Los Angeles 4 Press CLub Southern California 5 Journalism Awards

For the Los Angeles Press Club and Local Journalists, It Was a Year Like No Other

From Helping Reporters Impacted by the Fires to Highlighting Great Work, the Club Was Constantly Supporting Serious Journalism

early every year at this time, the Los Angeles Press Club looks back and marvels at the wealth of activity in the previous 12 months. But as the 67th annual Southern California Journalism Awards arrive, it's not a cliché to say that the Club, and hundreds of local journalists, have experienced a literally unprecedented year. The work never stops.

In January, the Eaton and Palisades wildfires devastated the region. Local journalists rose to the occasion, spreading across Los Angeles County to keep people informed of the latest developments and most crucial information about evacuations, shelter locations and more. At the same time, the Press Club looked for ways to respond not only to those reporting from the frontlines, but people who normally cover other subjects. We dug into our savings, and some of our members also rose up to contribute funds. This resulted in the ability to give emergency grants to journalists affected by the wildfires.

That was not the end of the tumult. Earlier this month, journalists were again on the front lines, never far from danger as they covered the ICE crackdowns, the widespread citizen protests, and the confrontations that occurred when National Guard troops were deployed to the streets of Los Angeles. The Press Club remains a leading advocate in protecting journalists' ability to do their job. Our Press Rights Committee, lead by board member Adam Rose, continues to fight and remind everyone of the Freedom of the Press guaranteed by the First Amendment.

Plenty of other notable things happened this year, and they started literally outside our door. The parking lot at the Press Club offices in Historic Filipinotown was finally completed, and our first live event since moving in took place. That was the Veritas Award, given to a movie based on a real-life story, and held a few days ahead of the 2025 Oscars.

The winner was the thriller *September 5*, based on the drama during the 1972 Sum-

er ont ed urhts ne

mer Olympics in Munich, Germany, when an American sports broadcasting team adapts to live coverage of Israeli athletes being held hostage by terrorists. Filmmakers John Ira Palmer, Moritz Binder and Tim Fehlbaum were on hand to accept the award, sharing

their insights and discussing the making of the movie with board member Lisa Richwine in front of a full house.

A highlight of the year was the National Arts and Entertainment Journalism Awards in December. The list of honorees was impressive,

with "Entertainment Tonight" host Kevin Frazier receiving the Luminary Award for Career Achievement, and music icon Melissa Etheridge accepting the Distinguished Storyteller Award. Comedian Tiffany Haddish was honored with the Visionary Award for her humanitarian work. Actor Kathy Bates accepted the Legend Award for Lifetime Achievement and Contributions to Society. She delivered a passionate speech about the power of words and storytelling.

There was other notable activity. The Press Club was around to assist students and student journalists amid cuts in journalism at Los Angeles City College and the USC *Daily Trojan*. Our "Foot in the Door" Program helped guide a new cohort of on-the-rise journalists from historically underrepresented communities. Fellows received a stipend, one-on-one mentoring and other educational opportunities.

Sometimes the Press Club was in the field in different ways. In October, a team from the Club participated in the Asian American Journalism Association's fundraising Trivia Bowl at the KABC studios. We placed in the middle.

A year ago, at the 66th annual Southern California Journalism Awards, we celebrated local media, and some high-profile honorees. ESPN commentator Stephen A. Smith earned the Joseph M. Quinn Award for Lifetime Achievement, and Mickey Osterreicher, who is a photographer and an attorney, accepted the Guardian Award for Contributions to Press Freedom.

The Daniel Pearl Award for Courage and Integrity in Journalism was given in absentia to *Wall Street Journal* reporter Evan Gershkovich, who at the time was being held in a Russian prison. We celebrated when he was released a few weeks later.

The night also saw actor Jane Seymour speak about her humanitarian work, and Fox 11 anchor Amanda Salas deliver a moving speech brimming with the optimism that helped her survive cancer.

As we said at the top, this was an unprecedented year. \blacksquare





Honoring the Journalists and Media Workers Who Risk Their Lives to Get the Story

onight the Los Angeles Press Club is celebrating the best in Southern California journalism. At the same time, we continue to honor the brave journalists and media workers around the world who have given their lives to bring truth to the people. Free speech is under attack in many countries, and even the United States faces threats to the First Amendment rights guaranteed under the U.S. Constitution.

A bit of good news in 2024 was the release of Wall Street Journal reporter Evan Gershkovich, and two other journalists, from Russia as part of a prisoner exchange. At the 2024 Southern California Journalism Awards, Gershkovich was honored in absentia with the Daniel Pearl Award for Courage and Integrity in Journalism. Tonight, the Daniel Pearl Award is being given to Clarissa Ward, chief international correspondent

"As we all know, journalists are under attack across the nation and around the world," comments Danny Bakewell, Jr., president of the LA Press Club. "Each and every day, they are under attack for simply doing their jobs."

As wars continue in Ukraine and Gaza, journalists and media workers struggle to report on the politics and tragedies of everyday life. In 2024, at least 122 journalists and media workers were killed, with 76 fatalities in Israel and occupied territories. There have been a total of 166 deaths since the war started in October

Fourteen other countries last year also saw journalists killed while working. So far in 2025, 33 journalists have been killed.

In 2024, 14 women journalists were killed, most in Gaza. Female journalists face many dangers, as the Gender Council Statement of the International Federation of Journalists points out: "Women journalists are also more likely to be followed or monitored, notably in environments where press freedom is under threat. Moreover, in some regions journalists are considered vulnerable to being kidnapped or trafficked, especially when reporting in high-risk areas."

Injury or death is not the only threat. As of May 31, 536 journalists and 40 media workers have been jailed or detained worldwide, according to Report-

ers Without Borders. Another 67 are missing, according to the Committee to Protect Journalists (CPJ)

From 1992 through 2024, there were 1,637 journalists killed worldwide, according to CPJ.

The Press Club thanks all the journalists and media workers who risk their lives daily to bring truth to the world. We will continue to work to preserve a free press.

We thank the Committee to Protect Journalists, the International Federation of Journalists, and Reporters Without Borders for providing information about journalists killed, imprisoned and missing. While there are discrepancies in the totals among these sources, the Press Club has done its best to provide the most upto-date information.

THE 2025 TONY ROSS SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENTS

Two Area Student Journalists to Receive \$5,000 Stipends

n honor of his son Anthony Darrow Ross, Richard Ross partnered with the Los Angeles Press Club in 2022 to create a scholarship. Seven people have since received the stipends.

This year, two grants of \$5,000 are being awarded. They are going to local students who have faced hardships on their path to becoming journalists.

Richard Ross graduated from the USC School of Law in 1959. After the unexpected death of his wife, Lorrie, the following year, he left a promising career in entertainment law and took a position as a Deputy District Attorney, which allowed him more time to be with and care for his infant son Tony.

Tony was an intelligent, creative and charismatic young man. He was an award-winning reporter, and then an editor, at his high school newspaper. He was news anchor for his school's TV station and had an internship as a reporter with KCOP-13. Aiming for a career in journalism, he attended Wesleyan University. But during his sophomore year, after a series of personal losses, Tony took his own life.

Richard Ross changed careers, earning a doctorate in clinical psychology, and served as a hearing referee in the Mental Health Department of Los Angeles Superior Court. He is affiliated with the Didi Hirsch Suicide Prevention Center and has contributed to its programs, including work on suicide prevention and support for survivors of suicide.

Richard, who is retired, established the Tony Ross Scholarship to support young people interested in journalism. He believes nothing is more important to the survival of our democracy than a free and inquiring press.

These are the 2025 Tony Ross Scholarship recipients.

Victor Montiel

Montiel attends Pierce College in Woodland Hills, where he is studying photography and journalism. It was a difficult road getting there—during his senior year in high school, his parents moved for work, and Montiel would wake each day at 5 a.m. to catch a 6 a.m. train. "I'd sit at the train stop at night and tell myself I'd make a name for myself," he said. He earned money to buy his first camera—which he found at a swap meet—by selling chocolates in school. By the time he graduated, he had already had his first gallery show, in North Hollywood. He hopes one day to work in film production, perhaps making documentaries for National Geographic, and also working as a freelance photographer. "I'm passionate about exploring every aspect of this field," he said.

Natalia Mochernak

Mochernak just finished her first year as a Communication and Spanish double major at UCLA. In the coming academic year she will serve as campus politics and assistant news editor for the Daily Bruin. She is the daughter of immigrants whose first language was Russian, and today she speaks four languages. At the Daily Bruin she has covered topics ranging from union strikes to Palestine protests, and when the wildfires broke out, she interviewed a student who learned he just lost his home. Due to financial constraints she does it all on a 10-year-old computer that can't support apps such as Slack. "My dream would be to pursue a career in global journalism," Mochernak said, "utilizing my language skills to share incredible human stories from across the globe that make people feel heard and cared for."

Meet the Foot in the Door Fellows of 2025

The Press Club Helps Five Emerging Journalists Take Big Steps Forward

etting a job in journalism is harder than ever before. The job is harder than ever, too, with one person often performing tasks formerly done by many.

Rather than bend to these headwinds, the Los Angeles Press Club's Foot in the Door Fellowship continues to bolster the next generation of journalists. The fellowship provides five early-career journalists, from communities historically excluded from the media, with one-on-one mentoring, training and networking opportunities. We know that becoming a journalist takes grit and determination, but it also requires partners on the inside to make an introduction, share career journeys, offer advice and help open the door.

As part of the 2025 program, fellows have so far received a personalized tour of Spectrum News 1 and received training in investigative reporting and video production. The next training will focus on freelancing. Fellows also receive a \$3,000 stipend.

Media professionals eager to serve as mentors, take informational calls, donate to the program, suggest new recruits or pass along an entry-level job posting can email info@lapressclub.org. This year's mentors are Nic Cha Kim of PBS SoCal; Brittany Levine Beckman of the Los Angeles Times; art critic Shana Nys Dambrot; David Ono of ABC7; and Bianca Rae of CBS Los Angeles. The Foot in the Door Fellowship Committee includes Kim, Levine Beckman and Catalina Villegas of Spectrum News 1. Applications for the 2026 fellowship will open in November on the Press Club's website.

VICTORIA VALENZUELA

Valenzuela is a journalist in Los Angeles covering social justice. This summer, she is an investigative reporting intern with *USA Today* through the Ida B. Wells Society for Investigative Reporting. Last fall,

she graduated from the University of Southern California with her master's degree in specialized journalism, with a concentration in social justice and investigations. She has been published in the *L.A. Times, The Guardian, BuzzFeed News* and *LAist,* among others. She has covered topics including forced prison labor, forced

Rappleye Grants Help Three Journalists Pursue Investigative Work

In the effort to help journalists produce important work, the Los Angeles Press Club created the Charles M.
Rappleye Investigative Journalism Award. These are grants ranging from \$1,000 to \$5,000 and go to individuals or teams in need of resources. Applicants with an urgent need may receive an interim grant outside the regular award cycle.

The award is named for the late journalist Charles Rappleye and supports next-level investigative research for ongoing projects. Rappleye worked at *L.A. Weekly* and *L.A. CityBeat* and authored the non-fiction book *Sons of Providence: The Brown Brothers, the Slave Trade, and the American Revolution,* which won the George Washington Book Prize. He also co-founded, with his wife Tulsa Kinney, the art magazine *Artillery*.

Three recipients of Rappleye Awards were recently announced. Here is information about them and their projects:

Delilah Brumer is a freelance journalist based in Los Angeles. She starts at UCLA in the fall after graduating from Los Angeles Pierce College. Brumer focuses on education, government and inequality in her work. Her reporting has appeared in *CalMatters*, the *Los Angeles Times*, the *New York Times*, *EdSource* and the *Los Angeles Daily News*, among other publications. She received a Rappleye grant to investigate the LAUSD's remote learning programs.

Gilare Zada is originally from San Diego. Her work

has appeared in outlets including KQED, Mission Local, the Peninsula Press and *Stanford Magazine*. She currently reports for KQED, the Bay Area's NPR and PBS station. Zada received a grant to support her work on how federal funding cuts uniquely impact California's national parks.

Kate Morrissey has covered immigration issues at the San Diego-Tijuana border since 2016. She worked at the San Diego Union-Tribune for more than seven years and is known nationally for her work on the U.S. asylum system and border policies. In 2020, Morrissey published "Returned," an award-winning, four-part series investigating the U.S. asylum

series investigating the U.S. asylum system. She is a co-founder of Daylight-SanDiego.org, an online news outlet, and publishes the newsletter "Beyond the Border News." The Rappleye grant will support Morissey's investigation into the Trump Administration's policy of deporting Mexican immigrants to the remote town of Tapachula.

For Press Rights, It's a Time of Fire and ICE

As Los Angeles Journalists Inform the Public, They Too Often Come Into the Crosshairs of Law Enforcement BY ADAM ROSE

uring a 12-month period in California, the Los Angeles Press Club documented more than 50 incidents of police misconduct toward iournalists.

That was back during the Black Lives Matter protests (starting in May 2020) to the Echo Park Lake homeless rights protests (April 2021). Graphic images of reporters suffering injuries at the hands of police officers helped convince the California legislature to pass laws protecting journalists. One exempts press from dispersal orders and prohibits police from interfering with their work. Another restricts use of "less lethal" munitions, particularly when journalists could be hit.

In less than one week this June, just in Los Angeles, we've witnessed another 50-plus incidents of law enforcement misconduct

2025; National toward press at ICE protests. Many journalists have a rule not to become part of

the story. But when our colleagues can't tell the story, there's a clear exception.

Democracy depends on an informed public. An informed public depends on a free press. And when our rights are chilled by unlawful acts, the press is the story.





As the late Congressman John Lewis explained, "If it hadn't been for the media, for brave, courageous journalists, the Civil Rights movement would have been like a bird without wings."

During the first weekend of ICE protests, most of Los Angeles was calm. The vast majority of the sprawling metropolis saw not even a hint of unrest. As the peak of protesters gathered Downtown, a crowd at least 10 times larger was celebrating the Pride Parade in West Hollywood.

That lack of any real "insurrection" is vital context that audiences deserve to know. Vandalism did occur and needed to be reported—with perspective. Was it any worse than when the Dodgers or Lakers win a championship? Images of burning Waymos might attract a big audience, but rights come with responsibilities. In this case, the press must seize an important opportunity to earnestly and thoughtfully inform audiences.

The clear story has been one of power and its abuse: immigration enforcement actions by federal officers, the message of overwhelmingly peaceful protesters, and the not-always peaceful response. The only way people knew what was happening was through the

The Los Angeles Press Club for years has engaged with law enforcement leadership and other civic officials to ensure they understood their responsibilities to protect press access. They have failed.

One of the more common concerns expressed by law enforcement is that anyone with a phone might claim to be press. But outlets whose journalists have been mistreated this month include the Los Angeles Times, Los Angeles Daily News, New York Times, New York Post, CNN, Univision, KCBS/KCAL, KTTV, KNBC and KTLA.

It's hard not to recognize a TV news truck, cameras on tripods or journalists

covered in "press" labels and station branding. But that shouldn't be necessary. Most of those outlets also employ journalists using their phone to record. That's a good thing, and it's also a good thing when this is done by freelancers, independent journalists posting online, and students. All enjoy the same legal protections in California.

Indeed, an honorary Pulitzer Prize was awarded to Darnella Frazier.—a citizen who committed a vital act of journalism by filming the murder of George Floyd on her phone. Her video disproved a false narrative that police initially spread in a press release, whitewashing the role of their officers in his death.

Days before this publication went to press, the principles of press rights were supposed to be discussed in these pages—but in relation to restrictions on press access during the January wildfires and 2024 homeless encampment clearings. It's concerning that those topics now barely warrant a mention.

Instead, let's remember the longer arc of history and why we must remain vigilant against these abuses. In 1970, *Los Angeles Times* journalist Ruben Salazar



was covering a Vietnam War protest when he took a break and stepped inside a bar. A deputy from the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department shot a tear gas canister inside and killed him. The pain of our local Chicano community remains. We all can look around our newsrooms and realize that journalists of color are underrepresented. That makes it all the more galling to realize that a disproportionate number of police abuses are directed at our colleagues who are Black and Brown.

In 2000, Los Angeles Police Department responses to protests during the Democratic National Convention led to lawsuits and settlements with journalists.

Lessons were not learned. The 2007 May Day melee, the 2011 Occupy protests, the 2020 Black Lives Matter protests, the 2021 homeless rights protests and the 2022 abortion rights protests all involved egregious violations of press rights, leading to millions of dollars in settlements and judgments due to misconduct by the LAPD and LASD. Of course, every penny of that came out of taxpayer pockets. Officers rarely, if ever, face serious discipline.

Journalists love to quote a letter from Thomas Jefferson in 1787, in which he wrote, "were it left to me to decide whether we should have a government without newspapers, or newspapers without a government, I should not hesitate a moment to prefer the latter."

Many don't know the next sentence, which reads, "but I should mean that every [person] should receive those papers & be capable of reading them."

In times of insurrection and in times of peace, the fate of our democracy depends on the public receiving reports from a free press. It also depends on the press to excel at that job, and to educate people on the events which matter to society.

Recent events may be new and unprecedented, but our rights, and our responsibilities, remain as old as our democracy itself.

So did a battalion of Los Angeles television news reporters. As the region suffered unprecedented damage in the following days, Angelenos flocked to local TV stations for up-to-the-minute information that could literally be life-saving.

They headed toward the flames, providing stunning video from the ground and from the air that drove home the danger at hand. Reporters relayed vital information about evacuation orders and shelter locations in Pacific Palisades, Altadena and elsewhere. Anchors stayed on the air for marathon shifts over several days.

While print, radio and online journalists also provided crucial information, it was the local TV stations that

n the morning of Jan. 7, a wildfire broke did the greatest amount of work, and that had the greatest expense in terms of dollars, people and another blaze erupted in Altadena. Fire-resources. For this was a natural disaster that had to be seen, in real time, to be understood.

The local TV stations—all the reporters, anchors, producers, researchers, technical staff and others—spread their teams across the region. They chronicled the heroic work of the firefighters, and the damage done to homes and busi-Los Angeles had never seen such rapid destruc- nesses. They reported on the harrowing escapes,





The fires went on for days, and so did the outstanding coverage—and this at a time of tightened media budgets, and reporters working harder than ever.

In recognition of their work, the Los Angeles Press Club is bestowing a special award to the news networks that kept the area informed during the disaster. Being honored tonight at the Southern California Journalism Awards are ABC7 Eyewitness News, KCAL News/CBS Los Angeles, FOX11, KTLA 5, NBC4 Los Angeles, Spectrum News 1, Telemundo 52 and Univision 34.

The comprehensive coverage may have seemed to some viewers like an instantaneous reaction, but it was the result of years of coverage of previous local fires. The news teams knew where to go, and how to gain quick access to officials and relay the latest information.

While journalists provided key details about fire activity and the response—think of all the reports about deployment, containment, super scoopers, hydrants running dry, etc.—they also interviewed evacuees and put a human face on the tragedy as it was unfolding. Angelenos learned what was happening to their neighbors. They learned where to bring their animals when flames approached.

The local reporting was used by TV stations around the world, providing a sense of the scope of the disaster. An outpouring of support ensued.

Some journalists did more than gather and spread information. They personally helped residents in need during their reporting.

Tim Wieland, the regional president and general manager at CBS Colorado and CBS Los Angeles, oversees KCNC-TV in Denver, and KCBS and KCAL in Los Angeles. His most recent tenure at CBS began in 2001. News Departments he works with have received honors including the George Foster Peabody Award in 2006, and three national Edward R. Murrow Awards.

"I am most proud of how every member of the KCAL News team stepped up to serve our community during a time of crisis, even as many of them were personally impacted," he said. "In the weeks and months that followed, I'm proud of how KCAL News has demonstrated a commitment to follow the journey of rebuilding and recovery."



Erica Hill-Rodriguez is the news director at KTLA-TV, where she oversees nearly 105 hours of live news and local programming every week. Previously she was the Vice President and News Director at KTTV in Los Angeles, and spent six years as the News Director of KCPQ in Seattle. Hill-Rodriguez has spent 25 years in local news, including in Chicago.

Of the fire coverage, she states, "This was by far one of the proudest moments in my career as a local news journalist and as the News Director at KTLA. The KTLA team provided nearly 100 hours of uninterrupted coverage as soon as the fires broke out. Our field crews marched into the fire zones, provided real-time evacuation information, shared the heartbreak and the spirit of

> Nielsen statistics confirm that viewers were glued to local news coverage. TV viewership and online engagement with the Los Angeles-based networks doubled or tripled for some outlets during the crisis.

> On Jan. 8, viewers watched more than 1.1 billion minutes of local news coverage on television, Nielsen said. Digital engagement with those networks increased by nearly 1,700 percent compared with the average from the three previous weekdays.

There was another benefit: Nielsen said the groundswell toward local news reflected the trust that Los Angeles residents have for the stations they tune into each day and night.

A 2024 report by the Reuters Institute for the Study of Journalism found that local TV news was trusted by 62% of Americans surveyed, ahead of any network, cable or digital source.

This faith in local TV news was important during the emergency created by the fires, Nielsen said. That includes the Spanish-language programming that helped deliver critical information to the diverse population of Los Angeles.



In some areas, cars were left to burn while flames raced up hills but horses were able to be evacuated by owners and volunteers.





"When the stakes are high, trust becomes paramount," Nielsen said. "Social media provided timely updates, but also saw instances of misinformation creating confusion. Faced with this challenge, audiences turned to local media for fact-checked, reliable updates."

The fires have long been extinguished, and the heroic first responders who battled the Palisades and Eaton Fires have moved on to other emergencies. But Angelenos will never forget those harrowing days. And for many people, what they remember best is what they saw on their local news.

Marco Flores is vice president of News for KMEX Univision 34 Los Angeles at Univision Communications Inc. He joined Univision in 2000 as a producer, reporter and back-up anchor for KTVW Univision 33 Phoenix, then served as the station's executive producer and later as news director. He began his broadcast career in radio in 1992 with a graveyard shift as

a disc jockey.

In terms of Univision's fire coverage, Flores says, "I am proud of the team's resilience, resourcefulness and dedication to providing essential information to our community. I am also impressed by the collaboration and support from my fellow news directors, who work side-by-side to effectively serve the people of Los Angeles.



ill Plaschke was preparing to call it a night has been named national Sports Columnist of on Saturday, Feb. 1. It was three weeks after the Eaton Fire destroyed half the houses on his Altadena cul-de-sac.

His home was left standing but rendered uninhabitable due to toxic smoke. He and his fiancée Roxana were now living a nomadic life, staying in one Airbnb after another, a state familiar to tens of thousands of Angelenos displaced by the wildfires.

Around 10 p.m., the phone rang. It was Plaschke's editor at the Los Angeles Times, Iliana Limon Romero, telling him the Lakers had traded Anthony Davis for Luka Doncic; it was a blockbuster deal that would supercharge the team led by aging superstar LeBron James. Plaschke roused himself from bed and composed a col-

"In making the boldest move in franchise history Saturday night, the Lakers rediscovered their fight, their future and the hearts of their fans," he wrote, his reflex for deploying superlatives in high gear. "Great trade. Tremendous trade. Championship trade."

He delivered the column at 1 a.m.

"I just felt it," he says in an interview. "That's when writing from the heart always works."

Plaschke has been writing from the heart about sports for 38 years, including almost three decades as a columnist for the Times. He is a member of the National Sports Media Hall of Fame and California Sports Hall of Fame. He

the Year nine times by the Associated Press, and twice by the Society of Professional Journalists and the National Headliner Awards. He has written six books.

He spent 22 years on ESPN's daily talk show "Around the Horn," where his self-deprecating claim to fame was being muted 1,758 times, a now unbreakable record. The show aired a final time May 23. The last episode brought Plaschke


Now he's got another prize for his shelf: the Los Angeles Press Club's Joseph M. Quinn Award for Lifetime Achievement. Previous recipients include Stephen A. Smith, Lester Holt, Andrea Mitchell, Dan Rather and Tom Brokaw.

"This is much larger than me," Plaschke says. "I accept the award for the whole Los Angeles Times, all we were and all we're trying to be."

He receives the award as the Times, like many news organizations, faces budget cuts and layoffs under a billionaire owner whose commitment to journalism has been questioned. Despite his notoriety, Plaschke lives in constant fear of losing his job. And that's a motivation.

"I spent my career waiting to get tapped on the shoulder and get fired," he says. "That's why I try to make the extra call, I try to do the extra interview, I try to make the extra observation, I try to give them more and more and more."

This month, Plaschke revealed that he's suffering from Parkinson's disease.

"I've spent my entire career writing triumphant stories about athletes overcoming illness and adversity, only to reach the home stretch struggling to find a similar triumph in a story about me," he wrote. "Now I know what all those subjects of all those feel-good stories understood about the truth behind my positive prose. Degenerative disease sucks beyond any inspirational adjective. Incurable illness stinks beyond any hopeful headline."

Plaschke speaks with a slight stutter and the country accent of his native Louisville, Kentucky. He grew up watching the "Wide World of Sports." On Saturday afternoons, the opening

musical fanfare would play and the announcer intoned: "Spanning the globe to bring you the constant variety of sports. The thrill of victory and the agony of defeat." The voice played over

a montage of a man diving off a cliff, a figure skater spinning pirouettes, a skier wiping out.

"I base my whole career on that poor skier who gets knocked on his ass," Plaschke says. "Everything for me is either something great or it's a nightmare. Life is a disaster or horrific or wonderful or splendid or tremendous. I'm full of hyperbole."

His journalism career began in eighth grade, covering youth baseball. He would pen a story that his mother would type and deliver to the box of the weekly newspaper, the *Jeffersonian Voice*, on Monday. It would come out in print on Wednesday.

"It was like a miracle," he says. "I would write and somebody else would read. And I soon realized that my writing can make people laugh or



cry or think."

He worked at newspapers in Fort Lauderdale and Seattle before joining the *Los Angeles Times*. He considers Los Angeles the world's greatest city for athletic spectacles.

"No city has more live, viable sports than we do, nobody," he says. "It's part of me being so lucky. It's impossible not to find a great story."

He made a habit of preparing two columns for each game in order to meet deadlines: One for victory and one for defeat.

"USC wins and they're a great program on the way back," he says. "They lose and they're a terrible program in ruins. I'm very black and white in my writing. There's not a lot of gray in sports."

His advice to aspiring journalists: "I just work

my ass off, and that's the one thing you can control. You can't control your God-given talent. You can't control your background—whether you have parents with influence. You can't control where you come from. You can't control your race, your creed or sexuality. But you can control how hard you work."

He also says not to get too hung up on style.

"I'm not writing Shakespeare here," he says. "This is sports."

Plaschke has a library of memories. He was in the stands in the 1988 World


Series when a hobbled Kirk Gibson hit a gamewinning home run for the Dodgers. He was at last year's World Series when Freddie Freeman whacked another walk-off homer for the Dodgers against the Yankees.


He chronicled Kobe Bryant's career from his rookie year. There were times when Bryant wouldn't talk to him and other times they'd be best friends.

"I'm screaming right now, cursing into the sky, crying into my keyboard, and I don't care who knows it," he wrote after the fatal accident.



could return at any time.

Ward has spent more than two decades taking such risks while reporting from conflict zones around the world, chronicling wars, regime changes and societal upheaval. She has reported from Iraq, Russia, Afghanistan, Syria, Georgia and Ukraine, to name a few, at times working as one of the few Western journalists on the ground.

"I care about ordinary people. Ordinary peo-

larissa Ward knew that the Russian drones could return at any time.

I can't get to those stories without taking some risk," Ward said.

Tonight, Ward is receiving the Los Angeles Press Club's Daniel Pearl Award for Courage and Integrity in Journalism at the Southern California Journalism Awards. The prize is named for the Wall Street Journal foreign correspondent who was killed by terrorists in Pakistan in 2002.

Born in London, Ward initially thought she wanted to be an actress. She was 22 and studying comparative literature when the planes hit the World Trade Center.

"My whole world changed in a moment," Ward said of 9/11.

She wanted to try to get to the root of how and why the attack happened. That included trying to better understand America's role in the world and how it is perceived by others.

"I understood implicitly that I had a calling," she said. Ward added that she had a "very idealistic notion of wanting to go to the tip of the sphere and act as a translator between worlds."

After graduating from Yale, she moved to New York City in search of a job in a newsroom, joining Fox's overnight desk. It was a grueling two years, with shifts starting at midnight, but one that involved frequent communications with Fox's Baghdad bureau.

There were moments of boredom and periods of "incredibly intense pressure," she said. Her responsibilities included alerting the news organization of major global events, like when Saddam Hussein was found in 2003.

After nearly a year in the role, Ward began





begging her bosses to allow her to go to Baghdad. They ultimately said yes, and she went for six weeks before quitting to become a freelancer in Beirut, traveling back and forth to Baghdad.

In Iraq, Ward found herself motivated by the stories of ordinary people swept up in war.

Pearl's work and death loomed large in her mind early in her career, both as a reality check on the dangers involved in the field she'd chosen, and as a reminder of the ideals of being courageous in the name of pursuing the truth.

and hustled to prove herself. She made herself useful, finding mentors and thinking ahead about ways to help her colleagues, whether it was getting them coffee, or printing wire copy and putting it under their doors.

"Anything I could do to make people in this industry realize how serious I was about wanting to learn," she said.

Ward joined ABC in 2007 and worked as a correspondent in Moscow and Beijing, before

becoming the CBS News foreign news correspondent in 2011.

Later that year, she posed as a tourist and slipped into Syria, giving viewers a look at a country headed toward civil war. Ward traveled alone with a hidden camera, and interviewed members of the Free Syrian Army as well as a protester crippled by government security forces.

She had an extensive backstory prepared, had gone over her packing list many times, created clean technology devices and accounts, and even sewed a pocket into the lin-



ing of her underwear to carry her camera's memory cards. She ultimately won a George Foster Peabody Award for her dispatches.

Ward joined CNN in 2015, and less than three years later became chief international correspondent, succeeding Christiane Amanpour. She reported on life under Taliban rule in 2018. When Russia invaded Ukraine in 2022, she went to Kharkiv and Kyiv. More recently, she traveled to Syria after the fall of the Assad regime, reporting from inside a prison known for torture and a morgue. Earlier this year

she was with Ukrainian families as they waited for their loved ones to return as part of a prisoner exchange with Russia.

Ward has a knack for and fascination with language, using it to deepen her coverage. She speaks—to varying degrees—French, Italian, Russian, Arabic, Spanish and Mandarin.

A mother of three, Ward said she has a sober approach to risk. She knows she can't do her job without taking some risk, but contrasts it with detailed planning and teamwork.

"You're just sick with nerves," she said of her time in the field on dangerous assignments. "Fear and nerves, they're very normal and they're very important. They're not something you should ignore, but they can't be in the driver's seat."

She said her job is harder than ever: many people are turning away from news and mainstream media, and social media can add complexity and toxicity.

But time in the field has helped crystalize her style and strengths. Ward's goal is to be human in her reporting and to tell stories in an accessible way.

When she makes mistakes, "I'll own up to it. We're not perfect," she said.

Ward says she's learned the steps she needs to take after returning home from assignments in high-risk areas. She now has discipline around spiritual practices from meditation to breath work, prayer and yoga.

"I understand that when I come back, I need to crash," she said. "Even if you don't feel it intellectually, it's written in the body."

The *Sentinel* and the *Watts Times* each have a circulation of over

250,000 weekly readers, and WBOK has a listening audience of over 100,000. Bakewell is a board member of the USC Black Alumni Association, as well as a Life Member of the NAACP. He is a board member of the United Negro College Fund (Los Angeles) and President of the Los Angeles Press Club.



CHER CALVIN joined KTLA in 2005 and anchors the station's 5, 6, 10 and 11 p.m. nightly newscasts. 
