#### A Letter From the President

ood evening, and welcome to the 60th Annual Southern California Journalism Awards.

It's hard to believe that when these awards were first started, Los Angeles was welcoming a new baseball team, the Dodgers, who had just moved from Brooklyn. The big celebrity crime was the stabbing death of Lana Turner's mobster boyfriend, Johnny Stompanato, by her daughter Cheryl Crane. KTLA became the first TV station to use a news helicopter that year. And also in 1958, the University of Southern California established the first school for cinema and television studies. What a run they've had with graduates such as George Lucas, Ron Howard and Shonda Rhimes.

Through the years, reporters have been there to cover those and so many other stories. I often get asked: What's it like being a journalist in an era when President Donald Trump and so many others are criticizing and even threatening the media for allegedly publishing fake news and for other perceived biases? I tell people it's a little scary. But it's also exhilarating. Because there are so many great stories out there to be told.

The media business has changed a lot over the past 60 years. But I'm pleased to announce that the club this year saw a record number of submissions to its awards—more than 2,000 entries, in categories from humor writing to health care reporting, from photo essays to college newspapers. And they came in for categories that couldn't have even been dreamt about six decades ago, such as blogging, social media and podcasts.

Our honorees this year represent the very best that the art of storytelling has to offer. Lester Holt, NBC's evening anchorman, is the consummate news professional, keeping America informed every night with his shrewd judgment and gravitas. We couldn't ask for a better public service award winner than Dolly Parton, whose work on behalf of children's literacy has helped so many young people discover the printed word. (And don't forget, she's an amazing songwriter too!) Kimi Yoshino, the *Los Angeles Times'* business editor, has stood tall for all of us in the past year, shepherding difficult stories amid all of the turmoil that has hit the newspaper business. And finally, there's Raif Badawi, our Daniel Pearl Award recipient, who couldn't be here tonight because he's in prison in Saudi Arabia, subjected to lashings, for writing about human rights in a regime where such freedoms are not allowed.

On behalf of the board of directors and our club's 500 members, thank you so much for your time, your sponsorship dollars and your support for a free press in Southern California.

## Another Very Big Year

FROM AWARDS SHOWS TO AN EPIC FILM READING TO A NEW HOME, THE PRESS CLUB NEVER SLOWED DOWN

aying that the last year has been really big and busy for the Los Angeles Press Club sounds like a cliché. Still, the last year really was very big, and also very busy, with a collection of high-profile events, big-name guests and activities that helped celebrate journalism in the nation's second-largest city.

The highlights began last June, when the 59th Annual Southern California Journalism Awards took place at the Millennium Biltmore Hotel. They set a record in number of entries— a record broken by this year's 60th annual awards—and a sellout crowd came out to honor Andrea Mitchell, Jake Tapper, Jaime Jarrin and Daniel Berehulak. Additionally, the Club dispensed more than 100 prizes honoring the year's best print, television,

radio, magazine and online journalism.

The Press Club's other major awards show also drew a huge crowd. The 10th annual National Entertainment Journalism Awards were held in November, and more than 50 industry professionals were honored for their work. Prestigious prizes were also presented to Tippi Hedren, Claudia Eller and Andrew Wallenstein of *Variety*, Kareem Abdul-Jabbar, and "Sesame Street" co-creators Joan Ganz and Lloyd Morrisett. The highlight of the night was undoubtedly the presentation of the Impact Award for Journalism That Makes a Difference that went to Jodi Kantor and Megan Twohey of the *New York Times*, who broke open the #MeToo movement with their groundbreaking

reporting on the abominable behavior of Harvey Weinstein.

Other events may have lacked the flash of the award shows but still celebrated the people doing great journalism and explored key issues in the industry. In July, the Club hosted the panel discussion "Exploring New Frontiers in LGBTQ Media in an Age of Resistance and Backlash," with some of America's most interesting and influential lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender media professionals. The following month, director Evgeny Afineevsky showed up for a

screening of his *Cries From Syria*, and then participated in a Q&A led by former U.S. Ambassador to Hungary, Colleen Bell.

One of the year's highlights occurred in January at an unlikely location: City Hall. The Press Club, in partnership with the Fountain Theatre, hosted a one-night only live reading of William Goldman's screenplay for *All the President's Men*. It was hosted by Los Angeles City Councilmember Mitch O'Farrell and took place in City Council chambers. Prominent actors, including Bradley Whitford, Joshua Malina, Richard Schiff and Ed Begley, Jr., participated in an unforgettable evening that, in 2018, feels frighteningly relevant.

Another film event occurred the following month: The Press Club honored Steven Spielberg's movie *The Post* with its third annual Veritas Award for the best nonfiction film. Screenwriters Liz Hannah and Josh Singer and producers Tim and Trevor White stopped by for a panel discussion with Daniel Ellsberg of Pentagon Papers fame.

April brought a screening of *Sands of Silence*, the 2017 Southern California Journalism Awards Feature Documentary winner, which explored the sex trafficking trade. The night also included a panel discussion with the filmmakers and a woman who was abused and a subject of the documentary.

The Press Club was not static this year—literally. It left its longtime home in East Hollywood for a new space on Sunset Boulevard. It celebrated with a St. Patrick's-themed housewarming party in March.

In May, there were three major events for Press Club members: a special dinner reception with the Swiss Consul General; a reception and discussion with American academic Michael McFaul, former U.S. Ambassador to Russia from 2012-2014, about his new book, From Cold War to Hot Peace: The Inside Story of Russia and America, held in the theater at the Press Club; and an exclusive screening of the Netflix Original Documentary Series Robert Kennedy for President on the 50th anniversary of his assassination, which was attended by Paul Schrade, who was wounded alongside Kennedy, and Juan Romero, the busboy who held Kennedy after he was shot.

The LA Press Club can only hope that it can provide its members with as good a year as it has this past one.

#### Getting a Foot in the Door

LA Press Club Fellows Have a Unique Opportunity to Advance Their Career

veryone needs help when they're starting out in journalism. In particular, too many talented young journalists of color have had trouble getting their foot in

the door and launching a career.

The LA Press Club wants to change that and is starting a Fellowship program that involves industry veterans aiding those just getting started.

Each year, five recent college journalism grads will be paired with a veteran in the field to work on securing a job. More than a mentoring relationship, this will be a partnership between the Fellow and the journalism veteran to figure out how to launch career dreams and take concrete steps to get there.

LA Press Club Fellows will meet once a month for six months with their journalism partner. During this time the Fellow will craft a plan for getting his or her foot in the door at a desired news outlet or journalism institution.

Each month, the Fellow will consult with their partner and present progress made on the plan. This might include collating a reel or portfolio of work, and mapping out the area of journalism that interests the Fellow. It could also involve creating a list of outlets to target and researching who works there

and what positions are attainable. Additionally, the industry veteran might help a Fellow create a personal website or a more robust LinkedIn page, and come up with examples of the Fellow's best work that can be used when applying for a job.

The role of the veteran journalism partner is to help the Fellow understand the playing field, give actionable advice on how to best market oneself, offer feedback on the Fellow's portfolio, and take direct action on the Fellow's behalf: to email, call or lean on colleagues in the field to help open a door for their Fellow.

The LA Press Club Journalism Partners are: Deepa Fernandes, a board member of the LA Press Club; Ashley Alvarado, Director of Community Engagement at KPCC; and Joanne Griffith, Assistant Managing Editor, Digital.

Fernandes will chair the program.

The application for Fellowships will begin in August, and Fellows will be announced in November.

## PARTY LIKE IT'S

1958

Sixty Years Ago, Things Were Different at the LA Press Club By JON REGARDIE



WHAT WAS THE LOS ANGELES PRESS CLUB LIKE IN 1958?

Consider the letter printed on page 15 of the year's 8 Ball Final, a yearbook of the then-monthly club newsletter. It came from a figure who noted that he was "an honorary member of the Club." He went on to write, "The fact that the Club has grown to 2,300 members and that 1,100 of these are active in their profession is testimony to the vitality and importance of the Press Club in the Greater Los Angeles area."

It was on letterhead that read "Office of the Vice President." It was signed by Richard Nixon.

To say it was a different time in the world of Los Angeles journalism is putting it mildly. Ads in that 8 Ball came from the likes of Northrop Aircraft, Lockheed promoting its new Electra turboprop, and U.S Steel. In an 8 Ball article, late KCBS newsman Bill Stout described the challenges posed by "electronic journalism." He meant television, not the web. He wrote, "The main difference between being a newspaper newsman and a television newsman is that in television you have to shave. Regularly."

Not everything was completely different. For the 8 Ball, Bob Thomas of the Associated Press penned a piece about the troubles facing Hollywood. In a story titled "Anyone for Afghanistan?" he bemoaned the dying out of a favorite entertainment press perk, declaring "The big, free-wheeling junket appears to have been swept away in the wreckage of the film business."

Photos from that time capture an era in some ways more innocent. George Snow of the *Examiner* shot a ground-level image of a kid pressed to the pavement wearing a "Midget Marble Champion 1958." Others were serious, like Bud Gray's photo, also from the *Examiner*, of an exhausted firefighter working to extinguish a blaze.

It was also a different time in terms of social propriety, with male reporters and editors of the era openly engaging in behavior that wouldn't be tolerated today. Images from the 1958 "Club Scrapbook" include onetime Press Club president Joe Quinn leering at Jayne Mansfield as she signed the club's guest book, and a passel of six journalists gathered around "Miss 8 Ball." Yep, the Press Club had its own pin-up girl. The first Miss 8 Ball, in 1948, was Marilyn Monroe.

It seems fair to say that while it was a hub for professional journalists and provided an opportunity to discuss the media concerns of the day, the Press Club in '58 was also a social network.



#### PARTY LIKE IT'S 1958



In reliving the highlights of the year, the 8 Ball shows photos from the club's gin rummy finals and an actual adult lion being brought into the bar. There were plenty of events, including some charitable pursuits, thanks to the 8 Ball Welfare Foundation, which on March 20, 1958, sponsored the premiere of the Clark Gable film Teacher's Pet (Gable played a newspaper editor), raising \$20,000 in the process. For the end of the year soiree, the 8 Ball reported, "The Christmas Party took a gay turn with the arrival of Walt Disney's mighty Mouseketeers. The kids went wild."

There were regular evening gatherings, known as gang dinners, some with themes, some with speakers, some with both. Football star Elroy "Crazy Legs"

Hirsch appeared in January for "sports night." Vice President Nixon showed up in February, drawing a crowd of 800 people and speaking for 90 minutes. May brought the "African Safari Night" gang dinner, and in October the Club honored Sheriff Eugene Biscailuz, describing him as "50 years a great friend of the press," with Art Linkletter serving as the master of ceremonies. In December 1958, the club had a nowdisturbing "Minstrel Show" gang dinner. The club charged \$5 per couple for its New Year's Eve party.

The club also hit a milestone in 1958, with the first L.A. Journalism Awards. Unlike today, there were only four categories, and also unlike today, the prizes included hefty cash payouts. The Harry

Karl Award, for the outstanding news story of the year, went to Don Bailer of the *Herald-Express*, who received \$1,000 for, as the October 8 Ball noted, "the dramatic story of a jet black horse named Tom Boy, who was condemned to death in the will of a wealthy mistress." There were also \$250 prizes for the best sports story and the best sports photo, and \$500 for the recipient of what was known as The Wilshire Oil Co. Traffic Safety Award, honoring the best story or photo of the year on, uh, traffic safety.

But while the job of the press remains the same—get the story—it's the differences that stand out. For example, in 1958 in Los Angeles, Hollywood celebrities were not carefully "handled" by a phalanx of publicists who only trotted them out to promote their latest album or film. The Club back then was based in the Ambassador Hotel, and a report from Club president Humphrey Owens recounts visits to the Club by Frank Sinatra, Eddie Fisher and "Red Skelton, that wonderful buffoon." Don Rickles entertained at a dinner in June and images from the time show Elizabeth Taylor dropping by, as well as a visit from Bob Hope.

In terms of our social evolution, we have traveled far in 60 years: The #MeToo Movement, a push for diverse newsrooms and new business models forcing newsrooms to shrink. The attack on the free press and American institutions have brought us to a very different

place, and yet journalism has

never been on more "solid ground." The Club continues its proud mission to protect and defend journalists whose job it is to keep us all on "solid ground."







## Remembering Journalists Killed In There are Fewer Deaths This Year but 95 Journalists

the Line of Duty

There are Fewer Deaths This Year B
Remind Us of the Risks in the Field

EVERY YEAR the Los Angeles Press Club lists the journalists killed during the previous year as they toiled to bring information to the public's attention. It's a grim task to compile this depressingly long list, but it is also necessary to remind all working in this profession just what's at stake every day.

Most of the deaths occur as journalists are working to expose corruption or political misdeeds, or to chronicle the ravages of war.

Like other war correspondents, they understood that report-

ing in a conflict zone has inherent and significant risk. But journalists engaged in non-controversial stories working in peaceful locales can be targets, too. It's worth reminding ourselves, as we ply our trade in Southern California, that while we are lucky to do this worthwhile profession, it is not without risk, especially when our stories speak truth to power.

Once again, we honor the journalists who between June 2017 and June 2018 were targeted by sick minds, caught in the crossfire or were a casualty of corruption. We remember:



## Reporters Around the World Face Dangerous Conditions

Delivering the Truth Can Have Consequences, As Hundreds of International Journalists Are Behind Bars

Per amid a battle with the occupant of the White House, the First Amendment and freedom of speech remain strong in the United States. That's not the case in some other countries, where many reporters, editors, photographers and bloggers are facing long prison sentences, and often onerous conditions, for reporting the truth.

Journalists face particular danger in Turkey, Egypt and China. According to the Stockholm Center for Freedom, 57 journalists have been convicted in Turkey, 188 have been arrested and another 140 are wanted.

The list of the imprisoned includes brothers Ahmet Altan and Mehmet Altan, who are facing life sentences. They were arrested after a failed coup in 2016, for allegedly giving "subliminal messages" and attempting to overthrow the "constitutional order."

Nazli Ilicak was also arrested in Turkey in 2016

[Continued from page 20] on the same charges. She has been sentenced to life in prison and is being held at the Bakirköy Women's Prison in Istanbul.

Mahmoud Abou Zeid, also known as Shawkan, is an Egyptian photojournalist who was arrested in 2013 while taking pictures of the Rabaa massacre in Cairo. He faces the death penalty; since being imprisoned he has been diagnosed with Hepatitis C, as well as malnourishment and anemia.



Huang Qi of China founded the website 64 Tianwang in 1998 and had reported on issues such as human trafficking, government corruption and police brutality. He was arrested in 2016, allegedly for having "leaked state"

secrets to foreign entities." He suffers from a serious kidney disease.

Also in China, Ding Lingjie was arrested last year. She is the editor of a human rights news website and has been accused by Chinese officials of "picking quarrels and provoking trouble." She is suspected of insulting the State leader.

The challenges are not limited to those countries. The Swedish/Eritrean journalist Dawit Isaak has been in an Eritrean prison since 2001 but has never had a trial.



In Azerbaijan, Araz Guliyev was arrested on hooliganism charges in 2012. He was accused of "participation in activities that disrupt public order" and "offensive action against the flag and emblem of Azerbaijan." In 2013 he was sentenced to eight years in prison.

Reuters journalists Wa Lone and Kyaw Soe Oo were arrested in December 2017 while reporting on the



Rohingya refugee crisis in Myanmar. They are accused of possessing secret government papers and face up to 14 years in prison.

In Russia, Uzbek reporter Khudoberdi Nurmatov (who writes under the pseudonym

Ali Feruz) was held at a specialized pretrial detention center for foreign nationals. Nurmatov, who is openly gay, had been seeking asylum in Russia after having been tortured in Uzbekistan. He tried to commit suicide during his incarceration.

Fortunately, Nurmatov was released on Feb. 15 and left Russia for Germany, where he has received refugee status. However, many other reporters continue to face brutal conditions simply for doing their job.

## Speaking Truth No Matter the CONSEQUENCES

DANIEL PEARL AWARD RECIPIENT RAIF BADAWI REMAINS
IN PRISON IN SAUDI ARABIA FOR EXPRESSING HIS OPINIONS

BY GUNILLA LARSSON aif Badawi is the recipient of the Los Angeles Press Club's 2018 Daniel Pearl Award for Courage and Integrity in Journalism. But he is not at the Biltmore Hotel tonight to accept the honor. Instead, his wife, Ensaf Haidar, and their three children have travelled to Los Angeles on his behalf.

That's because Badawi is in prison in Saudi Arabia, serving a 10-year sentence, plus 1,000 lashes, for "insulting Islam" by promoting human rights and equal rights for women in Saudi Arabia on his blog. His sentence, if fully

carried out, will most likely result in his death.

The writer, blogger, dissident and activist has now been imprisoned in Saudi Arabia for more than six years. His only "crime" was expressing his opinions.

It's a situation that has prompted an outcry around the globe. The Los Angeles Press Club sent a letter to Crown Prince Mohammad bin Salman pleading for his release. The organization Human Rights Watch stated, "The charges against him, based solely [on] Badawi's involvement in setting up a website for peaceful discussion about religion and religious figures, violate his right to freedom of expression."

Badawi was born Jan. 13, 1984, and grew up in Jeddah and Riyadh. In his early 20s he started an English school where both men and women were welcome to learn, an unusual initiative in a country where women were not allowed to drive a car.

He opened an online forum called Saudi Liberal Network where he invited others to speak freely, and they did. After being told by the country's General Directorate of Investigation to shut down the site, he did.

In 2006 he started a blog, Free Saudi Liberal, where, in sarcastic but intellectual language, he questioned the ways of Saudi Arabia. In 2008 he was detained for the first time and charged with apostasy, meaning "abandonment of Islam by a Muslim in word or through deed." He was banned from travelling and in 2009 Badawi and his wife's bank accounts were frozen.

In 2012, he was arrested on the charge of "insulting Islam through electronic channels."



The website was shut down by the Saudi government and the following year he was sentenced to seven years in prison and 600 lashes.

On May 7, 2014, the punishment was increased to 10 years in prison, 1,000 lashes and a fine of 1 million riyal (roughly \$267,000).

Haidar fled with the couple's three children, first to Egypt and then to Lebanon. When she realized that the ordeal wouldn't "be over in a month," like Badawi had told her on the phone from prison, she sought and was granted asylum in Canada.

On Jan. 9, 2015, Badawi was flogged 50 times in front of the Jeddah mosque. His hands and feet were tied and hundreds of spectators were there to watch. The additional 950 lashes were to be administered over a period of 20 weeks, but they keep getting postponed. After hearing about the flogging of her husband, Haidar said, "What I felt was indescribable. It was an indescribable mixture of sadness and pain. It was

painfully horrible to imagine what was happening to Raif."

Since his incarceration Badawi has become a diabetic and suffers from hypertension.

Raif is with his three children before being imprisoned. Badawi's wife, Haidar, fled with their children to Egypt, then Lebanon, eventually seeking asylum in Canada where she continues to fight for his freedom.



Haidar's family has tried to forcibly divorce the couple, but they remain married and Haidar continues to fight for her husband. She now works as a human rights activist and is the president of the Raif Badawi Foundation for Freedom. When talking to Liberal International she said, "Standing in

favor of human rights is not a choice, but rather something that is as evident as the pure air that goes through our lungs. Raif wanted to protect freedom, justice, human rights and equality because he believes in those values. He used to say that a human being either lives free or he has to die trying."

In Quebec the couple's children go to school and Haidar is learning French and English. She no longer has any connection with Badawi's family; his mother is dead, and his father openly condemns him. The relationship between father and son has been difficult for a long time, and they have argued over the years. Included in Raif's punishment is three months in prison for a crime called uquq, meaning "parental disobedience."

Yet Badawi is not forgotten. Leaders in many countries, including Sweden, the United Kingdom, the United States and Germany, have asked for his release. The United Nations and the European Union have joined in the pleas for his freedom.

Reporters Without Borders has organized a petition to free Badawi. It has received more than 46,000 signatures.

Badawi's lawyer and brother-in-law, Waleed Abu al-Khair, set up a Saudi human rights organization called Monitor of Human Rights in Saudi Arabia in 2008. In 2014 he was found guilty of numerous charges, among them "insulting the judiciary, inciting public opinion, and undermining the regime and its officials."

He was sentenced to 15 years in prison.

os Angeles Times Business Editor Kimi Yoshino is my boss, so I can say without hesitation that she's an exceptional journalist, a snappy dresser, kind to animals and a great humanitarian.

I can also say she's that rare manager who leads by example and who, when it's called for, is willing to make a stand for what's right.

It's no secret that Kimi ran afoul of a former *Times* editor-in-chief (collect them all) and that her suspension by that editor—no names, except it was Lewis D'Vorkin—played a role in the subsequent changing of the guard atop the masthead.

Here's what David Folkenflik of NPR wrote at the time:

"The business editor of the *Los Angeles Times* made a triumphant return to the newsroom to applause Thursday after several days away, telling colleagues she had been whisked away and suspended as part of the newspaper's investigation into the leak of taped remarks made by the paper's editor-in-chief in November."

Kimi was suspected by D'Vorkin of leaking embarrassing audio of him berating the newsroom staff, which she denied doing. Nevertheless, he suspended her pending an investigation, which prompted outright rebellion from business staffers. We submitted a letter calling for Kimi's immediate reinstatement.

She asked me not to dwell on the episode, saying she'd rather this profile be forward-looking and more focused on the future of the *L.A. Times*. But I don't mind saying: That whole thing with D'Vorkin highlighted the respect and admiration with which the biz team views their leader, and that's a big deal. These are uncertain times in our industry, to say the least, and it's nice to be reminded there are newsroom

figures who aren't just getting the job done but are doing so in a principled, ethical manner. The fact that Kimi brings donuts on Fridays is a plus.

"Kimi is the definition of what it means to be an outstanding newsroom editor in this complicated media era: demanding but fair," says Jim Kirk, the *Times*' editor-in-chief. "Someone who

puts accuracy and ethics above all else. She has an incredible way with reporters and understands what it takes to get the strongest work on the *L.A. Times'* platforms. She makes the *L.A. Times* better every day."

Kimi has been at the paper since 2000, after stints at the *Stockton Record* and *Fresno Bee*. Her career at the *Times* reflects both a diversity of talents and a drive to get stories told. She was a prime mover behind the popular L.A. Now blog, which garners an annoying number of daily hits (relative to, say, the paper's consumer coverage), and she helped oversee the investi-

gation into corruption in the city of Bell, which won a much-deserved Pulitzer Prize and was the kind of work all journalists dream of doing.

I told Kimi I thought it was particularly cool that she served for a spell as the *Times'* Baghdad correspondent, but she played it down. She told me she didn't think her published work from the Iraqicapital was among her best (she thought

her more intimate letters to friends and family were better; today they'd be blog posts). In fact,

it's no small thing for anyone to report from a war zone.

As business editor since 2014, Kimi has been relentless in rethinking and re-energizing our coverage. Not coincidentally, the section was recognized two years in a row for general excellence by the Society of American Business Editors and Writers. This year, we bagged no fewer than 11 SABEW awards, which was more than anyone else, thank you very much.

Lately, Kimi has been adding to her duties by also overseeing digital and audience-engagement activities, which she says have given her a "broader lens" as to how the *Times* can up its game.

Like pretty much every other newspaper, we're aggressively trying to go where our audience may be, which is everywhere—online, video, social media. That means it's no longer sufficient to write a story and slap on a photo. If a story merits a full-court press, it can mean podcasts, animated graphics, anything that adds texture to a tale.

"It's about a full and immersive experience," Kimi says. "I'm not talking about hits. I'm talk-





ing about letting readers know that we're serious about a story, and we're going to devote the resources necessary to tell it right."

Easier said than done, of course. All those bells and whistles can add to costs, despite an overall industry trend of belt tightening. Kimi says that's what the *Times* and other leading publications are trying to figure out—how to develop and devote the resources for state-of-the-art storytelling without breaking the bank.

I asked if that means doing stuff that isn't necessarily journalism. Kimi, to her credit, didn't hesitate to say yes, if that's where the money is. So the *Times* is getting into guided tours. We're into food festivals and show-biz-related events. We're doing whatever it takes to expand our horizons (and cash flow) so we can keep focusing on what we do best, which is making sure the public knows what it needs to know.

"We're never going to stray from our core mission," Kimi says. "But we need to embrace opportunities that allow us to fulfill that mission."

She didn't want me lingering over that D'Vorkin business, but the simple fact is that the best leaders aren't appointed, they're tested. Kimi passed that test as far as her staffers are concerned, and that's where it really counts.

I can think of no one more deserving of the President's Award for Impact on the Media.

## A LEADER IN COCCO BY LISA RICHWIN

DOLLY PARTON IS KNOWN FOR HER MUSIC, BUT SHE IS ALSO AN ADVOCATE FOR READING, EARNING HER THE BILL ROSENDAHL PUBLIC SERVICE AWARD



olly Parton is famous around the globe as the big-haired, larger-than-life singer, songwriter, businesswoman and actress, but to many young children she is known simply as "The Book Lady."

The Queen of Country Music is also the founder of the Imagination Library, an organization that mails more than 1 million free books to preschool kids each month to help foster a love of reading. Launched in 1995 in her home state of Tennessee, it is now the largest children's literacy organization in the world.

Tonight, the Los Angeles Press Club is honoring Parton with the Bill Rosendahl Public Service Award for Contributions to Civic Life. It recognizes her work with the Imagination Library, which this year celebrated a milestone of having donated 100 million books over its history.

Each child enrolled in the Imagination Library receives a new book addressed to him or her each month, from the time they are born until they are ready to start kindergarten.

Parton, an author and avid reader, has said she hopes the books help prepare children for an education and encourage them to imagine what is possible.

"I dream that every child in the world will have the opportunity to make their dreams come true," Parton wrote in her 2012 book *Dream More*.

The fourth of 12 children, Parton said

books helped open her world when she was growing up in rural Locust Ridge, Tenn., in a tiny cabin with no electricity or running water. Her mother, Avie Lee Parton, read the Bible to her children to entertain them, and the stories of the Old Testament captivated Parton.

The singer started the Imagination Library as a tribute to her father, Robert Lee Parton. Like many men of his era, he went without schooling to help support his family and never learned to read or write. Parton has said her father was the smartest man she has ever known, but she suspects his lack of literacy kept him from fulfilling all his dreams.

The Imagination Library began in Parton's native Sevier County, Tenn., in the foothills of the Great Smoky Mountains. While many equated "poor" children with "dumb," Parton saw that often kids from underprivileged families simply weren't exposed to reading at home, putting them at a disadvantage when they started school.

"The real truth was that education wasn't about being rich or poor. It was simply that some parents had done much more than others to get their kids prepared," she wrote in *Dream More*.

"When I thought about my Mama reading the Bible to us," she added, "it hit me that if kids had books in the home, just maybe somebody would read to them and help them love books. Even more important, maybe it would inspire them and

spark in them the kind of wild imagination that I have so they will thirst for what's out there in the big world."

The initial plan envisioned the library as a local effort, but it later expanded across the United States and into Canada, Britain and Australia. In February, the program's 100 millionth book was dedicated to the Library of Congress. "This is an extraordinary gift to humankind," Librarian of Congress Carla Hayden said of the initiative.

As a child, Parton's biggest dream was to perform on stage at Nashville's Grand Ole Opry, a goal she accomplished in 1959 at age 13 when she sang with her uncle Bill Owens. In 1967, she released her debut album "Hello, I'm Dolly."

Parton has become the most honored female country music performer of all time. She has composed more than 3,000 songs including "I Will Always Love You," which became a hit for Parton and later for Whitney Houston, and sold more than 100 million albums worldwide.

Parton has won eight Grammys and in 2011 received a Grammy Lifetime Achievement Award. Twenty-five of her songs have reached No. 1 on the Billboard Country Music Charts.

She also starred on the big screen as a secretary in the workplace comedy 9 to 5, in which three women seek revenge on their male boss, and received an Academy Award nomination for writing the movie's theme song.

A successful businesswoman, Parton launched the Dollywood theme park in Pigeon Forge, Tenn., in 1986 and turned the small town into a tourist destination that supports thousands of jobs.

She still lives in Tennessee, along with her husband, Carl Dean. They have been married for 52 years.

The Imagination Library is just one of many philanthropic efforts by Parton, who helps causes through her Dollywood Foundation, which encourages people to "Dream more, learn more, care more and be more." In 2016,

she hosted a telethon that raised about \$9 million to help people affected by wildfires around Gatlinburg, Tenn. The money was used to give \$10,000 each to nearly 900 families displaced by the fires.

Now 72, Parton continues to write and perform and remains active in her business and philanthropic ventures. She has said she will never retire.

Earlier this month, Parton announced she had joined with Warner Bros. Television to produce a television series that will appear on Netflix in 2019. Each episode will be based on one of Parton's songs, and the singer will appear on camera in some episodes. She also is composing music for an upcoming movie called *Dumplin'*, the story of a plussized teenager who enters a local beauty pageant run by her mother, who is played by Jennifer Aniston.

In addition, Parton has said in recent interviews that she is preparing to reunite with co-stars Jane Fonda and Lily Tomlin for a 9 to 5 sequel, prompted in part by the #MeToo movement against sexual harassment and abuse.

Parton acknowledges that part of what made her famous was her over-the-top style featuring high heels, rhinestones and big blonde hair. In *Dream More*, she described her look as "a blend of Mother Goose, Cinderella and the local hooker."

But she added that she hopes her work to promote early childhood literacy will outshine her glittering wardrobe and bright makeup.

"If I am remembered 100 years from now," she wrote," I hope it will be not for looks but for books.".

# A Calming, Confident PRESENCE

NBC NIGHTLY NEWS ANCHOR LESTER HOLT RECEIVES
THE QUINN AWARD FOR LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT

rom moderating the first Trump-Clinton debate in 2016, to helping us cope with the horror of the Parkland High School shooting, to ushering in the wonder of the PyeongChang Winter Olympics, Lester Holt has been a calming presence in our lives, delivering the news and sharing stories with viewers in his trademark steady, authoritative manner. He says his style has been called "laid back" and "without drama." Whatever it is, his newscasts inspire confidence in an increasingly erratic and dangerous world.

This solid persona extends to pursuing stories in the field, even in the most dangerous circumstances. During Egypt's 2011 uprising, Holt braved angry mobs and street violence to bring us the Arab Spring story. The year before in Haiti, he slept under the stars each night, rising with the first light and moving into the earthquake's devastation to report on the death and destruction. Intestinal fortitude is part of the man's DNA.

He still has a hunger to go where the stories are. "The bar I'm trying to maintain is that we go if it's big and if it's something that I think I can add value to by being there," Holt explains. "Sometimes, as the main anchor, I may be in a position to get an interview that we might not otherwise get... As much as I can control it, I don't want to just stand there with a background of a twisted-up city or whatever the story might be."

Whether he's with the Parkland students, politicians or heads of state, Holt's talent for getting to the truth is a constant. His straightforward question to President Trump about the reason for firing FBI Director James Comey may prove to be of great national significance. But for Holt, he was just doing his job. Watching him in action is an inspiration to





journalists all over the world.

As the first African American to permanently host a nightly newscast on one the Big Three networks, Holt has been a trailblazer as well. It all helps explain why the Los Angeles Press Club tonight is





presenting the "NBC Nightly News" anchor with the Joseph M. Quinn Award for Lifetime Achievement.

Lester Don Holt Jr. was born in San Francisco to June DeRozario and Lester Holt Sr., an Air Force technician. He went to high school in the Sacramento suburb of Rancho Cordova, where he demonstrated his presentation skills early; delivering announcements over the school public address system. He attended nearby California State University, Sacramento, though he never graduated. Holt found time, however, to pursue his twin passions of broadcasting and music, landing a job as a disc jockey at a country and western radio station.

In 1981 Holt was hired as a reporter for WCBS, the flagship TV station in New York, in what would become a 19-year journey with the network. He was one of only a few journalists who would work as a reporter and anchor in all three of the country's largest markets: New York, Los Angeles and Chicago.



"Not too many people have done that," says Josh Mankiewicz, his colleague at "Dateline NBC," where Holt also serves as host. "It shows you that he's very good and has been on a fast track for a long time."

Holt leapt to NBC in 2000 where he distinguished himself covering that year's chaotic presidential election, which George W. Bush ultimately won. More anchor positions followed, including a regular report on the Iraq War, as well as weekend hosting duties for "Nightly News" and the "Today Show." He also hosted "Lester Holt Live" on the MSNBC cable network.

Holt covered breaking news such as Hurricane Katrina, which flooded New Orleans, and the devastating earthquake in Haiti. He earned the nickname Iron Pants for his ability to stay in the anchor chair for hours on end, keeping news-hungry viewers informed.

His biggest break came in February 2015, when his colleague Brian Williams got in trouble for exagAbove: 2017, Holt with firefighters in his hometown while reporting on the wildfires.

gerating his own experiences covering the conflict in the Middle East. Williams was suspended for six months without pay.

"Brian is a member of our family, but so are you, the viewers," Holt told audiences that night after taking his seat at the "Nightly News" desk. "And we will work every night to be worthy of your trust."

Williams was later moved to MSNBC and Holt got the spot anchoring the "Nightly News" on a permanent basis four months later.


Since then Holt has continued to distinguish himself as an anchor and interviewer. "Nightly News" has maintained its top spot in the ratings among the 18- to 49-year-old viewers most coveted by advertisers. And Holt has continued to nurture the next generation of journalism talent, both in his office and at home.

Holt and his wife of 36 years, Carol Hagen, have two sons, Cameron and Stefan, the latter of whom is a reporter for WNBC in New York.

Lester Holt keeps a condo in Santa Monica and often anchors from NBC's studio in Universal City so he can spend the weekend in California. When he's not working, Holt plays bass guitar in a rock n' roll cover band, even sitting in with the house band The Roots on "The Tonight Show with Jimmy Fallon." Much like his day job, Holt keeps a slow and steady groove that makes those around him shine.









**CHER CALVIN** is a five-time Emmy Award winner who co-anchors the KTLA 5 News at 6,10 and 11 p.m. weeknights alongside Micah Ohlman. She joined KTLA in 2005 and is currently Vice President of the Los Angeles Press Club.

With a deep connection to her community in Los Angeles, she serves as Mistress of Ceremonies for the annual

YWCA Pasadena Foothill Valley Women for Racial Justice Awards, which creates a venue for women fighting for racial justice to discuss how they work to eliminate racism. Calvin also hosts the annual Miss Philippines USA pageant in Los Angeles, giving young Filipino-American women the confidence and community support they need to advance themselves and give them a voice. An avid traveler, she has visited more than 45 countries. In the last six months her travels have brought her to Japan, Philippines, Cuba and China.



ANDREA CHANG is an assistant editor at the *Los Angeles Times*. She previously covered technology and retail for the paper as a reporter. Chang graduated from the Medill School of Journalism at Northwestern University and has written for the *St. Petersburg Times*, the *Oregonian* and the *San Jose Mercury News*. She joined the *L.A. Times* the same week the

first iPhone went on sale in 2007 and is fittingly from Cupertino, Calif.



**PAT HARVEY** is the co-anchor of CBS 2's weekday 5 and 11 p.m. newscasts. She joined CBS 2 following 20 years with sister station KCAL 9 as one of the original anchors of the nation's first nightly three-hour primetime newscast. Harvey, who received the Joseph M. Quinn Award for Lifetime Achievement from the Press Club in 2004, regularly

reports on issues of concern to Southern California and the world.

Her reporting has ranged from filing live reports at the inauguration of President Barack Obama to following the story of a homeless painter from the streets of Los Angeles to a gallery in Paris. Harvey is a 21-time Emmy winner, the most recent for a half-hour special on the 20th anniversary of the L.A. riots. Other awards include being named Best News Anchor by the Associated Press and seven Golden Mikes.

Emmy-nominated producer **SAM HASKELL III** was named in 2007 by *Television Week Magazine* as "One of the 25 Most Innovative and Influential People in Television of the Last 25 Years." He earned his ranking through a 27-year career at the William Morris Agency, where he was one of the most



powerful agents and dealmakers in the business. At the agency, Haskell oversaw the "packaging" of all agency-represented network projects, including the megahits "Fresh Prince of Bel Air," "Everybody Loves Raymond," "Lost" and "Live with Regis & Kathie Lee."

Since 2013, Haskell has run Magnolia Hill Productions in association with

Warner Bros. Television in Los Angeles. He and his partner Dolly Parton have produced two television movies for NBC. The first, *Dolly Parton's Coat of Many Colors*, eclipsed over 16 million live viewers. The second, the sequel *Dolly Parton's Christmas Of Many Colors-Circle of Love*, delivered 14.5 million live viewers. Most recently, Haskell and Parton made a deal to produce an eight-episode anthology series for Netflix. Based on her music, each mini-movie will feature and tell the story of one of her iconic songs. Principal photography will begin this fall.



ROBERT KOVACIK is the past President of the Los Angeles Press Club. He is an Anchor/Reporter for NBC4 Southern California, joining NBC in 2004. Kovacik is known for bringing viewers in-depth coverage of international events from a local perspective, having recently returned from covering the terror attack in Manchester, England.

Kovacik was NBC4's correspondent for the 2013 Papal Conclave at the Vatican and the Summer Olympics in Rome. Both assignments were recognized with Emmy Awards.


One of his most compelling live shots occurred during an extensive manhunt for an alleged murderer. The suspect suddenly appeared and surrendered to Kovacik live on air. His work has received several awards and accolades. Kovacik's exclusive examination into the Los Angeles Fire Department's 911 response times prompted the Mayor to demand an audit, and his groundbreaking expose into overcrowded L.A. animal shelters helped force the city to change its laws.

Kovacik is an honors graduate of Brown University and Columbia University's Graduate School of Journalism, where he also graduated with honors.

She recently inked a deal with BenBella for her third book, *Becoming Superwoman*. Her first book, 2015's *Rich Bitch*, was a personal finance guide for women. She

followed up with *Boss Bitch*, in 2017, which empowers women to be the boss of their lives and careers. Born and raised in Los Angeles, Lapin got her start in finance at 18 by reporting from

She has also served as a business anchor and special correspondent for Bloomberg Television and is the creator and host of the AOL Originals show "I'll Never Forget My First," where she interviewed influential women about the first time they knew they made it.



**DAN LAURIA** is a versatile stage, screen and TV actor, perhaps best known for his role on "The Wonder Years" as Jack Arnold. He also starred on TV most recently as a baseball manager in "Pitch" and as Sullivan on "Sullivan and Son." On stage, he wrote and played a leading role in the Off Broadway satirical Mafia comedy, *Dinner with the Boys*. His vast


