



The Year in Review 2011 – 2012



From Larry King to Dr. Martin Luther

ith its robust membership of 400 writers, editors, radio/TV broadcasters, bloggers, videographers, social media mavens, online journalists and photographers, the Los Angeles Press Club had an extremely successful fiscal and creative year, further strengthening its role as the only California media organization that brings together journalists involved in all media platforms.

To provide an environment where we can share our common concerns — and celebrate our dramatically changed industry — the club hosted some two dozen panel discussions, cocktail events, author nights and workshops. These wine-and-appetizer events attracted about 2,000 media professionals and others from related industries, many of whom sought a meaningful break from their glowing screens and deadlines.

The 12 months began with the widely lauded June 2011 Southern California Journalism Awards produced by the club's Executive Director Diana Ljungaeus and overseen by the volunteer L.A. Press Club Board of Directors led by President Will Lewis. The gala drew 450 guests to the Biltmore Hotel. Highlights included the \$1,000 Best in Show prize to Radley Balko of Reason magazine for stellar reporting that resulted in a new trial for a man on Death Row. Top honors also went to 60 Minutes correspondent Lesley Stahl, NBC News senior foreign correspondent Richard Engel and KTTV's investigative reporter John Schwada.

In August, former Press Club board member Rob Eshman, executive editor of the Jewish Journal of Greater Los Angeles, moderated a discussion with two young journalists, Aatekah Mir from Pakistan and Emal Haidary from Afghanistan, who were the 2011 Daniel Pearl Fellows underwritten by the Daniel Pearl Foundation. Co-hosted by the Press Club, the fascinating evening highlighted the two fellows' six-month assignments in top American newsrooms, where Haidary worked for the Los Angeles Times and Mir worked for the Wall Street Journal.

Among our other noteworthy events was the Talkers Forum in conjunction with Talkers magazine, the bible of the radio industry, at which legendary broadcaster Bill Moran interviewed Larry King, who charmed the crowd with his post-CNN plans for the next decade of his amazing life.

King, L.A.Press Club Was on the Move

Hugh Hefner and Dick Gregory drew a sell-out crowd to the Press Club's National Entertainment Journalism awards last November, where a rapt audience heard Gregory explain how Hef gave him his first break as a young comic. Hefner was then interviewed onstage by NBC4 news anchor Robert Kovacik in the incisive style pioneered by the popular men's magazine more than 50 years ago.

This year, focusing on diversity, Gloria Zuurveen, the Press Club's newest elected African American board member, oversaw a heavily attended panel discussion, "What If Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Had Tweeted the Civil Rights Movement?" The distinguished panel included former Congresswoman Diane Watson, former Los Angeles City Councilman Robert Farrell, journalist Jasmyne Cannick, journalist Charlene Muhammad, Rev. William Smart, Rev. Lewis Logan and scholar Anthony Samad as moderator.

In May, board member Anna Scott of KCRW moderated the latest offering from the club's ongoing "How I Got the Story" series. Scott interviewed the award-winning KCET investigative team of Executive Producer Bret Marcus, Correspondent Laurel Erickson and Producer Karen Foshay, who took us behind the cameras to explain how they uncovered lavish spending at the Los Angeles Housing Authority, a billion-dollar agency that provides housing for the poor.

Gala Celebrates Truth, Courage and a New Tradition

ourage under fire and the unflagging pursuit of truth took center stage in June 2011 at the Los Angeles Press Club's 53rd Annual Southern California Journalism Awards Gala. The event honored a pioneering CBS-TV journalist, a dogged local reporter, a fearless foreign correspondent and dozens of other accomplished media professionals.

An audience of hundreds, who filled the Crystal Ballroom at the historic Millennium Biltmore Hotel in downtown Los Angeles, also witnessed the club present its first Public Service Award for Journalistic Contributions to Civic Life. That honor went to *Los Angeles Times* reporters Jeff Gottlieb and Ruben Vives, the tenacious duo who took the lead in exposing epic corruption and greed among Bell city officials. The nationally acclaimed investigative series also led to a Pulitzer Prize shared by more than two dozen reporters and editors.

Lesley Stahl, correspondent for CBS-TV's "60 Minutes" news show, whose hard-charging career stretches back four decades, received the President's Award for Impact on Media. Unable to attend the gala for medical reasons, she put in a video appearance to accept the honor.

John Schwada, of local KTTV Fox 11, received the Joseph M. Quinn Award for Lifetime Achievement. This versatile reporter was recognized for covering nearly every major local story, from school busing to urban riots, starting in the 1970s, and for launching award-winning probes of official corruption.

Richard Engel, NBC News chief foreign correspondent, accepted the Daniel Pearl Award for Courage and Integrity in Journalism. Ruth and Judea Pearl, parents of the *Wall Street Journal* reporter who was slain by terrorists in Pakistan in 2002, said Engel's Mideast reporting "has been pivotal to our understanding of the people of the region, their aspirations and their struggle for freedom and dignity."

Reason Magazine's Radley Balko received the \$1,000 prize as Best of Show Journalist of the Year. Among the 80-plus other awards, more than a dozen were devoted to online journalism, including one for "Best News Tweet" (Imran Jattala, Ahmadiyyatimes.com), and four to youth and student journalism, including "Best Student Newspaper" (LA City College's Los Angeles Collegian).

Actor Jack Maxwell was the gala's master of ceremonies. Among the other presenters were actors Ed Asner, Dan Lauria, Walton Goggins, Denise Grayson, Ray Abruzzo and Barbara Niven; talk show host Patt Morrison; and *LA Weekly*'s Jill Stewart. Comedian Alonzo Bodden "roasted" the reporters.

The 53rd Annual Southern California Journalism Awards were dedicated to the memory of Dick Turpin, the late *Los Angeles Times* journalist and former president of the Los Angeles Press Club.

Bringing Down the House

SoCal
Connected'
Team Earns
Public Service
Award for
Exposing
Staggering
Expenditures at
a City Agency

HEN KAREN FOSHAY, a producer with the KCET show "SoCal Connected," started poking around the operations of the Housing Authority of the City of Los Angeles (HACLA), she had no

idea that she was about to dump a mountain of work on herself and a half-dozen co-workers. She couldn't fathom the gross spending on luxury products and meals the team would expose. There was no way she could predict how her investigation would

benefit some of the city's poorest residents.

Yet that is exactly what happened when the 20-year TV news veteran began looking into a large if rarely examined city agency.

"I reached out to a few sources and found out that there were some unhappy workers there," she recalled of her initial explorations. "I filled out my first public records request in October 2010, and we had to fight vigorously to get any response."

That opened the doors to what would become a 12-minute expose, "The Junketeer," in March 2011, followed nine months later by another punishing 15-minute report, "Government Gone Wild." The facts KCET revealed were shocking: Rudy Montiel, president and CEO of the agency in charge of providing housing for thousands of poor individuals and families, earned \$450,000 a year and received perks including 10 weeks of vacation and a car. He traveled extensively, attending 28 conferences and junkets in one calendar year; by contrast, the show reported, Boston's housing director attended three conferences.

More astounding was the HACLA spending that taxpayers were covering. In poring over six years of documents, the "SoCal Connected" team found that outrageous expenditures were an everyday occurrence. They uncovered a receipt for a \$2,200 lunch for four executives. They found that HACLA brass

spent \$4,500 on Land's End sweaters. The agency's head of media and government relations had two purported Saturday night business meetings in one month at Ruth's Chris Steakhouse. One employee spent \$500 on an agency charge card on two stuffed

pink elephants.

Then came the HACLA officials' attempts to defend the practices. Montiel in March told the cameras that the expenses were justified because he had turned around an underperforming agency. In December

another executive, Ken Simmons, claimed he was following Montiel's orders and that the agency was "flush with cash" at the time.

The damage was done. Montiel was fired, as were two agency commissioners. City Controller Wendy Greuel began an extensive audit of HACLA and U.S. Sen. Chuck Grassley launched a federal investigation. New spending standards were put in place, allowing the valuable resources to go where they were intended—to housing Los Angeles' poor.

"The Junketeer" and "Government Gone Wild" were rare examples of long-form television investigative journalism on local matters. The reports have earned KCET the Public Service Award from the Los Angeles Press Club. The prize is shared by Foshay, "SoCal Connected" executive producer Bret Marcus, correspondent Laurel Erickson, producer Rocio Zamora, associate producers Miguel Contreras and Lata Pandya and editor Alberto Arce.

Viewers of the two episodes saw correspondent Laurel Erickson operate like a pitbull with a microphone, refusing to let the HACLA executives get off easy when they tried to evade her questions. What the audience didn't see was the group effort that went into creating the reports.



"It's a very small staff and it operated like an old-fashioned newsroom," said Erickson, a veteran Los Angeles reporter known for her never-back-down approach. "There were people doing long hours. There was team spirit."

The sentiment is echoed by Marcus, who also serves as KCET's chief content officer. He noted that the staff would routinely work late into the night.

"Sometimes in the middle of the newsroom when everyone else went home these boxes of paper would emerge from dark corners," he recalled. "My office was three doors down from Karen's. I could tell if she was having a good or bad night based on the cackling coming from her office when she would find some outrageous expense that was totally unsupportable."

Tracking the expenses and revealing that HACLA spent millions to fight whistleblowers and wrongful termination lawsuits (KCET reported that Montiel fired three HACLA directors of internal control; two sued) was only part of the challenge. The team needed to turn all the numbers and piles of receipts into visually appealing television.

Foshay is quick to credit graphic designer Robert Vega, whose work included placing the headshots of four executives on a spinning dinner table to communicate the meal overspending. Her praise extends to Marcus ("He gave us the resources to do this") and Arce, the editor, who kept the pace crisp.

The team also took advantage of new media resources, creating an online database complete with scanned receipts.

"You could go in, type in someone's name and see all their purchases," said Foshay. "We wanted this to be interactive. We wanted people to see where their taxpayer dollars were being spent."

MAKING A DIFFERENCE

Generally, said Marcus, "SoCal Connected" stories take a week or two to prepare, and the average 15- to 20-minute report might require a month of work.

The March episode, by contrast, required six months of investigation and reporting (team members worked on other stories at the same time). It was a similar timeframe for the December follow-up.

Marcus, Foshay and Erickson have long track records in television journalism, and all have received numerous industry accolades and honors. Still, for people who have seemingly seen it all, the HACLA expose offered new surprises.

"It seemed unbelievable, especially when you consider this was a time when Americans were losing their jobs and houses," said Erickson. "The most surprising thing to me was the disconnect between how this appeared, what it was, and the state of the taxpayers and residents in this economic crash."

Marcus pointed to the human angle, or rather, the seeming lack of humanity exhibited by the perpetrators.

"I don't think anyone ever said to us, 'I'm sorry, I should not have done this.' It's really sad," he said. "It was sort of remarkable to me that nobody apologized."

Although the second show aired more than six months ago, the "SoCal Connected" team has changed the way the Los Angeles media views HACLA. No longer is the agency ignored.

Similarly, there is no denying that the staff made a difference in the lives of some of the city's most disenfranchised residents. It's a point that hits home.

"It was a window on the world that we should see more often," said Erickson.

Added Foshay, "I think that's why we get into this business, to hopefully make some sort of impact and to lay out the facts and see what happens. There had been so many complaints over the years by workers and tenants. Over the years they felt their voices were not heard and that they were retaliated against. That's always a great payoff to a story."

She pauses and adds, "That's great."





IN MEMORY OF ...

Southern California Journalism Awards Dedicated to Late Radio Journalist Claes Andreasson

LAES ANDREASSON joined the Los Angeles Press Club a little over a decade ago. Most of you have probably encountered his intense light blue eyes and friendly smile. He recorded many of the Press Club events, and won several awards from the club, the most recent one just a year ago.

In his native Sweden he was a familiar radio voice, and then became a popular morning television host. But radio was his true love and he dedicated his life to sound without pictures.

Claes made Los Angeles his home it was a place he loved, where his soul was nourished. He enjoyed American culture, its diversity and even the gigantic freeways—although the traffic jams were an unavoidable nuisance. Still, neither traffic nor long miles ever prevented him from driving his old, weary BMW on story gathering missions.


His travels often took him to Las Vegas and the Nevada desert to depict the aftermath of U.S. nuclear testing, or to the Mexican border to describe the inhumane hunt for illegal immigrants. He had just begun a large project to document Latin American life stories in the United States. He studied Spanish so he could do a better job.

Claes was in the middle of life, tireless and full of unusual and bold ideas. He filed complicated reports on global warming and climate change with the same ease with which he described a food dish or interviewed a Peruvian farmer. He was tenacious, thorough, dedicated and never took shortcuts or the easy way out.

Claes was not only an excellent reporter, he was also a true sound artist, one for whom every tone and breath had its own special place. He was a perfectionist and left nothing to chance. He would rather take a friend to dinner or buy a new microphone than spend a dime on himself.

He was eternally self-critical and often doubted his own value, without understanding how loved and appreciated he was.

We wish he could hear all the loving words said about him.

Investigating In Inventive Ways

His Work Makes
a Difference,
Delighting
Viewers with
His Undercover
Investigations

T DOESN'T MATTER IF they're CalTrans workers guzzling beer on the taxpayers' dime, cab drivers stealing computers mislaid by customers or university officials charging up credit cards to feast on catered meals while the state's deficit soars, they all insist they've done absolutely nothing wrong.

That is until CBS2/KCAL9 award-winning, investigative reporter David Goldstein offers to show them the videotape taken with a hidden camera, or the documents he's pried out of some agency with a public records act request.

"Everyone always is in denial, 99 percent of the time," says Goldstein, the 2012 winner of the Joseph M. Quinn Memorial Award given by the Los Angeles Press Club annually to a journalist for excellence in a career.

Goldstein, who combines the qualities of the curious reporter with the tenacity of a dogged sleuth, has spent nearly a quarter century in Los Angeles uncovering truths that shatter the cleverest deceptions, spins and outright lies public and appointed officials, as well as businesspeople, health professionals and others, too often inflict upon the public.

"I don't know where the detective comes from, but I've always been the kind of reporter who likes to dig for stories. I really didn't like it when, as a general assignment reporter, they'd hand you the newspaper and say, 'We're doing this story today.' To me, that's not what I liked about reporting. I always wanted to try a different angle, to be inquisitive for something more."

While he's caught public officials in all manner of shenanigans, Goldstein more significantly has literally changed the state's legal landscape as his in-

vestigations have forced lawmakers to correct abuses, including new laws to protect women from faulty mammogram machines, neighborhoods from concentrations of sex offenders, and kids from the potential of sex offenders being hired as Santas.

His reports on some law enforcement agencies selling assault rifles or confiscated weapons led to a ban on such sales.

Goldstein, who helped create KCAL's Primetime newscast, says he gets tremendous satisfaction from a job where he has the chance to make a difference in the world, and where he can interact

with viewers who are delighted that someone is catching public officials and others cheating or scamming the system. He gets deep satisfaction from "looking out for the average person."

"That's the greatest part, hearing from people, hearing from viewers who are outraged ...it's their taxpayer money," he says.


Previously, Goldstein worked at WCBS-TV in New York, and also in Miami and Jacksonville. His stories included coverage of the Persian Gulf War.


Despite growing up in the suburbs of New York City and the fact his Mom got to watch him on WCBS, Goldstein said the Big Apple wasn't the place he wanted to live long term to raise a family.

He landed in Los Angeles just in time for some of the city's biggest and most defining stories – the O.J. Simpson trial, the Rodney King beating and trial of the accused officers, and the devastating riots that followed.

His undercover work grew as the size of hidden cameras shrank and the stories got raves from viewers and racked up awards for the station.

"It's an adrenaline rush," Goldstein says of his

time in the field, which can include days of stakeouts, confrontations with angry targets, and stonewalling by managers trying to cover for their employees. "It's really exciting to break something no one else has, to put someone – an elected or appointed official – on the spot, and to say, 'Look what we've found.'"

His work has only grown more inventive as his career has progressed. Goldstein gives a shout out to his colleagues and their brainstorming sessions in

coming up with great ideas, and to station managers saying they have backed creativity despite the cost and time.

He went high-tech, for example, in chasing down cabbies suspected of stealing from customers who left their stuff, including phones and computers, by accident in the backseat. So Goldstein started leaving tablet computers with tracking devices behind in taxis after rides. When one driver said he couldn't find the tablet, Goldstein was able

to track it to his house. Sure enough the cabbie denied stealing the tablet – blaming it on his son.

The risks of his job are obvious, but the air-tight cases he builds with documents and video footage are probably his best protection against a violent subject. He chuckles at the sensitivity of people to television's use of hidden cameras noting that with the proliferation of the smart phone, "everyone has a camera."

Self-effacing, Goldstein says he doesn't take himself too seriously and puts the influence he's had on Los Angeles in the perspective of being "just one (journalist) among many." While he's won a half dozen Golden Mike Awards and been nominated for more than 15 Emmys, Goldstein prizes the internal rewards of the job the most.

"The greatest satisfaction is just exposing things that shouldn't be happening, to get it on the air, to show this isn't right and to know that perhaps this would not be exposed if not for you."

As he continues to crank out exclusives, Goldstein says he's just very happy to have been able to stay in the investigative journalism ranks for so long when news organizations today often look there to cut costs.

So what might viewers learn should the hidden camera be flipped and for a change focused on Goldstein's life? Laughing he replies, "Well I curse a lot." Damn, that's it? Turns out, he also likes to play tennis, jog and hang out with his son.

A Decade

EN YEARS AGO, the world was shaken by the death of *Wall Street Journal* correspondent Daniel Pearl. While Daniel's story touched thousands, few have felt the loss more deeply than his parents, Judea and Ruth, and his then pregnant wife, Mariane. But they have not let the tragedy of Daniel's death overshadow his extraordinary life. Through the Daniel Pearl Foundation, they continue to share his spirit with the world.

The nonprofit foundation honors Daniel, who was not only a well-respected foreign correspondent but also an accomplished violinist and by all accounts a fun-loving soul, through myriad projects that reflect his passions. The organization's story is an unlikely one of transcending tragedy to make some sense out of the senseless.

It all began on Jan. 23, 2002, when Daniel was

in Pakistan reporting a story about the Al Qaeda terrorist network's financial ties. That evening, he kissed Mariane, also a journalist, goodbye and went to meet a source in the Pakistani port city of Karachi. Though Daniel was known to be an extremely careful reporter, the source lured him into a trap, and he was abducted.

For the next excruciating month, Daniel's parents, wife and colleagues at the *Journal* bounced between hope and despair. All they saw or heard of him was in video

footage released by his kidnappers. Efforts by the FBI and the Pakistani police failed to yield information on Daniel's whereabouts. More than once, the family was told that Daniel's body had been found, only to learn later that the reports were false. Daniel's co-workers feared that if his parents' Israeli background leaked out he would be in grave danger.

Judea hails from the Orthodox Tel Aviv suburb of B'nai Brak. Ruth is from Baghdad, and came with her parents to Israel in 1951, where she later met Judea at the Technion-Israel Institute of Technology in Haifa.

In what the *Jewish Journal* of Greater Los Angeles described in 2006 as "a rare display of professional solidarity in the competitive media," no outlets reported on the Pearls' Israeli backgrounds until after Daniel's death.

Ruth told the Jewish Journal she held out hope

in the weeks after her son's abduction in part because Daniel's "goodness shone through, and we couldn't believe that his kidnappers could live with him for weeks and not be affected by it."

Then, on the morning of Feb. 21, 2002, the unthinkable happened. The family received the news that the kidnappers had released a gruesome video of Daniel's murder by decapitation.

Although Daniel and Mariane's son Adam was born several months after his father's death, it was six months from the time

of the killing before Daniel's parents were able to bury their son.

Ruth told the *Jewish Journal* that at the time, "I felt that my life was over." Yet she and Judea also felt something more powerful than grief: They felt driven to preserve that basic goodness Daniel possessed, and to share it with the world.

"We refused to accept the idea that Danny's contributions to the world as a journalist, as a musician, as a gentle human being was ended forever," Judea told the *Jewish Journal*. So in the days after Daniel's death, they funneled the various donations they'd received into a newly established nonprofit entity that would become the Daniel Pearl Foundation.

Today, the Foundation sponsors multiple efforts in journalism, music and multicultural dialogue.

In journalism, the foundation provides opportunities for young and older journalists alike. The Daniel Pearl Journalism Fellowship brings midcareer journalists from South Asia, the Middle East, North Africa and elsewhere to work for six months in a U.S. newsroom.

For younger aspiring journalists, the Foundation offers training, internship and writing programs.

The online Pearl Youth News service brings together students from all over the world to be trained by volunteer professionals and report, write and publish their own stories for the Internet. The program partners with school newspapers so they

can publish articles by students all over the world.

Before students can contribute to the news service, they must complete a certification program that teaches basic reporting skills, from ethics to developing sources and conducting interviews to building compelling articles.

In music, the Foundation has created Daniel Pearl World Music Days, which fall during Daniel's birthday month of October. The celebration has grown to include more than 8,900 performances in 119 countries.

The Foundation also fosters respectful multicultural dialogue with the Daniel Pearl Dialogue for Muslim-Jewish Understanding, a series of public conversations between

UCLA professor Judea Pearl and Dr. Akbar Ahmed, chair of Islamic Studies at American University. The conversations, which cover ground as diverse as current news, religion and history, aim to improve relations between Muslim and Jewish communities.

That kind of dialogue continues at the Daniel Pearl Lecture Series at UCLA and Stanford, featuring scholars, journalists and policy makers speaking on topics ranging from journalism and music

to psychology and religion. The only rule for the speaking engagements, the Pearls insist, is that the tone remain civil and respectful.

The influence of the reporter and the family has extended even further. In May 2010, President Barack Obama signed the Daniel Pearl Freedom of the Press Act. The measure, which received bipartisan Congressional support, is intended to promote a free press around the world.

Through all these efforts, Judea and Ruth have refused to allow Daniel's untimely death to stand as a pure loss. By taking inspiration from his life, they continue to enlighten and provide opportunities for people all over the world who otherwise would never have known of their son and his remarkable life

It is not an easy road, Judea and Ruth have admitted in interviews. But knowing that what they do makes a positive impact in the areas their son cared about most passionately drives them to continue, day in and day out.

MARIANE PEARL'S MIGHTY HEART

N AWARD-WINNING international journalist, Mariane Pearl was married to *Wall Street Journal* reporter Daniel Pearl when he was abducted and brutally slain by terrorists in Pakistan in 2002.

She is on the honorary board of the Daniel Pearl Foundation, which aims to carry on his legacy by promoting tolerance and un-

derstanding internationally through journalism, music and dialogue.

In 2003, she wrote "A Mighty Heart: The Brave Life and Death of My Husband Daniel Pearl," which recounts her life with him and his tragic murder. In its review of what it called "a brave and beautifully written book," the *Atlanta Journal-Constitution* wrote: "Mariane Pearl moves beyond horror and grief to write elegantly and knowl-

edgeably about the vortex of religion, politics, and terrorism into which her husband was swept."

In 2007, the book was made into a movie starring Angelina Jolie. That same year, Mariane penned "In Search of Hope: The Global Diaries of Mariane Pearl," which profiles courageous women she encountered in her

world travels for her *Glamour* magazine column.

She continues to promote tolerance through understanding. In a recent interview, she explained that after terrorists took her husband's life, "I was very much determined that our son was going to be free of that sort of hatred that they were trying to promote."

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The Men Who Rede Investigative Journal

Bob Woodward and Carl Bernstein Receive Press Club's President's Award on 40th Anniversary of Their Watergate Reporting

MERICAN JOURNALISM hit a major landmark this year: the 40th anniversary of Bob Woodward and Carl Bernstein's pioneering reporting on the Watergate scandal.

Woodward and Bernstein's articles for *The Washington Post* traced the biggest American political scandal to date, culminating in President Richard Nixon's resignation in 1974. Four decades later, the series still stands as a bellwether of investigative journalism.

A rare mix of factors allowed Woodward and Bernstein to crack the story, they told CBS's Charlie Rose during a live event earlier this month.

"We just look at the world a little differently," Woodward said of his and Bernstein's complementary reporting styles. "There was a sense of loving reporting. We were both unmarried, we were young ... and we had the running room from the editors."

Public trust in the federal government has never been the same since. To this day, the media still tacks on the suffix "gate" when referring to major political scandals.

To mark the 40^{th} anniversary, the Los Angeles Press Club is honoring Woodward and Bernstein with the 2012 President's Award.

The scandal that made Woodward and Bernstein

the most famous reporters in America started four decades ago this month with a mysterious break-in at the Democratic Party headquarters in Washington, D.C.'s Watergate office complex by five burglars dressed in business suits. Starting from that one bizarre event, Woodward and Bernstein followed a trail of clues that reached ever higher. Eventually, the trail unveiled a wide-ranging conspiracy of political sabotage aimed at undermining the electoral process. The revelations led to the indictments of 40 White House and administration officials and the creation of a special prosecutor to curb executive branch power. Watergate also exposed a dark side of American politics that was previously little



seen. Ultimately, President Richard Nixon resigned on Aug 9, 1974.



inspiring generations of reporters, the formation of entire investigative teams at newspapers, and increased media scrutiny of the White House.

"What Carl and Bob did was begin to cover the White House, as I like to describe it, from the outside in and not from the inside out," television journalist Tom Brokaw of NBC News said in a video

posted earlier this month on *The Washington Post* website to commemorate the anniversary. "And that's the most important way of covering not just the White House but the institution of a presidency."

The story of Watergate has become such a well-known chapter in American history, it's easy to forget that Woodward and Bernstein's reporting unfolded painstakingly over two years, as they doggedly hunted clue after clue. When they began working on the story, they had no idea where it would lead. They even questioned whether they would ever figure out what it all added up to.

In the online *Post* tribute, Woodward recounted a lunch he had during the Watergate days with the Post's then publisher, the late Katharine Graham.

"She asked, 'when is the whole story going to

come out?" Woodward recalled. "And I said that Carl and I felt, because it was so concealed, it looked like never. And I remember she in a very pained way, said 'Never? Don't tell me never."

The support of Graham, the paper's top boss, was key to following the story to its conclusion, Woodward said.

As for the day-to-day reporting of the Watergate scandal, Bernstein

told the *Post* this month, they approached it like the "local reporters" they were.

It was, he said, a "non-glamorous" investigation and a "shoe leather endeavor."

Woodward and Bernstein's work on the stories earned *The Washington Post* the Pulitzer Prize in 1973. Their collaboration also expanded into two best-selling books, *All the President's Men* and *The Final Days*. The hit 1976 movie version of *All the President's Men* starred Robert Redford as Woodward and Dustin Hoffman as Bernstein, and won several Academy Awards.

The story of Watergate continues to live on. In 2005, the news media was abuzz when *Vanity Fair* magazine identified Woodward and Bernstein's famed anonymous source, "Deep Throat," as former FBI official Mark Felt. Felt's mythic

status continues (most certainly aided by Hal Holbrook's ominous portrayal of Deep Throat in the film), even though Woodward and Bernstein told Rose during this month's event that Felt was not as key as other sources. Judy Hoback, the bookkeeper for Nixon's re-election campaign, was much more integral to their reporting, they said.

"The real turning point in the coverage of Watergate was when Carl found the book-keeper," Woodward said. "The bookkeeper had the details of the money and who controlled it and who got the money."

Bernstein added, "More than anything, [Felt] did contribute key details, but really what he did is he gave us this assurance that we knew we were right ... it eliminated a lot of doubt that we might have had."

For all its historic significance, Watergate was only the beginning of Woodward and Bernstein's careers. Woodward, who graduated from Yale University in 1965 and started his career at the *Montgomery County (Maryland) Sentinel*, remains at *The Washington Post* to this day. He has won nearly

every major American journalism award during his career, and has authored or coauthored twelve #1 national bestsellers. His books include *Bush at War*, *Plan of Attack* and *Obama's Wars*. The television program "60 Minutes" has produced segments on seven of Woodward's books, and three of his books have been turned into movies.

Bernstein, who started working for The Washington Post as a teenager, has written for numerous publications in the years since Watergate. After leaving the *Post* in 1977, he spent six months examining the relationship between the CIA and the press during the Cold War years, resulting in a 25,000-word cover story for Rolling Stone magazine. Since then, his work has also appeared in Vanity Fair (for which he is also a contributing editor), Time, USA Today and The New Republic. He has served as a Washington Bureau Chief and correspondent for ABC News, and is the author of several books. His works include the biography A Woman in Charge: The Life of Hillary Rodham Clinton and Loyalties, a memoir about his parents during McCarthy-era Washington.

Her first big break came when she landed

a recurring role on the legal drama "Murder One." Other television credits include the sitcom "That's Life" and the action show "24." Among her film roles are appearances in *Almost Famous* and *The Ring.* In addition to acting, Perrette is a noted musician, whose work includes writing a song, "Fear," that appeared on the first volume of the "NCIS" soundtrack. She has also gained notoriety as an activist through her work on behalf of animal rescue, civil and LGBT rights. She is directing and producing a documentary about U.S. civil rights attorney and author Mark Lane.



One of America's most celebrated journeyman actors, MARTIN SHEEN made his Broadway debut in 1964, originating the role of Mike in Never Live Under A Pretzel Factory. The next year, he earned a Tony Award nomination for Best Featured Actor in a Play for the role of Timmy Cleary in the Pulitzer Prize-winning play The Subject Was Roses. Sheen reprised his role in the feature film version.

Sheen went on to gain international fame for his star turn as Captain Benjamin L. Willard in Francis Ford Coppola's landmark film *Apocalypse Now.* Notable films also include *Gandhi, The Departed, Wall Street, The American President, Bobby, Catch Me If You Can,* and *Badlands*.

For television, the Emmy and Golden Globe award-winning actor is best recognized for playing fictional U.S. President Josiah Bartlet on *The West Wing*.

Sheen is also a passionate peace and justice activist. He is the 2008 recipient of Notre Dame University's Laetare Medal, the oldest and most prestigious award for American Catholics.

Sheen has said, "While acting is what I do for a living, activism is what I do to stay alive." He is fully dedicated to both. For his acting, Sheen has garnered nearly 70 major awards and nominations—equal to the number of times he has been arrested or cited for peaceful protest.

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


