes of the TV show "Charmed," the Disney Channel Original Movie "Smart House" and "The Tiger Woods Story," among others.

He went on to host and executive produce the 2007 documentary The Science of Peace, appeared in a wide range of TV series, and even hosted the



> *Imagination*, was published in 2021 Burton said he relishes the diversity of his career. "I have all of these spokes on my wheel. No two days look the same for me," he said.

> Burton has let his sense of humor guide some of his work: He played a ghost of himself in a 2010 episode of "Tim and Eric Awesome Show, Great Job!" and a funny version of himself in "The Big Bang Theory."

That ability to laugh at himself shone in a 2022 "Ask Me Anything" session on Reddit. When asked if people request that he sing the "Reading Rainbow" theme song, he replied, "I sing it all the time. It's my ringtone.

He was among the guest hosts of "Jeopardy!" in 2021, following the death of Alex Trebek, and made a public, but unsuccessful, run at the job. Not getting the position was difficult, but Burton said he decided to sit in the discomfort of not knowing at the time why he hadn't been selected.

There have been many more successes, including on the personal front. Burton has two adult



children. In 1992, he married Stephanie Cozart Burton, and they have a daughter, Michaela "Mica"

This year, Burton served as honorary chair of the public advocacy effort Banned Books Week, criticizing what he called "misguided efforts toward censorship" nationwide. The American Library Federation found documented challenges to 1,915 unique titles between January and August 30, a 20 percent increase from the same period a year earlier. Last year the organization saw the highest number of book challenges since it began compiling data two decades ago.

Burton's advice on changing that trend: "Vote. Vote. Vote. Vote. Vote.

What's the legacy he wants to be remembered

"He wanted kids to love reading. He wanted the world to read," Burton responds. "I am descended from slaves, from enslaved people for whom it was illegal to know how to read, a crime punishable by whipping or even death. So for a Black man to become a symbol of literacy in this country, especially for children?"

He added, "Have you ever heard the phrase, 'I am my ancestors' wildest dream'?"

# Roger Corman Not Only Loved His Audience, He Created His Audience

THE DIRECTOR, RENEGADE PRODUCER AND GURU TO A GENERATION OF MOVIEMAKERS RECEIVES THE PRESS CLUB'S DISTINGUISHED STORYTELLER AWARD BY PETER RAINER

ollywood is made up of all kinds, but Roger Corman is truly one-ofa-kind. From an early age, his love \_\_\_ of movies was total, and remains vitally so to this day.

Over the decades he has been a director, renegade producer, distributor and spiritual guru to an entire generation of moviemakers that might very well never have existed without him. Tonight, the Los Angeles Press Club honors Corman with the Distinguished Storyteller Award for Excellence in Storytelling Outside Jounralism.

As a boy, Corman moved with his parents, and his brother Gene, from Detroit to Los Angeles, where he was enrolled in—where else?— Beverly Hills High School. He graduated from Stanford with a degree in engineering but soon realized he wasn't cut out for the profession. What no doubt stayed with him was a passion for learning how things are

assembled with maximum efficiency—a passion which held him in good stead when navigating filmdom's ultra-low-budget realms.

He started out as a messenger and lowlevel script reader at Twentieth Century Fox, where he rarely encountered a screenplay he could recommend. When he did, others usually took credit for the discovery.

Anti-authoritarian by temperament, Corman went into business for himself in 1954, producing The Monster From the Ocean Floor both the monster and the ocean floor were fake—and The Fast and the Furious (no relation to the current franchise). He then joined up with the recently formed American International Pictures (A.I.P.) under the aegis of James Nicholson and Samuel Z. Arkoff and soon became its house director with such movies as It Conquered the World, The Day the World Ended, Teenage Caveman (starring a very young Robert Vaughn), and the ineffable The Attack of the Crab Monsters. The way it usually worked is, first you came up with a grabby title, then you figured out how to make the movie. Shoots usually lasted no more than six days, averaging 50 set-ups per day.

What's remarkable about these films is how, with a thrown-together cast and script and budgets of near-zero, they nevertheless maintained a distinctive style that made them unlike the movies of any other studio or filmmaker. The reason for this is not hard to decipher: Corman loved his audience. In large part, he *created* that audience.

Hollywood in the 1950s and early '60s mostly ignored the teen youth market, except for "problem" dramas like Rebel Without a Cause or Splendor in the Grass, films that



framed adolescent angst from a socially conscious, mostly adult perspective. If you were screwed up, blame it on the world, or your

Corman's movies, by contrast, which branched out from monsters to include beatniks and bikers and Edgar Allan Poe, were blissfully unpretentious. His works targeted teens not only because that was a smart business decision but also because he recognized that, like him, kids wanted to enjoy life on their own terms.

The one anomaly in Corman's career is The Intruder, starring William Shatner, a 1961 problem drama about racial integration in the Deep South. It's a fine film, perhaps his



best, but it sank at the box office. A lesson was learned: Make the action your text and the message your subtext. Looked at today, '60s movies like The Wild Angels and The Trip (written by Jack Nicholson, a frequent early Corman actor) better captured the giddy zeitgeist of the nascent counterculture work.

Throughout his time at A.I.P., Corman made many dozens of movies, and his craftsmanship increased exponentially. 
THE PROFESSOR, 'FINDING YOUR ROOTS' HOST, AND AFRICAN AND AFRICAN AMERICAN STUDIES PIONEER GETS THE PRESS CLUB'S LUMINARY AWARD BY JON REGARDIE

Then it comes to discussing Henry Louis Gates, Jr., it's almost easier to list what he *hasn't* accomplished than what he has done. Consider just a portion of his resume: He teaches at Harvard and is the director of the university's Hutchins Center for African & African American Research. He's a noted author, literary critic and genealogist. He unearthed several of the oldest novels ever written by African American authors. In 1981 he was part of the first class of MacArthur "Genius" grant recipients.

Then there's the way his scholarly work dovetails with the entertainment industry: Two films he executive produced, The Black Church (for PBS) and Frederick Douglass: In Five Speeches (HBO), earned Emmy nominations. His six-part PBS series "The African Americans: Many Rivers to Cross" earned a Peabody Award. The 10th season of "Finding Your Roots," the immensely popular PBS series Gates hosts, bows in January. The next month, his PBS four-hour documentary "Gospel" debuts.


So how does the man who goes by Skip and who tonight receives the Los Angeles Press Club's Luminary Award for Career Achievement, do it all? The answer is surprisingly simple: He gets his

"I have no embarrassment about going to sleep when I get sleepy," Gates said a few days before Thanksgiving. Speaking from a beach in Miami where he was enjoying a vacation, and as he got ready to crack a biography of W. E. B. Du Bois by David Levering Lewis, he added. 

ter of professors who have been hired and Ph.D. programs created, as well as the Hutchins Center's own 23,000-square-foot-headquarters. "We built this. None of this existed 32 years ago," he declared.

There have been challenges, notably in 2009, when the man who studied and wrote about racial injustice was arrested by Cambridge police. News reports detailed how, after returning home from a trip, and being dropped off by taxi, Gates had trouble with his door. A white woman concerned about a Black man trying to enter the residence called 911. Police responded, a dispute ensued and Gates—who had already entered his house was taken into custody. The encounter sparked a national discussion of law enforcement and racial profiling, and President Barack Obama waded into the fray, saying the police "acted stupidly" in arresting someone at his own home. It would lead to the famous White House "beer summit" with Obama, then-Vice President Joe Biden, Gates and the officer who arrested him all coming together.

While the incident generated outsized attention at the time, far more has been said over the years about "Finding Your Roots." Gates noted that the program had three iterations, starting as a one-off

look at the ethnic past of prominent Black figures such as Oprah Winfrey and Chris Tucker, and then a brief series with a wider set of participants, among them Yo-Yo Ma and Meryl Streep. Audiences watched in large numbers, and it coincided with the rise in home tests that allowed people to trace their own ancestry.

"It blew the lid off the thing," Gates said. "By this time the science of DNA had become so sophisticated and we rode that wave."

"Finding Your Roots" debuted in 2012, and remains a hit. Each episode focuses on a pair of celebrities, but Gates is the centerpiece, serving as the warm, knowledgeable and inviting host who manages to connect both with the person sitting three feet from him, and the viewer at home. Emotions can be pitched as Gates presents each subject with a "Book of Life," the term for the scrapbook of records the team uncovered, and a family tree. Surprises are plentiful; in season nine actor Joe Manganiello learned that he was part Black and descended from slaves.

The roster of people who have sat with Gates is mind-boggling, from Alejandro Inarritu to Anderson Cooper to Angela Bassett to Aziz Ansari—and that's just some of the ones whose first name starts

with A. The real lure of "Finding Your Roots" is that everyone's ancestry is diverse and complicated—that includes people watching.

"You might be phenotypically an African American, you might be Roman Catholic, you might be a Muslim, you might be a Buddhist, you might be of Ashkenazi Jewish heritage, but that's not all you are," Gates said. "It's one of the things you are. That is another important lesson about 'Finding Your Roots.' None of us is just one thing."

That goes for Gates, too, and TV host is just one facet of his life. He is also the husband to Cubanborn historian Marial Iglesias Utset and the father of two adult daughters. He is a former chair of the to? That other guy behind me?"

So really, how does Gates fit everything in? He confesses that in addition to getting his sleep, he is powered by loving what he does.

"I do what I do because it's fun and gives me an enormous amount of pleasure," Gates said. "My father told me to pick a career that made work into a hobby. So my work is my hobby, my hobby is my work. In other words, my vocation is my avocation. I never get tired of it. I can't imagine retiring.

# Barbara Eden's 'Dream' HOLLYWC HONORED W PRESS CLUB'S LEGE BY ALEX HOLLYWOOD ICON IS HONORED WITH THE L.A. PRESS CLUB'S LEGEND AWARD BY ALEX BEN BLOCK

o one was more surprised than Barbara Eden when she was offered the title role in "I Dream of Jeannie." That part launched a career that is being celebrated tonight, when she receives the Los Angeles Press Club's Legend Award for Lifetime Achievement and Contributions to Society, at the National Arts & Entertainment Iournalism Awards.

It was 1964, and Eden had read in a trade paper that producer Sidney Sheldon was testing tall, dark-haired beauty queens to play the 2,000-year-old djinn.

"I thought, well, that's not for me," said Eden with a giggle. "I'm the short blonde who is kind of funny.

Her agent sent over a script, and asked what she thought.

"I said, 'I think it's great,'" she recalled. "He said, 'That's good, because they want you to do it. They've made an offer.' And I said, 'Well, hold it. Do they know what I look like?' I just couldn't believe it."

After toiling in obscurity in movies and TV, Eden was thrilled. She did the fantasy-comedy pilot for NBC.

Then something happened, and Eden knew she had to turn down the role.

"Coincidentally, the very day the show sold was when my doctor said, 'You're going to have a babv."

She and her husband Mike Ansara had been married for seven years and really wanted a child. So Eden called Sheldon and asked to meet. He was at a dinner party at comic-writer Buck Henry's home, but invited her over. They went to the library and Eden delivered the news, saying, "I can't do your show."

"Of course, he was taken aback," Eden recalled. "Then he said, 'Well, let me find out what we can do about this.' And thank God that he worked very, very hard getting those first 13 shows done. I looked like a walking tent but it all worked out."

Eden starred for five seasons (139 episodes) as the genie that astronaut Anthony Nelson finds,

giving her a role that changed her life and career. The series continues to run in syndication and on cable worldwide.

"When you think of the early days of television, Barbara Eden's 'Jeannie' is one of the first characters that comes to mind," said Press Club President Lisa Richwine. "Eden brought joy to generations of TV viewers, making her a true Hollywood legend who is still making an impact today."

She was born Barbara Jean Morehead on Aug. 23, 1931, in Tucson, Arizona, and was raised in San Francisco. Her parents divorced when she was young, and she struggled with a lazy eye.

Her mother, Alice Mary Franklin, began singing with her as a child and remained a strong influence until her passing in 1986.

It was an acting teacher who suggested she enter a beauty pageant. She did and became Miss San Francisco.

She moved to Los Angeles to pursue her career. Her agent suggested she change her name. She became Barbara Eden.

Eden has earned a reputation for working hard and knowing her lines. As "Jeannie," her biggest challenge was working with co-star Larry Hagman. He constantly complained about show scripts and was disruptive, at times urinating and

throwing up on the set, even occasionally refusing to talk to Eden. Sheldon sent him to see a therapist, who in '60s style told Hagman to smoke pot and drink champagne at work to calm his nerves.

"Larry was his own worst enemy," said Eden, "but when the camera rolled, we just clicked."

After "Jeannie," Eden appeared in movies, and on TV with Hagman, even when he was the star of "Dallas."

Over 70 years, Eden has starred in more than 25 films, 19 TV movies, and has performed in Las Vegas and around the world. She has charmed co-stars including Elvis Presley, Bob Hope, Carol Burnett, George Burns, Jerry Lewis, Lucille Ball and Desi Arnaz, Tony Orlando, Elton John and Charley Pride.

Eden prides herself on long-lasting relationships. She has been with manager Gene Schwam for 56 years.

"She has always carried her head above the crowd," said Schwam, "and was never a diva. Through all of the success she has enjoyed, she was always kind and thoughtful."

Over the decades Eden has found great joy, and navigated devastating tragedies, with her family.

She married Ansara in 1958 when he was starring on a series. They had one child, Matthew, born that first season of "Jeannie." He later suffered from drug and alcohol problems.

Eden got pregnant again in 1971, when her career was soaring. Ansara's career had slowed, making her the main money earner in the family. As a result she agreed to a 10-week stage show tour during her pregnancy. She was heartbroken in the seventh month when she learned her baby was stillborn.

Eden had an emotional breakdown and her



marriage to Ansara collapsed. They divorced in 1974.

Eden married Chicago marketing executive Charles Fegert in 1977. She soon found it wasn't a good fit, and they divorced in 1982.


Eden married again, in 1991, to architect Jon Eicholtz. They remain together today.

Eden's son Matthew tried to follow his parents into acting. He had a small role with his mother in the 1989 movie *Your Mother Wears Combat Boots*, but Matthew went into drug rehab a number of times. He got into body building, but in 2001 relapsed and died of a heroin overdose at the age of 35. Eden's heart was broken once again.

Eden wound down her singing and dancing performances in her '80s, but still performs a stage show where she takes questions from the audience.

Early this year, Eden donated the original jar that Jeannie arrived in, and her costume, to the Smithsonian Institution, which has enshrined the series into the annals of history.

"So many people are stuck in jobs that they have to feed their family and they can't find another job," said Eden. "They're unhappy, but do it. I'm lucky. I found what I like to do, and I'm able to work in it."



he Los Angeles Press Club's Veritas Award honors movies based on real people and real events.

The word "veritas" is Latin for "truth." But Hollywood demands room for artistic license to bring deeper truths to the big screen.

The Press Club's 1,000 members choose the Veritas winner. Want to participate? Join the Club to vote (information is at lapressclub.org). Ballots go out in January.


Movies that have been honored start with true stories and turn them into great art. Fittingly, journalism played a starring role in several past winners. Last year's award went to *She Said*, which brought to life the *New York Times* journalists who exposed Harvey Weinstein's history of predatory and sexual abuse of women in Hollywood. *Bombshell*, in 2020, depicted a women's revolt against sexual predators at Fox News.

In 2018, *The Post* dramatized the *Washington Post's* decision to publish the Pentagon Papers and blow the lid off of classified documents about the ill-fated U.S. buildup in the Vietnam War. The first Veritas winner, *Spotlight*, portrayed the *Boston Globe's* investigation of child molesters in the Catholic Church.

The 10 finalists for the 2024 Veritas Award, in alphabetical order, are:

# Pushing Journalism Forward, With Grants, Scholarships and Fellowships

## The Los Angeles Press Club Offers a Variety of Ways to Help Journalists **Advance Their Career**

You know the Los Angeles Press Club for gala events I such as tonight's National Arts & Entertainment Journalism Awards, and summer's Southern California Journalism Awards. But that is just the start.

In addition to recognizing the best in local journalism, the Press Club works to make that journalism possible, and to help the next generation of journalists in a variety of mediums. That happens in numerous ways.

Here are five opportunities for journalists from across Los Angeles. Additional information about each of the grants, fellowships and scholarships is at lapressclub.org.

### **FOOT IN THE DOOR FELLOWSHIP**

The Press Club's Foot in the Door Fellowship is focused on building connections for a new generation of journalists. The program pairs five journalists, from communities historically excluded from the media, with newsroom veterans who provide one-on-one mentoring for six months. The Press Club also introduces the Fellows to other working journalists who offer advice on covering beats and breaking into the industry.

Professionals who would like to serve as mentors, take informational calls, contribute monetarily or pass along an entry-level job posting can email info@lapressclub. org. This year's mentors were Jim Rainey of the Los Angeles Times; Catalina Villegas of Spectrum News 1; Nic Cha Kim of KCET; Shana Nys Dambrot of LA Weekly; and Rebecca Ford of Vanity Fair.

The Foot in the Door Fellowship Committee consists of Kim, Villegas, Ford, and Brittany Levine Beckman of the Los Angeles Times. The next Fellowship round will kick off in February. Applications are now open on the Press Club's website.

### RAPPLEYE INVESTIGATIVE GRANT AND REPORTING ON SYSTEMIC RACISM GRANT

In the effort to allow journalists to do important work, the Press Club continues to fund two timely programs: the Charles M. Rappleye Investigative Journalism Award, and the Reporting on Systemic Racism Grant.

The Rappleye prize, which ranges from \$1,000 to \$5,000, is awarded once a year to a working journalist or team in need of resources, whether financial or in-kind.

More than one grant may be awarded in a given period. Applicants with an urgent need may receive interim grants outside the regular award cycle.

The grant is named for the late Los Angeles editor and journalist Charles Rappleye, and aims to support next-level investigative research for ongoing projects. Rappleye was known for his work at L.A. Weekly and L.A. CityBeat, as well as his non-fiction books, including Sons of Providence: The Brown Brothers, the Slave Trade, and the American Revolution. He also co-founded, with his wife Tulsa Kinney, L.A.'s respected art magazine Artillery.

The most recent recipients of the Rappleye Award are Julie Patel Liss, Gabbriel Schivone and Aitana Vargas.

The Press Club also funds reporting that focuses on effective responses to institutional racism, including works that critically assess alternatives to racist structures and practices. Up to four grants of \$2,500 are awarded yearly. The latest winners were Henry Cherry, Jon-Devin Carrere and Erin Rode.

The Press Club has teamed up with the Solutions Journalism Network to offer a specialized workshop for those selected to receive funding.

Both awards are open to all journalists, with preference given to those working in and/or writing about Southern California and the wider Southwest.

### **TONY ROSS SCHOLARSHIP**

Richard Ross has partnered with the Press Club to create the Tony Ross Scholarship, named for his late son, Anthony Darrow Ross.

Richard Ross graduated from USC Law School in 1959. After the unexpected death of his wife, Lorrie, the following year, he left a promising career in entertainment law and took a position as a Deputy District Attorney, which allowed him more time to be with and care for his 8-month-old son Tony.

Tony was an intelligent, creative and charismatic young man who had a strong interest in journalism. He worked as a reporter and then as an editor for his high school newspaper, and won various journalism awards. He served as the news anchor for his school's TV station and had a summer internship as a reporter with KCOP-13. He attended Wesleyan University and planned to embark upon a career in journalism, but during his sophomore year, after a series of personal losses, Tony took his own life.

clinical psychology and serving as a Hearing Referee in the Mental Health Department of Los Angeles Superior Court. He is affiliated with the Didi Hirsch Suicide Prevention Center and has contributed to their programs offering support to other survivors of suicide, as well as their ongoing efforts in suicide prevention.

Richard, who is retired, established the scholarship to support young people interested in journalism. He believes nothing is more important to the survival of our democracy than a free and inquiring press.

Two \$5,000 scholarships are awarded each year to student journalists in Southern California.

### THE A-MARK GRANT FOR REPORTING ON MISINFORMATION AND DISINFORMATION

The rise of digital media has unleashed a flood of inaccurate, misleading or outright fabricated information across all news platforms. In the past three years alone we've seen the spread of lies about the 2020 election, falsehoods perpetrated during the COVID-19 pandemic, climate-change denialism and conspiracy theories that single out specific individuals or minority groups with baseless and damaging claims.

A critical antidote to this problem is serious, persistent and fearless journalism that exposes and counters

these untruths. The Santa Monica-based, nonpartisan A-Mark Foundation has joined with the Los Angeles Press Club to award the A-Mark Prize for Reporting on Misinformation and Disinformation. Grants of up to \$2,500 will be given to local journalists.

The goal is to facilitate stories that expose the larger problem of fake news, explore specific instances of misinformation and disinformation in social and news media, and hold perpetrators of misleading news accountable. Applicants must live and work in Southern California, and the grants are only open to freelancers or journalists with part-time work. (Recipients need not be a member of the Press Club). Applicants should be a writer, photojournalist, videographer, TV journalist, radio journalist or podcaster. The proposals can include reported opinion columns.

Stories can be told in any number of formats, including shorter pieces; longer take-outs; investigative series; mobile-friendly content; TV news segments or public affairs programming; radio pieces and podcasts; data visualizations and interactive maps.

The total amount available in this round of grants is \$5,000. The deadline to apply is May 1, 2024.

In addition there is an A-Mark Prize for reporting on misinformation and disinformation, awarding one prize of \$4,000 and two of \$500 each.





# Gerrick Kennedy Didn't We Almost Have It All: In Defense of Whitney Houston Harry N. Abrams



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

# Meet Helena Gibson, the Artist Who Creates the NAEJ Awards

ELENA GIBSON has created unique art pieces for the Los Angeles Press Club and the honorees at the National Arts & Entertainment Journalism Awards for a decade, starting with her design for Jane Fonda in 2012.

Last year the awards were "streamlined." Each still has an eye in the top right corner—the guarding eye of the artist herself, at about 3 years old.

For the Legend Award, Gibson has designed a howling wolf silhouetted in red and bathed in the reflection of trees. The purple background is within the outline of an eye.

"This award is very special," Gibson said. "I wanted it to symbolize the spirit of generosity and the

essence of altruism. The passion of red and the harmony of purple."

The Storyteller award appropriately has a speech bubble in blue on the same purple background. The Luminary and Impact recipients get the NAEJ Awards' signature star, this one in red and pink.

Gibson has been one of Sweden's foremost glass artists for more than 30 years. She also creates jewelry and everyday objects at her studio in historic Gothenburg.

Gibson studied at the Glass School at Orrefors and at Seattle's Pilchuck Glass School under the tutelage of legendary glass artist Dale Chihuly. In addition to traditional glass blowing, she works with a technique known as "fusing and slumping." She combines the intense nuances of colored glass with 24 carat gold and/or neon. Recently she has mixed screen-printed photos and poetry into her art pieces. Her playfulness, combined with her sense of artistic spirituality has generated exhibitions in countries including Japan, Norway and Germany.

On a visit to the United States, she became inspired by Western and cowboy culture and has been exploring that imagery in her work.
