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

# National Arts & Entertainment Journalism Awards Co-Dedicated to Iconic Filmmaker Roger Corman...

n May 9, filmmaking legend Roger Corman died at his home in Santa Monica at the age of 98. His fans across the globe remembered him. Media around the world lauded him, with the *New York Times* touting Corman as "the prolific master of low-budget cinema."

Corman was honored by the Los Angeles Press Club in 2023 with the Distinguished Storyteller Award at the National Arts & Entertainment Journalism Awards. Tonight, the 2024 NAEJs are co-dedicated to Corman.

As Christian Science Monitor film critic Peter Rainer wrote in the program book for the 2023 NAEJs, "Hollywood is made up of all kinds, but Roger Corman is

truly one-of-a-kind."

Rainer cited some of his numerous films, including *The Monster from the Ocean Floor, It Conquered the World, The Day the World Ended* and *The Attack of the Crab Monsters*.

Rainer gave this insight into Corman's talent: "What's remarkable about these films is how, with a thrown-together cast and script and budgets of near-zero, they nevertheless maintained a distinctive style that made them unlike the movies of any other studio or filmmaker. The reason for this is not hard to decipher: Corman loved his audience. In large part he created that audience."

The accolades are neverending: Corman has been called "the king of the cult film" and "the pope of pop cinema," because he worked on scores of low-budget films. But he also crafted higher-end

films including *X: The Man with X-Ray Eyes*, a 1963 science-fiction film starring Ray Milland. The next year he did *The Secret Invasion*, a war film starring Stewart Granger and Mickey Rooney.

Along the way, Corman was widely admired as a teacher. He helped Ron Howard transform from a child star to a director in 1977, handing Howard his first directing job, of the action comedy *Grand Theft Auto*. Corman appears in *Silence of the Lambs* as an FBI agent and *The Godfather Part II* as a U.S. Senate investigator. There are many other cameos, a token of thanks from directors such as Jonathan Demme and Francis Ford Coppola, for mentoring them.

The Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences' Board of Governors awarded Corman an Honorary Oscar in 2009 for his support of aspiring filmmakers

Corman will never be forgotten, and his influence will live on in future generations of filmmakers.

# ... and to Music Legend Quincy Jones

uincy Jones was, indisputably, a legend. From his roots as a jazz trumpeter in the '50s to the soaring heights of pop hitmaker and his ongoing social advocacy, he changed music and American culture. He died Nov. 3 at the age of 91.

Tonight, the Los Angeles Press Club is co-dedicating the National Arts & Entertainment Journalism Awards to Jones.

Jones had a seven-decade career as a record, concert, film, theater, and TV producer, composer, arranger, conductor, musician, bandleader, magazine publisher and philanthropist. He garnered a whopping 28 Grammy Awards, an

Emmy Award and a Tony Award, as well as nominations for seven Academy Awards and four Golden Globe Awards. He received the National Medal of Arts, and in 2014 earned the Press Club's Visionary Award.

While his music crossed genres and markets, Jones transcended social boundaries and connected worlds to such an extent that the *New York Times* once dubbed him "a human ligament." He rubbed shoulders with luminaries throughout the arts, academia, politics, royalty and international affairs: Ray Charles, Frank Sinatra, Michael Jackson, Martin Luther King, Jr., Pope John Paul II, Princess Grace of Monaco and Steven Spielberg, to name a few. He established an African American music professorship at Harvard University and presented at the World Economic Forum in Davos.

He produced the best-selling album of all time, Michael Jackson's *Thriller* (not to mention *Bad* and *Off the Wall*). He corralled 40 music superstars to record "We Are the World," a single that raised \$63 million for Ethiopian famine relief. A call from Jones was regarded as a rite of passage to the musical elite, and he famously taped a sign on the studio entrance that read, "Check Your Ego at the Door."

He held producer roles on TV's "Fresh Prince of Bel Air" (Will Smith's first acting credit) and "Mad TV," as well as Spielberg's film *A Color Purple* and its Broadway adaptation. He founded *Vibe*, the hip-hop culture magazine.



Jones used his platform to effect social change, from assisting Martin Luther King, Jr. in improving the economic development of Black communities to global efforts energized by "We Are the World." His Listen Up Foundation and Quincy Jones Foundation have supported global children's issues, civil rights, debt relief, malaria eradication and clean water. He was active in providing relief to disaster zones such as post-Katrina New Orleans and earthquake-ravaged Haiti.

Jones' legacy is urgent at a time when the world is more fractured than ever. "Imagine what a harmonious world it could be," he once said, "if every single person, both young and old, shared a little of what he is good at doing."

onight people from across the country are profile honorees, at the 66th Southern California gathering to celebrate the best in entertain- Journalism Awards. ment journalism. But this is only one of the many ways that the Los Angeles Press Club supported serious journalism in 2024.

The Club this year executed its mission through awards that recognize stellar work, operating mentorship programs, providing grants to fund in-depth reporting, helping those reporting on the front lines of local conflicts, and more.

In June, we feted local media, and some high-



ESPN commentator Stephen A. Smith gave a passionate speech about the importance of grounding arguments in facts. Actor Jane Seymour spoke about her humanitarian work, and Fox 11 anchor Amanda Salas delivered a moving speech brimming with the optimism that helped her survive cancer.

Mickey Osterreicher, a warrior for press rights he's a photographer and an attorney—talked about the ongoing challenges journalists face trying to cover stories in the United States.

The annual Daniel Pearl Award for Courage and Integrity in Journalism was given in absentia to Wall Street Journal reporter Evan Gershkovich, who at the time was being held in a Russian prison. We were thrilled when he was released a few weeks

A year ago, the 2023 National Arts and Entertainment Journalism Awards honored actor and reading advocate LeVar Burton, professor and historian Henry Louis Gates Jr. and actress Barbara Eden.

Also that night, filmmaker Roger Corman gave heartfelt remarks about his career. That would be his last public appearance before his death in May at age 98.

Once again this year, Club members mentored

early career journalists through the Foot in the Door fellowship. The program provides a stipend, networking opportunities and advice on navigating the job market to journalists from historically underrepresented groups.

Five journalists graduated from the program this year, and we are now accepting applications for the 2025 class.

The Press Club also provided grants to help fund reporting on important topics. That includes three people who received financial support through the Charles M. Rappleye Investigative Journalism Award, and two who were given grants for Reporting on Systemic Racism.

The Club was active in other ways. The Press Rights Committee, led by Adam Rose, worked to help reporters do their jobs, by providing guidance to student journalists who covered protests at USC and UCLA. Some were beaten or forced to report while choking on pepper spray, while others had their access restricted. The Club highlighted the instances to local authorities, and offered tips to journalists on how to respond out in the field.

The Club also supported other journalism groups in different ways. In October, we again fielded a team for the highly competitive Trivia Bowl fundraiser, hosted by the Asian American Journalists Association. Our joint team with the Los Angeles chapter of the Society of Professional Journalists did not win, but we did finish much higher than last year!

# From the SPORTS DESK to Starring Role in Celebrity Journalism

KEVIN FRAZIER OF "ENTERTAINMENT TONIGHT" EARNS THE PRESS CLUB'S LUMINARY AWARD FOR CAREER ACHIEVEMENT

evin Frazier's Apple Watch buzzes and two words pop up on his wrist screen: "Giselle Pregnant." He guesses—correctly—that Giselle Bundchen, the super model and ex-spouse of super quarterback Tom Brady, is expecting a child with "the jiu-jitsu guy," Joaquim Valente.

"This is my life," Frazier says, as if he still can't quite believe, after a decade hosting "Entertainment Tonight" and 10 previous years split between "ET" and "The Insider," that his bread and butter is celebrity journalism. "My Apple Watch buzzes and "If it were easy, everybody would do it." it's like, oh, something just happened."

Frazier also has a hard time believing that his work earned him this year's Los Angeles Press Club's Luminary Award for Career Achievement, an honor previously bestowed to, among others, Henry Louis Gates Jr., Ryan Seacrest and Chelsea Handler.

"I've done this a long time, but you're overwhelmed and almost a little embarrassed," he says. "There are a lot of people who've done amazing things and so it really humbles you."

Frazier, 60, grew up in Baltimore, the son of a basketball coach at Morgan State University, a historically Black institution. He expected to follow in his father's footsteps, even attending Morgan State.

Instead of coaching, Frazier became a news man, starting with a summer internship at the Pentagon, where a girlfriend introduced him to the in-house broadcast center. Frazier taught himself to run the editing and broadcast machinery.

He recalls an assignment to protect military secrets when he edited out the sound for a tape of U.S. fighter jets engaging with Libyan forces in 1987.

After college, he started as a local news reporter, specializing in sports, and worked his way up through TV stations in Charleston, South Carolina, Baltimore and Cincinnati. He wrote and rewrote copy. He worked with a cameraman who taught him how to tell stories visually. In short, he learned the fundamentals.

"Every day was a training day," he says. It still is.

If his career goes off track, if for some reason entertainment news doesn't work out, "if everything goes to hell," he says, "I can go back to Charleston."

He served as a play-by-play commentator for the University of Cincinnati basketball team, worked as sideline commentator for "NFL on Fox," followed by jobs at Prime Sports and ESPN, where he hosted "Sports Center" and National Basketball Association programming.

"Basketball is in my DNA," he says.

Frazier worked side by side with some of the TV industry's most illustrious sports broadcasters—Joe Buck, James Brown, Keith Olbermann colleagues who kept him on edge with their encyclopedic knowledge and lightning commentary.

"It's wild to sit with someone whose brain goes that fast," he says of Olbermann.

He calls Stephen A. Smith a dear friend as well as a champion among sports commentators, with a fierce drive to be at the top of the field, like the most competitive athlete.

"He has single-handedly willed himself to where he is today," Frazier says of Smith, who received a Los Angeles Press Club lifetime achievement award in June. "He's like Jordan and Kobe, a different DNA."

Frazier started watching entertainment shows while working at ESPN. It was a diversion from baseball, a sport he was assigned to cover during the NBA off-season that didn't capture his fancy.

One day, a producer from "ET," Linda Bell Blue,

reached out and invited him to work as the show's first African American weekend anchor. They met in the Jean-Georges restaurant in the Trump International Hotel & Tower on Columbus Circle in New York.

Bell Blue asked how "that little sports show" did last night. He said it got 1 million viewers. She said "ET" had 9 million. As Frazier was leaving, he picked up his luggage for a trip to a game. Bell Blue said he wouldn't need to catch another cab if he worked for her.

"It was an incredible line," Frazier recalls. "It stuck with me forever."

He took the "ET" job. It changed his life. When he'd go to the airport, men used to come up and ask about "Sports Center." Now, it's women who introduce themselves. Instead of memorizing sports stats, he's developed an eye for identifying shoe and handbag brands.

"I went from the ultimate male space to the ultimate female space," he says.

But don't get any ideas—he's taken. His wife, journalist. Yasmin Cader, is a former public defender now "I'm no

with the American Civil Liberties Union. She kept her maiden name.

"She's like, 'I'm not changing my name for you, my friend," Frazier says. They have two sons, Shane, 17, and Reece, 14. Frazier has a third son, Tony, 42, who was born when he was in high school.

After 20 years in entertainment journalism, Frazier has a library of memories. During an interview with Tom Cruise, a woman passed out and Cruise caught her and held her until medics arrived. Frazier was inside the funeral tent when Bobby Kristina Brown, the daughter of Whitney Houston and Bobby Brown, was lowered into her grave at age 22.

Kevin Hart really does yell all the time, Frazier says. Tom Hanks "always comes with such cool energy." Oprah, after an Obama event, told Frazier, "I cried my eyelashes off," he recalls. "It became the soundbite that went around the world."

Moments like those are why he loves being a journalist.

"I'm not the star," he says. "They are."

# For Melissa Etheridge Music is Rock Star and activist Gets the L.A. Press Club's DISTINGUISHED Just the Start Storyteller AWARD BY CHRIS WILLMAN

**I** tell people, 'I feel like I'm the least active activist," says Melissa Etheridge, the recording superstar, philanthropist and, yes, activist. "But life has happened to me."

One by one, causes seemed to choose her, rather than the other way around. She has responded by constantly using her voice, and over time the world seems to have caught up—and not just fans of hit albums such as Brave and Crazy or Your Little Secret.

Tonight, the Los Angeles Press Club is presenting Etheridge with the Distinguished Storyteller Award for Excellence in Storytelling Outside of Journalism. Etheridge says she is proud of where she has been able to use her voice.

"Starting with LGBTQ issues, and then having been diagnosed with cancer and going through that 20 years ago, that becomes something that's

important," she says. "I roll with it, and the opportunities that I meet on my way are what I happen to do. I never thought I was doing it more than anybody else. I just felt it was what was right at the time."

Becoming a gay icon when that was not an everyday thing on the pop charts, and then being a public face fighting cancer, would have been enough dramatic grist for one compelling life story. These were, naturally, among the beats in her two memoirs, as well as her one-woman the-

idge: My Window, which moved from off-Broadway to Broadway in 2023.

Recent years have found her active in other areas. After tragically losing her son, Beckett, four started the Etheridge Foundation, a tion.

years ago, she nonprofit devoted to researching medicinal solutions for opioid addic-

This year, she embraced taking a hard look at what leads people into and out of incarceration, a cause that brought her back to her roots in Kansas. With a two-part Paramount+ docu-series, "Melissa Etheridge: I'm Not Broken" (and an accompanying soundtrack album), she took her music inside a women's prison in Topeka.

She also brought several female inmates' stories out into the wider world. The aim was both to forge a connection with the prisoners and to examine the root causes of a 700% rise in female incarceration in the U.S. since 1980.





It's a project of which Etheridge says she is "very proud." She grew up in Leavenworth, Kansas, often considered a "prison town," because of the multiple facilities there. The closest was two blocks from Etheridge's front door.


"When Johnny Cash came and played the prison, at that time I thought that prisons were a place of fine entertainment!" she recalls. "Growing and later in life actually going into those prisons, playing when I was a teenager, I realized that those are some of the people that need to be lifted up by music the most. But beyond that, meeting the women there and hearing their stories made me understand that so much of what's going on there is about mental and emotional health. Taking a different look at punishment and thinking more about rehabilitation, and more about early childhood trauma, is how we can maybe head some of this off."

In her early career, when just being a woman made Etheridge an "other" in music, she faced the

32 years ago now, I would say, 'I hope in the future stop smoking and drinking and their lives change. that it's not a big deal anymore, that artists are just who they are.' It's so great to live in this future that I imagined," Etheridge says. "I love being any inspiration for that. I also love that there's artists that don't music that they create comes from a place of difference or a place of uniqueness, and that's what drives it and gives us all something to move our head to and get lost in."

That flag has been planted in research, including finding money to allow researchers and scientists to provide understanding and relief. The Foundation has started a relationship with UC Irvine.

"The first results we got back are so astounding," Etheridge says. "Not only do these people get off of methadone and these things that they've been using for heroin, but they

As the activism continues, so does the music. even know who I am, and they're just living it. The Etheridge is moving back off-Broadway to a traditional touring circuit, with the aim to keep song intros concise after a couple of years of weaving more elaborate theatrical narratives.

"I came from the clubs, where I'd play four hours The work of the Etheridge Foundation, she notes, a night, and a lot of *that* was storytelling. I never want to bore somebody who just wants the music," she says. "I learned from great artists from Bruce Springsteen to Bette Midler who would take the audience somewhere, telling them a story with a beginning, middle and end. In my life, the middle is where I am now, and if that's inspiring or delightful to someone, that's great."

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# Tiffany Haddish Makes You Laugh

# BUT ALSO WORKS TO IMPROVE THE LIVES OF KIDS IN FOSTER CARE

ACTOR, STAND-UP, AUTHOR AND PHILANTHROPIST RECEIVES THE PRESS CLUB'S VISIONARY AWARD FOR HUMANITARIAN WORK

BY SARAH KROUSE iffany Haddish understands how stabilizing seemingly small items can be: Shoes. Toiletries. A suitcase.

The actor and stand-up comedian, who spent part of her childhood in foster care and a portion of her young adult life living in her car, devotes much of her charitable time and money to providing resources and normalcy to children who are or have been in foster homes.

"Every child who is removed from their parents deserves to have a suitcase, a safe place to lay their head, and a platform to follow their dreams," Haddish has said.

The Los Angeles native, known for roles in the 2017 film *Girl's Trip*, Disney's *Haunted Mansion*, and "The Afterparty" on Apple TV+, started the She Ready Foundation in 2019. The nonprofit offers educational and emotional support to kids in foster care.

Haddish is being honored tonight with the Los Angeles Press Club's Visionary Award for Humanitarian Work. It was created in 2012 to honor individuals in the entertainment industry who use their status to enact social change.

She Ready's Life Leadership Academy helps young adults with financial literacy, job training and other skills that promote self esteem, money management, conflict resolution, critical thinking and career-building. The organization's short film internship program offers youth who are currently or have been in foster care an opportunity to learn about the filmmaking process, from script development to casting and editing.

The foundation hosts an annual adult prom to raise money for its programs. It was among 60

L.A.-area nonprofits that received a total of \$3 million in grants in October from a coalition of organizations including the Goldhirsh Foundation and the Annenberg Foundation.

Haddish, 44, knows how untethered kids in foster care can feel. Her father left when she was young and her mother later suffered serious head injuries in a car accident that left her unable to care for the family. Haddish and her four younger half-siblings were placed in foster care. They remained separated until her grandmother took them in.

Haddish recalls having to move from one foster home to another with little notice, her belongings packed in garbage bags. She remembers the dignity of eventually being given a suitcase, how it helped her feel more like a traveler on a journey than a child shuttled between homes.





She pays that kindness forward in her charitable work. Days after visiting Los Angeles County's Camp Scott probation facility in 2019, she sent dozens of roller suitcases with toiletries and personal items. A luggage and libraries initiative by She Ready has given away more than 5,000 suitcases.

She Ready has also provided books to libraries, as well as shoes, blankets and toys to children in foster care. It has partnered with other nonprofits focused on addressing the shortage of safe housing for foster kids.

As Haddish grew up, comedy became a form of release. She participated in the Laugh Factory Comedy Camp as a teenager, telling *People Magazine* that a social worker had given her two options: the

camp or psychiatric therapy. Today, she serves meals at the Laugh Factory's free Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners.

Haddish has described the stage as a place where she can connect with her feelings and get an adrenalin rush. She won a best comedy album Grammy award in 2021 for her special *Tiffany Haddish: Black Mitzvah*.

Her acting career has spanned the big screen, with comedic roles in films like *Night School* with Kevin Hart, *The Secret Life of Pets 2* and this year's *Bad Boys: Ride or Die.* Her TV credits include sitcom "The Carmichael Show," animated series "Tuca & Bertie" and the unscripted show "Kids Say the Darndest Things."

She has leveraged some jobs to advance

her charitable work, participating in a round of "Celebrity Family Feud" this year with the *Haunted Mansion* cast. They played for the chance to win money for the She Ready Foundation.

Haddish, who journals, meditates and stretches as acts of self care, has shared life lessons—some hard fought—in books for kids and adults. She published *Layla the Last Black Unicorn* in 2022; it's the story of a unicorn who wants to fit in at school, but realizes she needs to embrace what makes her unique.

Her new book, *I Curse You With Joy*, offers a candid retelling of the ups and downs of her personal and professional life. From "making dumb decisions that left me broke, hungry and living in my car" to a time when she was so intoxicated on stage that she bombed, Haddish frames her past as something that has helped her grow, rather than limiting her.

The comedian said in the book that she once hid parts of her life because she didn't want to be pitied but has had a change of heart. "I real-





ized if I hide the mistakes I've made, I'm going to give people the wrong idea," she writes. "There's going to be some little girl out there thinking that if she messes up, that's it. Game over. No chance of having a good life."

Haddish recently told the *Los Angeles Times* that she continues to work on herself, setting more boundaries. She has given up alcohol, exercises more often and gets more sleep.

She has invested in real estate in South L.A. that she rents out to organizations that provide housing to people in foster care. Additionally, she is working to open a grocery store that she hopes will expand local access to healthy food.

# For Kathy Bates, It's About Heart, Soul and Persistence

ACTRESS EARNS THE PRESS CLUB'S LEGEND AWARD FOR LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AND CONTRIBUTIONS TO SOCIETY

Since landing her first movie and theater roles half a century ago, Kathy Bates has won an Oscar, two Emmys, two Golden Globes and countless other prizes. Tonight, she receives the Los Angeles Press Club's Legend Award for Lifetime Achievement and Contributions to Society.

Bates' sustained success comes in a business that can be notoriously cruel to actors, especially women.

"Even beyond her huge talent, I'd ascribe Kathy's longevity to the respect, precision and rigor she applies to her craft," said Jennie Snyder Urman, the showrunner of 'Matlock,' the new CBS series starring Bates. "It's as inspiring to watch the depth of her preparation as it is to watch the final outcome."

Bates has overcome numerous obstacles along the way, including not looking like the typical star. There were also health problems and inept productions. She has always powered through.

"Kathy Bates has made a memorable mark on entertainment," said Press Club President Lisa Richwine. "She is a legend whose work will be remembered, and watched, for generations."

Even after becoming a star, Bates thought her career was over in 2012 when the TV series "Harry's Law," in which she starred, was abruptly cancelled after two seasons. Simultaneously, she was diagnosed with breast cancer. She had survived ovarian cancer in 2003.

"That summer I really felt that my career was at an end," recalled Bates. "I didn't know what I was going to do."

Her renaissance began during a conversation with acclaimed actress Jessica Lange, with whom she appeared in the 2009 comedy/drama film *Cheri*.

Lange had recently worked on the "Coven" season of the TV series "American Horror Story," for prolific producer/writer Ryan Murphy.

"I said, wow, this is a great show," recalled Bates.
"The writing is terrific. I'd love to meet this guy."

Lange made the introduction, and soon Murphy cast Bates as Madame Delphine LaLaurie, the first of five characters she'd play over six episodes of the series.

Her career was back on track, and so was her health after she opted to have a preventive double mastectomy.

Bates received an Emmy in 2014 for portraing Madame LaLaurie.

"That Emmy was a big, big deal for me," said Bates. "I think it was a big deal for them too. Their numbers went up. I really credit Ryan for giving me that opportunity. And it gave me a whole new demographic that I'm benefiting from now. He really turned things around for me."


Bates' first big break came when she was cast by Rob Reiner in the 1990 horror classic *Misery* as Annie Wilkes, who famously slams a sledgehammer into her co-star, James Caan.

That role won Bates the Best Actress Oscar and made her a Hollywood headliner.

Over the next decade Bates found steady work. Still, she felt many people didn't take her seriously.

"If we call ourselves artists, when we say we are 'working,' they sarcastically say, 'Yeah, that's work.' But it takes hard work to get here. They hear you asked for such an amount of money for a job, and they say, 'That's a lot of money.' But who was it,

Brad Pitt, who said, 'You're not paying me for this job. You're paying me for the last 40 years of jobs."

Although professional opportunities continued to come along, Bates felt the onset of age as she entered her 70s. "I think it's difficult in our

society," she lamented, "because we don't have a culture that values old people."

Then, a few years ago, she was cast in a movie she thought offered her a great part—until she saw it. She won't mention the title but doesn't mask her disappointment.

"It really, really broke my heart," she said. "I've been in this business a long time, and I don't think I've experienced anything like that."

Bates had other interests and roles, including serving as national spokesperson for the Lymphatic Education & Research Network (LE&RN), which sheds light on the little known but deadly disease lymphedema, which she experienced.

After that distressful screening, Bates called her agents and said she was considering going into

semi-retirement. Soon after she did an interview that ignited rumors she was retiring for good.

"Then a couple of weeks later, lo and behold, I got this excellent script, called 'Matlock,'" said Bates. "It excited me because it was not just episodic television, which I had done many years ago, but there was substance to it. Madeline Matlock was really on a mission to help the fight against the opioid crisis."

She met with the creative team, and was especially impressed by Snyder Urman.

Her character differs from the folky approach Andy Griffith took on "Matlock" from 1986-1995. Bates' character is more a clever lawyer using her wit and wisdom to solve a secret plot.

She also became an executive producer, noting, "I get to look at cuts before they're locked and give my two cents. I've been welcomed by Jenny because of my longevity in the business."

Snyder Urman values the input, as well as the depth Bates brings to the role.

"Kathy can make you emotional in an instant, and then laugh the moment after," said Snyder Urman. "She can show you the steel spine of Matty and simultaneously make you aware of her soft heart underneath. She can be utterly charming, while being completely underhanded."

The new "Matlock" struck a chord with viewers. After only two episodes aired, it was renewed for a second season. Bates now has no plans to retire.

"You have to put the heart and soul there," said Bates. "That's what reaches out of the screen to touch people. That's what I feel 'Matlock' has done. We're having real experiences about real people."

# The Veritas Award Finalists

RUNNING DOWN THE COMPETITORS FOR THE PRESS CLUB PRIZE HONORING FILMS INSPIRED BY TRUE EVENTS

he Los Angeles Press Club's Veritas Award honors movies based on or inspired by real people and events. The Club's 1,000 members choose the Veritas winner. Want to participate? Join the Club to vote (information is at lapressclub. org). Ballots go out in January.

Movies that have been honored start with true stories and turn them into great art. Fittingly, journalism played a starring role in several past winners. The first Veritas recipient, *Spotlight*, portrayed the *Boston Globe's* investigation of child molesters in

the Catholic Church. In 2018, *The Post* dramatized the *Washington Post's* decision to publish the Pentagon Papers and blow the lid off of classified documents about the ill-fated U.S. buildup in the Vietnam War.

Bombshell, in 2020, depicted a women's revolt against sexual predators at Fox News, and in 2023 the award went to She Said, which brought to life the New York Times journalists who exposed Harvey Weinstein's history of predatory and sexual abuse of women in Hollywood.

The 10 finalists for the 2025 Veritas Award, in alphabetical order, are:

A Complete Unknown: At the Newport Folk Festival in 1965, a young Bob Dylan (Timothée Chalamet) shakes up his act by going electric, and making rock the voice of a generation—defining one of the most transformative moments in 20th century music. Directed by James Mangold. Searchlight Pictures.

Bonhoeffer: Pastor. Spy. Assassin.: As the world teeters on the brink of annihilation, Dietrich Bonhoeffer joins a deadly plot to assassinate Hitler, risking his faith and fate to save millions of Jews from genocide. Directed by Todd Komarnicki. Angel Studios.

*Maria*: Angelina Jolie plays Maria Callas, the world's greatest opera singer, during the final days of her life in 1970s Paris. Directed by Pablo Larraı̀n. Netflix.





Reagan: A drama based on the life of Ronald Reagan, from his childhood to his time in the Oval Office. Directed by Sean McNamara. Showbiz Direct.

Saturday Night: At 11:30 p.m. on Oct. 11, 1975, a ferocious troupe of young comedians and writers changed television forever. This details what happened behind the scenes in the 90 minutes leading up to the first broadcast of "Saturday Night Live." Directed by Jason Reitman. Columbia Pictures.

September 5: During the 1972 Munich Olympics, an American sports broadcasting crew is thrust into covering the hostage crisis involving Israeli athletes. Directed by Tim Fehlbaum. Paramount Studios.

The Apprentice: The story of how a young Donald Trump (Sebastian Stan) started his real-estate business in 1970s and '80s New York with the help of infamous lawyer Roy M. Cohn (Jeremy Strong). Directed by Ali Abbasi. Briarcliff Entertainment.

The Fire Inside: A 17-year-old Claressa "T-Rex" Shields, a Michigan native whose dreams of becoming the first woman to win an Olympic gold medal in boxing, were realized at the 2012 Summer Games in London. Four years later Shields won a second gold. Directed by Rachel Morrison. Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer.

The Order: A series of bank robberies and car heists frightened communities in the Pacific Northwest. A lone FBI agent believes that the crimes are not the work of financially motivated criminals, but rather a group of dangerous domestic terrorists. Directed by Justin Kurzel. Vertical Entertainment.






#### Kathleen Hanna Rebel Girl Ecco

#### Alessandra Mattanza Tulipina's Floral Fantasy Chronicle Books





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# The Dave Behind the 'David Robb Civil Justice Award'

PRESS CLUB CREATES PRIZE HONORING THE LATE ENTERTAINMENT INDUSTRY JOURNALIST WHO ADVOCATED FOR THE DISENFRANCHISED AND OPPRESSED

ver four decades, David Lee Robb—known to all as Dave—was the Dean of Hollywood labor reporters, and an unyielding advocate for the under-represented, disenfranchised and oppressed.

"David always stood up for the underdog, and he always told the truth," said his cousin Kathy Crystal-Lopez, who grew up with him in Torrance, California. He always had a strong sense of justice."

Robb passed away last December at age 74 after a decade at Deadline Hollywood. He previously worked at a series of Hollywood trades, including the *Hollywood Reporter* and *Variety*. He also wrote for the *New York Times*, Associated Press and other outlets. He authored books including, The Gumshoe

on his legacy of civil justice reporting and initiates positive change in the entertainment industry. The recipient will receive an honorarium of \$5,000 donated by his friend and colleague, Anita Busch.

"He was an indefatigable investigative journalist and an important and consistent voice for those who truly needed representation," said Busch. "His beats were unions and legal, but his stories encompassed a wide variety of subjects, including long hours for child actors, set safety issues, disability rights, the rights of below-the-line workers and unpaid interns, ageism, the lack of women and minorities in entertainment jobs, and even pedophiles who were discovered working with child actors.

"He put a spotlight on problems within the industry which resulted in real change," added Busch. "These stories were not always easy to get published, but he pushed to get it done, even negotiating word by word with the paper's lawyers and editors in order to get them published. He was tenacious."

Crystal-Lopez attributes his outlook to the time a teenage Robb and his mother went back to Arkansas and boarded a bus. They sat in the back, but the driver told them to move to the front because Black passengers were relegated to the back. The injustice made a huge impression on him.

Robb was raised by his mother, Gladys. When asked how he turned out so great without a guiding hand from a father, he would say, "It only takes one good parent."

During his career, Robb was nominated for three Pulitzer Prizes. Among the honors he received were an NAACP Image Award, and the First Americans in the Arts' Humanitarian Award for highlighting the concerns of Native artists and performers.





When honored by the WGA for articles which restored the credits of blacklisted writers, he received a plaque proclaiming he had, "pricked the public conscience with his tales of the blacklist years and kept this issue alive."

"He just didn't like to see people suffering," said his widow Kelly Robb. "He was just a goodhearted guy."

Robb made headlines himself a decade ago when he quit the *Hollywood Reporter* after the publisher refused to print his articles about the publication's own longtime Hollywood columnist who was being investigated by the Screen Actors Guild for fraud. Busch then quit as Editor.

"He was always on the side of the little guy, the oppressed and the underserved. He was the protector of the weak," said one of Robb's friends from the weekly poker game he attended for over 40 years in the home of publicist John DeSimio. "He was a living, principled hero."

For the game, Robb coined "Dave-isms," including calling the nine of hearts "The Dave of Love." The term entered popular culture, noted DeSimio, when spoken by characters on both "The West Wing and "Sports Night."

For those who knew him well, he really was the Dave of Love.

# Pushing Journalism Forward

The Los Angeles Press Club Offers a Variety of Grants, Fellowships and **Scholarships** 

**7** ou know the Los Angeles Press Club for gala events such as tonight's National Arts & Entertainment Journalism Awards, and summer's Southern California Journalism Awards. But that is just the start.

In addition to recognizing the best in local journalism, the Press Club works to make that journalism possible, and to help the next generation of journalists in a variety of media. That happens in numerous ways.

Here are four opportunities for journalists from across Los Angeles. Additional information about each of the grants, fellowships and scholarships is at lapressclub.org. There is no cost to enter.

#### FOOT IN THE DOOR FELLOWSHIP

The Press Club's Foot in the Door Fellowship is focused on building connections for a new generation of journalists. The program pairs five journalists from communities historically excluded from the media with newsroom veterans who provide one-on-one mentoring for six months.

The Club also introduces the Fellows to other working journalists who offer advice on covering beats and breaking into the industry. Each Fellow will receive

Professionals who would like to serve as mentors. take informational calls, contribute monetarily or pass along an entry-level job posting can email info@ lapressclub.org. This year's mentors were Catalina Villegas of Spectrum News 1; Nic Cha Kim of KCET; Shana Nys Dambrot, formerly of LA Weekly; David Ono of ABC7; and Bianca Rae of CBS Los Angeles.

The Foot in the Door Fellowship Committee consists of Brittany Levine Beckman of the Los Angeles Times, Kim and Villegas. The next Fellowship round will kick off in February. Applications are now open on the Club's website.

### RAPPLEYE INVESTIGATIVE GRANT AND REPORTING ON SYSTEMIC RACISM GRANT

In the effort to allow journalists to do important work, the Press Club continues to fund two timely programs: the Charles M. Rappleye Investigative Journalism Award, and the Reporting on Systemic Racism Grant.

The Rappleye prize, which ranges from \$1,000 to \$5,000, is awarded once a year to a working journalist or team in need of resources, whether financial or in-kind. More than one grant may be awarded in a given period. Applicants with an urgent need may receive interim grants outside the regular award cycle.

The grant is named for the late Los Angeles editor and journalist Charles Rappleye and aims to support next-level investigative research for ongoing projects. Rappleye was known for his work at LA Weekly and LA CityBeat, as well as his non-fiction books, including Sons of Providence: The Brown Brothers, the Slave Trade, and the American Revolution. He also co-founded, with his wife Tulsa Kinney, L.A.'s respected art magazine Artillery.

The most recent recipients of the Rappleye Award are Ben Camacho, Nicholas Schou and Sam Slovick.

The Press Club also funds reporting that focuses on effective responses to institutional racism, including works that critically assess alternatives to racist structures and practices. Up to four grants of \$2,500 are awarded yearly. The most recent winners were Ian Jones and Brenda Fernanda Verano.

The Rappleye grant is open to all journalists, with preference given to those working in and/or writing about Southern California and the wider Southwest. The Reporting on Systemic Racism grant is given only to journalists in Southern California.

#### TONY ROSS SCHOLARSHIP

Richard Ross has partnered with the Press Club to create the Tony Ross Scholarship, named for his late son, Anthony Darrow Ross.

Richard Ross graduated from USC Law School in 1959. After the unexpected death of his wife, Lorrie, the following year, he left a promising career in entertainment law and took a position as a Deputy District Attorney, which allowed him more time to be with and care for his 8-month-old son Tony.

Tony was an intelligent, creative and charismatic young man who had a strong interest in journalism. He worked as a reporter and then as an editor for his high school newspaper and won various journalism awards. He served as the news anchor for his school's TV station and had a summer internship as a reporter with KCOP-13. He attended Wesleyan University and planned to embark upon a career in journalism, but during his sophomore year, after a series of personal losses, Tony took his own life.

Richard changed careers, earning a doctorate in clinical psychology and served as a Hearing Referee in the Mental Health Department of Los Angeles Superior Court. He is affiliated with the Didi Hirsch Suicide Prevention Center and has contributed to their programs, offering support to other survivors of suicide, as well as their ongoing efforts in suicide prevention.

Richard, who is retired, established the scholarship

to support young people interested in journalism. He believes nothing is more important to the survival of our democracy than a free and inquiring press.

Two \$5,000 scholarships are awarded each year to student journalists in Southern California. The application deadline is May 1, 2025.

# The A-Mark Prize Increases Awards for Reporting on Misinformation and Disinformation to \$15,000

For First Time, Eligibility Expands Beyond Southern California

The rise of digital media has unleashed a flood of inaccurate, misleading or outright fabricated information across all news platforms. In recent years we've seen the spread of lies about the 2020 and 2024 elections, falsehoods perpetrated during the COVID-19 pandemic, climate-change denialism and conspiracy theories that single out specific individuals or minority groups with baseless and damaging claims.

A critical antidote to this problem is serious, persistent and fearless journalism that exposes and counters untruths and the people and organizations that perpetuate them. The Santa Monica-based, nonpartisan A-Mark Foundation several years ago joined with the Los Angeles Press Club to award the A-Mark Prize for Reporting on Misinformation and Disinformation. Now, the scope of work being honored has expanded: The total amount of available prizes is \$15,000.

The goal is to facilitate stories that expose the larger problem of fake news, explore specific instances of misinformation and disinformation in social and news media, and hold perpetrators of misleading news accountable. The work can take on a specific instance

of media manipulation, examining its perpetrators and its impact. Or it can explore solutions to the problem or individuals or groups active in either perpetrating or solving it.

This prize is expanding outside of Southern California this year. It will be open to entries with a California connection, meaning one or more of the following: The winning reporter is based in California; the media outlet is based in California; or the work is about California, but the reporter is not based here.

Recipients need not be a member of the L.A. Press Club. Applicants should be writers, photojournalists, videographers, TV journalists, radio journalists or podcasters. Proposals can include reported opinion

Stories can be told in any number of formats, including shorter pieces; longer take-outs; investigative series; mobile-friendly content; TV news segments or public affairs programming; radio pieces and podcasts; data visualizations and interactive maps.

The deadline to apply is May 1, 2025. Full information is at lapressclub.org.



The *Sentinel* and the *Watts Times* each have a circulation of over 250,000 weekly

readers, and WBOK has a listening audience of over 100,000. Bakewell is a board member of the USC Black Alumni Association, as well as a Life Member of the NAACP. He is a board member of the United Negro College Fund (Los Angeles) and the Los Angeles Press Club.



ALEX BEN BLOCK is an award-winning journalist, editor, author, consultant and media personality. He has been Editor of The Hollywood Reporter, Associate Editor of Forbes, a movie and TV critic, and City Editor of the Los Angeles Herald Examiner. His books include the international best-seller The Legend of Bruce Lee, the critically

acclaimed, OUTFOXED: The Inside Story of America's Fourth Television Network, and the heralded George Lucas's Blockbusting: A Decade-by-Decade Survey of Timeless Movies Including Untold Secrets of Their Financial and Cultural Success. His many professional honors include Entertainment Journalist of the Year from the L.A. Press Club, and the Journalism Award from the Caucus For Television Producers, Writers & Directors.



ANITA BUSCH has been a journalist for over 30 years, working at Deadline, The Hollywood Reporter, Variety, the New York Times and Los Angeles Times. She is now recognized as a Mass Violence Specialist, having worked on more incidents of mass violence than anyone in the

world. She is the Key Co-Founder of the nonprofit VictimsFirst.org as well as the Mass Violence Survivors Fund.



CHER CALVIN joined KTLA in 2005 and anchors the station's 5, 6, 7, 10 and 11 p.m. nightly newscasts. The 10 and 11 p.m. broadcasts earned the Best Newscast Emmy, making Calvin an 11-time Emmy Award winner. Additionally, she created, produced and anchored the KTLA "Breaking Bias: AAPI Hate" special, which brought to light

the fears the AAPI community has experienced. Calvin hosts the yearly event for Forgotten Children Inc., YWCA's Racial Justice Breakfast, and Miss Philippines USA. She is the vice president of the Los Angeles Press Club.



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# Meet Helena Gibson, the Artist Who Creates the NAEJ Awards

ELENA GIBSON has created unique art pieces for the Los Angeles Press Club and the honorees at the National Arts & Entertainment Journalism Awards for a decade, starting with her design for Jane Fonda in 2012.

Last year the awards were "streamlined." Each still has an eye in the top right corner—the guarding eye of the artist herself, at about 3 years old.

For the Legend Award, Gibson has designed a howling wolf silhouetted in red and bathed in the reflection of trees. The purple background is within the outline of an eye.

"This award is very special," Gibson said. "I wanted it to symbolize the spirit of generosity and the essence of altruism. The passion of red and the harmony of purple."

The Storyteller award appropriately has a speech bubble in blue on the same purple background. The Luminary and Impact recipients get the NAEJ Awards' signature star, this one in red and pink.

Gibson has been one of Sweden's foremost glass artists for more than 30 years. She also creates jewelry and everyday objects at her studio in historic Gothenburg.


Gibson studied at the Glass School at Orrefors and at Seattle's Pilchuck Glass School under the tutelage of legendary glass artist Dale Chihuly. In addition to traditional glass blowing, she



works with a technique known as "fusing and slumping." She combines the intense nuances of colored glass with 24 carat gold and/or neon. Recently she has mixed screen-printed photos and poetry into her art pieces. Her playfulness, combined with her sense of artistic spirituality has generated exhibitions in countries including Japan, Norway and Germany.

On a visit to the United States, she became inspired by Western and cowboy culture and has been exploring that imagery in her work.
